The Fifth Rwanda Population and Housing Census (RPHC2022) was implemented by the National Institute of Statistics of Rwanda (NISR). Field work was conducted from August 16 th to 30 th , 2022.
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FOREWORD

The Government of Rwanda, through the National Institute of Statistics of Rwanda (NISR) conducted the 2022 Rwanda Population and Housing Census to provide updated demographic, social and economic indicators for policy formulation and planning to support the national development agenda and track the implementation of national, regional, continental and global development goals, such as the First National Strategy for Transformation (NST1 2017-2024); the AU Agenda 2063; and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The Population and Housing Census in Rwanda dates back to the year 1978 when the first ever modern census was implemented. The second, third, and fourth censuses were carried out in 1991, 2002, and 2012 respectively. The 2022 Population and Housing Census marks therefore the Fifth in the series following the United Nations Recommendations to conduct a census every ten years.

Considering census' crucial importance for the planning process, the Government of Rwanda has made the Population and Housing Census a priority to be undertaken every 10 years and adopted the use of technologies for timely delivery of census results for use.

Results of the 2022 Population and Housing Census provide population numbers from national to the lowest administrative level, as well as demographic and socio-economic indicators at both national and district levels. The census remains the only national data collection exercise that can provide the lowest levels of disaggregation to support decentralised decision making across the country.

I would like therefore to take this opportunity to thank all stakeholders that contributed to the success of the 2022 Population and Housing Census. They include Ministries and other Government institutions, international organizations such as the World Bank (WB), the European Union (EU), the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), One-UN, UN Women, UNICEF, UNECA, the United Kingdom AID (UKAID), the African Development Bank (AfDB), the USAID, Enabel, PARIS 21 and others for their support in diverse ways.

My special thanks go to the local government leaders from the province to the village levels who contributed a lot to the success of the 2022 Population and Housing Census. Exceptional gratitude to all enumerators, teachers and young people who collected the information and all respondents for their cooperation and dedication. The National Institute of Statistics of Rwanda (NISR) deserves special appreciation for the excellent operational and coordination of all census activities.

CHAPTER 1: POPULATION SIZE, SPATIAL DISTRIBUTION, AND STRUCTURE

1.1 Size and Spatial Distribution of the population

1.1.1 Size and Spatial Distribution of the Population of Western province

The 5th Rwanda Population and Housing Census (PHC5) has enumerated 2,896,484 residents in the Western Province, which represents 21.87% of the total population of Rwanda (13,246,394 residents). The population of the Western Province is predominantly female; 1,511,849 are women corresponding to 52.2 % of the total population of the Western province. Rutsiro is one of the most 5th populated district with 369,180 residents in western province. Its population represents 12.7 % of the total residents' population of western province. The least populated district in the Western Province is Nyabihu with 319,047 inhabitants, corresponding to 11.0 % of the total resident population of Western province.



1.1.2 Population density of the Western province by district


Population density is a measurement of population per unit land area. Density is the number of the inhabitant per Km². The Rwanda Population and Housing Census conducted in 2022 revealed that, the population density in Rwanda is 503 inhabitants per Km². The Western Province has 693 inhabitants per Km². The district with a high population density is Rubavu with 1,614 Inhabitants per km². The district with a lowest population density is Karongi with 482 Inhabitants per km². Rutsiro has 565 inhabitants per Km². The figure below indicates distribution of population density per district.

1.1.3 Size and Spatial Distribution of the Population of the Rutsiro district

The 5th Rwanda Population and Housing Census (PHC5) has enumerated 369,180 residents in Rutsiro district, which represent 12.7% of the total population of the Western province (2,896,484 residents). The population of Rutsiro district is predominantly female: 192,682 are women corresponding to 52.2 % of the total population Rutsiro district. The results in previous table 1.1 indicates that, the population share of Rutsiro district is 12.7 % of the total Western province population.

Females are predominant in twelve out of 13 sectors of the district (Gihango (52.5%), Kigeyo (52.9%), Kivumu (53.1%), Manihira (52.4%), Mukura (53%), Murunda (51.7%), Musasa 52.1%), Mushonyi (53%), Mushubati (52.4%), Nyabirasi (53.1%), Ruhango (53%), and Rusebeya (53.8%). Boneza has more male than female (54.6% male versus 45.4% female),

The most populated sectors are Mukura sector has (38, 627 Population), Kivumu (35,027 Population) and Nyabirasi (33,304 Population). They represent 10.5%, 9.5% and 9.0% of the total population of Rutsiro district, respectively.

The two less populated sectors are Manihira (19,386 inhabitants) and Murunda (23,401 inhabitants). They represent 5.3% and 6.3% of the total resident population of Rutsiro district, respectively. The table below 1.2 indicates the number of the population of Rutsiro district by sector, by sex and their shares across sectors to the total population of Rutsiro district.

1.1.4 Size and Spatial Distribution of the Population of Rutsiro district by residence area

The results of Rwanda Population and housing census 2022 revealed that, the total population of Rwanda are spatially distributed in rural area that represent 72.1% and urban area represent 27.9%. The Western Province is predominantly by the rural area (77.9%) and urban area (22.1%). Rutsiro district population is predominantly by rural area 94.4% while urban area represents 5.6%. The sectors of Rutsiro district which are entirely rural area are Boneza, Kigeyo, Manihira, Mukura, Murunda, Mushubati, Nyabirasi, and Rusebeya while urban area are represented in (Gihango: 11.3%), (Kivumu:28.7%), (Musasa: 4.1%), Mushonyi (15.8%), and (Ruhango: 8.5%). The table below 1.3 illustrates the results.


1.1.5 Age- sex structure of the population of Rutsiro district

Rutsiro population is mostly young. About 59.44% of the resident population of Rutsiro is under 25 years, as shown by the age pyramid (Figure 4), reflecting the high level of fertility in the recent past. The elderly (60 years and above) represents 6.90% of the total population of the district. The percentage share of the population aged 0-14 represents 38.48%, the population aged 15-34 years represents 34.36% and 35 to 64 years and above represents 22.76%. The table below 1.4 illustrates the results, and more details of sectors are in the annex.

1.1.6 Population share of some specific interventions target groups in Rutsiro District by sex

The Rwanda population and housing census 2022 indicate the population on specific ages-based programs, policy and strategies interventions in health, education, employment and also indicates the population categories in their respective characteristics such as children, youth, working population, among other things. For instance, children under five years for immunization programs (U5 children), children in education (3-17 years), people in the official working age group (16 years and above), etc. Knowing the size of such groups is of great importance for the design, implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of programs targeting such groups. The above table gives the size of the main interventions target groups by sex, and their share in the entire population of Rutsiro district. The population aged 0-17 represents 46.1% of the total population of the district, 16-30 years represent 27.0%; the economically active population aged 16years and above represents 59.0% of the same population. The table below shows distribution of Rutsiro districts by targeted interventions by their age.

CHAPTER 2: CHARACTERISTICS OF THE POPULATION

2.1 Socio-cultural characteristics of the population

2.1.1 Nationality of the population of Rutsiro district and their sectors

The results of 5th RPHC-2022 indicate that, the Rwandan population by nationality represent 99.1% and foreigners represent 0.9%. In the Western Province, foreigners represent 0.5% and 0.1% for Rutsiro districts. The main sectors of Rutsiro districts that have the highest percentage of foreigners compared to others; those are Kivumu (0.2%), Boneza, Gihango, Murunda and Nyabirasi (0.1% each). The table below illustrates the distribution of the population by nationality with their respective sectors of residence.

2.1.2 Religious affiliation of the resident of population of Rutsiro district.

In Rutsiro district, Christianity is the predominant religion in Rutsiro district. 35.2% are catholic, 21.7% are ADEPR adherents, 18.0% are protestants, 13.4% are Adventists, and 1.3% are Muslim, and Jehovah witness are 0.8%. 2.7% of the resident population declared themselves to be without religion. 2.2 Marital Status of the resident population of Rutsiro district

2.2.1 Marital status by Sector

The results of 5th RPHC-2022, 50.7% of the resident population of Rutsiro district aged 12 and above were living in union (married officially to one wife/husband, married not officially to one wife/husband, live in polygamous union at the time of the census, while 43.5% were never married. 4.5% were widowed, while separated and divorced were respectively 1.2% and 0.1%. At the sector level, five sectors, Manihira (53.8%), Rusebeya (53.7%) and Murunda (53.4%), have the highest percentages of the people living in union. Boneza (50.9%) and Kivumu (45.1%) have the highest percentages of the never married persons. Musasa (5.1%), Mukura and Nyabirasi (5.0% each) have high percentage of widowed persons Details of the resident population of Rutsiro district aged 12 years and above by marital status and sex is presented in the annex.

2.2.2 Marital status by age groups

The percentages of resident population of Rutsiro district by marital status vary by sex and age: The percentage of never married persons decreases from 99.8% (age group of 12-14 years) to 1.0% (age group of 80 years and above). The percentage of persons currently living in union (married to one wife/husband officially, married to one wife/ husband not officially, live in polygamous union) starts by increasing from 2.0% (age group of 15-19 years) to a maximum of 89.8% (age group of 40-44 years) before decreasing to 46.2% (age group 85+) due

2.3 Educational Characteristics of the Population of Rutsiro district

2.3.1 School attendance

Table 2. 5 below shows that, in Rutsiro district, 50.1% of pre-primary-age population (3-5 years) are currently attending school, 49.9% of those children have never attended and none (0%) of those children have previously attended (i.e children who have already had prior exposure to pre-primary school education before the time of census but who were not attending nursery school/dropped-out during census time).

Boneza Sector has the highest proportion of children (age between 3 to 5) currently attending school in Rutsiro District (72.8%). Following closely, the Mushonyi Sector has a percentage of 68.7 % of children currently attending school. Rusebeya and Manihira sectors have the lowest percentage of children currently attending school, with only 34.3% enrolled for each. On the other hand, Manihira and Rusebeya sectors have the highest proportion of children aged 3 to 5 who have never attended school (65.7% each).

Table 2. 6 shows that in Rutsiro District 87.7% of children aged 6 to 11 years (the official primary school-going age) are currently attending school, 10.6% have never attended school and only 1.7% have previously attended school (which means that 12.3%) of children aged 6 to 11 are out of school). By comparing the distribution of the primary school-age population (6-11 years) across sectors in Rutsiro District, comparisons reveal the disparities in primary school attendance across different sectors within Rutsiro District. Sectors like Nyabirasi (72.8%), Murunda (82.0%) and Rusebeya (82.1%) exhibit lower rates of children currently attending school and higher rates of children who have never attended (24.2%, 16.3% and 15.5%, respectively). On the other hand, sectors like Boneza (96.2%) Mushonyi (94.3%) and gihango(94.2%) demonstrate higher rates of children currently attending school and lower rates of children who have never attended (3.2%, 5.0% and 4.9%, respectively).

In Rutsiro district 26.6 % of the population aged 12 to 17 have previously attended school (i.e. they dropped out of school), 69.3% are currently attending school and 4.1% have never attended secondary school. The distribution of the secondary school-age population (12-17 years) across sectors in Rutsiro District, shows that Boneza sector has the highest percentage of the population aged 12 to 17 currently attending school at 82.5%. Conversely, Nyabirasi sector has the lowest percentage of the population aged 12 to 17 currently attending school with 56.4% and the highest percentage of the population between the ages of 12 and 17 who have never attended school at 11.2%.

2.3.2 Gross and Net Attendance Rate (%) in primary school of Rutsiro district by sex and sector

Gross and Net Attendance Ratios are used to measure the extent of coverage of an educational program. It gives a comparison of the children attending school with the total size of the school-age population. It can also be used for assessing how far a country has succeeded in bringing to school all those who are eligible to attend. The results of 5th RPHC 2022 reveal that not all children attending primary school level are of the official age for that level (6-11 years). The gross attendance rate in Rwanda is 141.7, in the Western province GAR is 139.8 and 138.9 in Rutsiro district. The Net Attendance Rate (NAR) in Primary school for Rutsiro district (87.7%) is below the NAR of the western province (87.8%) and that of national level (89.3%).

A Gross Attendance Rate (GAR) of 138.9% in Rutsiro District for the population 6 to 11 years indicates a high percentage of those who attended primary schools aged below 6 years and or above 11 years. On the other hand, the NAR of 87.7% % for the population 6 to 11 years indicates that only 87.7% of the population 6 to 11 years were attending primary schools in Rutsiro District by 2022 (Table 2.8). In the year 2022, students older or younger than the official primary school age range made up 36.8 % [(GAR138.9 –NAR87.7)/GAR138.9] of the primary school population of Rutsiro District.

With a NAR of 96.2 %, the Boneza Sector has the greatest percentage of pupils that are attending primary school and are of primary school-age. In comparison to other sectors, the Nyabirasi sector has the lowest NAR at 72.8%, indicating a lesser percentage of pupils who are attending primary school within the eligible age range. Almost all sectors have gender parity indexes greater than 1.00(except Mushonyi with 1.00) that showing better access to education for female students compared to male students.

2.3.3 Gross and Net Attendance Rate (%) in secondary school in Rutsiro district

The table 2. 9 provides information on the gross and net attendance rates in the secondary school level (12-17 years) in Rutsiro District, disaggregated by sex and sector. The Western Province and Rutsiro District both have lower NARs than the national average (20.6 % and 19.0 %, respectively, versus national level (22.3%) when compared to the national average. Comparing males and females in Rutsiro District in terms of Net Attendance Rates (NAR), the table 2.9 indicates that a higher proportion of females 22.2 %) in Rutsiro District, within the secondary school-age range (12-17 years), are attending school compared to males (15.8%). Female students younger than the official secondary school age range made [(GAR37.4-NAR22.2)/GAR37.4] of the female with secondary school age of Rutsiro District, while for male students it made up 46.4 % [(GAR29.5-NAR15.8)/GAR29.5]. This shows that females have a higher attendance rate in Rutsiro District compared to males when considering the overall attendance rates, regardless of age or grade-level eligibility.

Among the sectors in Rutsiro District, Mushonyi have the highest GAR for both sexes, with a rate of 47.3%. Rusebeya, Nyabirasi, and Manihira sectors have relatively lower GAR and NAR compared to others (19.8% for GAR and10.5% for NAR, 21.6% for GAR 10.3% for NAR and, 22.4% for GAR and 13.3% for NAR respectively). Boneza sector has the highest NAR for both sexes in Rutsiro District, with a rate of 26.1%.

2.3.4 Highest level of school attended in Rutsiro district

The results of 5RPHC-2022 indicate the total population of Rwanda aged 3 and above is 11,999,691. The highest level of education attended is categorized into several levels: Never attended School, Nursery, Primary, INGOBOKA/Vocational, Lower secondary, Upper secondary, University, and Not stated. In Rwanda, 16.7% of the population aged 3 years and above has never attended school, while 2.7% have attended nursery, and 59.5% have attended primary school. Other education levels include 0.8% for INGOBOKA/Vocational, 9.6% for lower secondary, 7.1% for upper secondary, 3.6% for university, and 0.0% is not stated.

The total population of Western province aged 3 and above is 2,613,461. The distribution of the highest level of education attended is like the national level, with slight variations. In the Western province, 19.4% of the population has never attended school, while 2.2% have attended nursery, and 60.7% have attended primary school. Other education levels include 0.6% for INGOBOKA/Vocational, 8.7% for lower secondary, 6.2% for upper secondary, 2.2% for university, and a small proportion 0.0% is not stated.

The total population of Rutsiro District aged 3 and above is 333,658. In Rutsiro District, 21.0% of the population has never attended school, while 1.9% have attended nursery, and 62.9% have attended primary school. Other education levels include 0.4 % for INGOBOKA/Vocational, 7.9% for lower secondary, 4.7 % for upper secondary, 1.1% for university, and a small proportion less than 0.0% have not stated their highest level of education attended. The distribution of the highest level of education attended varies among sectors, with differences in the percentage of individuals at each education level.

For example, Nyabirasi has a higher percentage (33.0%) of individuals who have never attended school compared to other sectors, while Gihango has a higher percentage (67.8%) of individuals attended primary school, the high percentage of individuals who have attended lower secondary school is found in Mushonyi (10.2%). Boneza has a high percentage of individuals who have attended university level (2.1%). Each sector has its own unique distribution of educational levels attended by the population. The table below indicates the findings:

2.4 Characteristics of the employed population in Rutsiro District

The official working age in Rwanda is 16 years and above. Aggregate employment generally increases with growing population. Therefore, the ratio of Employment to the working age population (employment to population ratio) is an important indicator of the capacity of the Economy to provide employment to a growing population. A decline in the employment-to population ratio is often regarded as an indicator of economic slowdown and a decline in total employment as an indicator of a more severe economic downturn.

2.4.1 Employment to population ratio by sex, Province, District and area of residence

The results presented in the below shows that the employment to population ratio stood at 45.9% in Rwanda, it is lower among females (40.2 %) than males (52.4 %). On the other side, it was observed that the employment to population ratio is higher in urban areas of Rwanda (53.5%) than in rural areas (42.7%). It was observed that in the Western province, the employment to population ratio stood at 42.3% percent, it is higher in urban areas (48.2%) than in rural areas (40.6%). It was also revealed that the employment to population ratio is 44.2% percent among people residing in Rutsiro district, it is higher in urban areas of Rutsiro (49.6 %) than in rural areas (43.9%).

2.4.2 Employment to population ratio(EPR) among the resident population of Rutsiro aged 16 years and above by age group and sex

Figure 2. 1 allows the study of intensity of Employment to population ratio and its variation by sex. The figure reveals the following remarks: The employment to population ratio among males as well as females increases from age group 16-19 to 30-34 and starts decreasing from age group 35-39 to 85 years and above as people starts getting very older and retire. It was observed that in district of Rutsiro, the highest employment to population ratio among males stands at 64.8% and was observed in age group 30-34. On the other side the highest employment to population among females is 50.6% and was observed in the age group 30-34. The lowest employment to population ratio among males stands at 5% and was observed among males in the age group 80-84, the lowest employment to population ratio among females is 7.3 % and was observed among females in the age group 85+.

CHAPTER 3: SUB-POPULATION

3.1 Children Population (0-17 years)

According to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (1989), a child is defined as every human being under 18 unless, under the law applicable to the child, majority is attained earlier. It is relevant to underline here that this definition by age coincides with that of Rwanda, as stipulated in Article 3 of the National Law n° 54/2011 of 14 December 2011 relating to the rights and the protection of the child, which stipulates that a child is any person under the age of 18. The age range (0–17) adopted for this report reflects this definition.

3.1.1 Number and share of children in Rutsiro district

At the national level, the children population constitute 44.5% of the total population of 13,246,394 residents. The western province has 1,355,679 children with a share of 46.8% of the total resident population. In Rutsiro District, the children constitute 46.1% of the resident population of the district with a percentage of male slightly greater than the females' one (48.3% to 44.1%). At sector level, the children's share is high in Nyabirasi (50.2%), Murunda (48.6%) and Rusebeya (47.9%) and is small in Boneza (41.2%), Mushonyi (42.7%) and Musasa (43.4%). The table below indicate distribution of children by sector and by sex.

3.1.2 Children with birth registration in Rutsiro District

The results of 5th RPHC 2022 indicate that the percentage of children whose birth was registered is 94.3% at the national level. The birth registration rate in Rutsiro district is 92.5%. The variation by sex is not very significant but the birth registration in urban areas is high (95.2%) than in rural (92.3%). The table below illustrates the findings:

3.1.3 Birth registration by sector

The results of 5th RPHC-2022 indicate that birth registration varies across sectors and areas of residence (urban and rural). Note that Boneza, Kigeyo, Manihira, Murunda, Mushubati, Nyabirasi, and Rusebeya sectors have not urban areas. The higher percentages of birth registrations are found in Mushonyi (96.5%), Boneza (96.4%) while the lowest is in Nyabirasi (84.4%). The percentage of birth registration for males is almost the same as the one for females.

3.2 Youth population in Rwanda

For statistical purposes, the United Nations defines "youth" as those persons between the ages of 15 and 24 years, without prejudice to other definitions by Member States. Considering the current priorities and trends of Rwanda's Development, the definition of Youth in terms of age has been revised in this policy. It was brought from 14 -35 years to 16–30 years.

3.2.1 The youth population in Rutsiro district

The results of 5th RPHC-2022 revealed that the youth population represent 27.1% (3,595,670) of the total population (13,246,394). In Rutsiro district, the youth population was 99,652 which represents 27.0 % of the total resident population of the district (369,180). The sector with the highest youth share is Boneza (31.7%) while Ruhango (25.6%) has the lowest share of youth. The table below indicate distribution of youth by sector and by sex.

3.2.2 Educational characteristics of youth

Youth who never attended school represent 5.1% of the youth resident population at national level; it represents 6.6% of the total youth resident population in Western Province and 7.2% of the total youth resident population of Rutsiro district. The percentage of youth who never attended school varies a lot within sectors of Rutsiro district. The highest percentage was registered in Nyabirasi (18.4%) while the lowest percentages were registered in Mushubati (3.4%). The table below presents details on the distribution of the youth population of Rutsiro District by school attendance status.

3.2.3 Highest level of education attended by youth in Rutsiro district

In Rutsiro district, 59.2% of youth attended only the primary school level, 19.3% attained the lower secondary education, 12.0 % attended the upper secondary education, 1.7 % attained university and 7.2 % have never attended school. The

highest level of education attended varies across sectors of the district. The sectors with the highest percentage of youth never attended school are Nyabirasi (18.4%). Mushubati(24.3%) and Mushonyi(23.7%) are the sectors with high percentages of youth with low secondary school while youth with upper secondary school are most found in Kigeyo(17.8%) and Kivumu(16.4%). 3.2.4 Employment to population ratio among youth (16-30 age)

The Census results showed that in Rwanda the employment to population ratio among youth stands at 40.3%, it is higher among males than females 44.8% and 36.2 % respectively. It was observed that in the district of Rutsiro, the employment to population ratio among youth stands at 40.6% and it is higher in among males (43.4%) than females (38.1%). The highest employment to population ratio among youth in Rutsiro district was observed in Manihira (53.5%) and Gihango sector (49.6%), the lowest employment to population ratio among youth was observed in Mushonyi (19.2%).

3.2.5 Status in employment of youth population in Rutsiro district

In Rutsiro district, most of the youth aged 16-30 currently employed are employees (65.9%) followed by own account worker without regular employees (22.7%). The highest percentage of youth employees is found in Kigeyo sector (85.2%) while the lowest is in Mushubati (41.5%). The highest percentage of currently employed population who worked as own account worker without regular employees among youth is found in Mukura (38.9%) and in Mushubati (38.4%) while the lowest is observed in Kigeyo sector (11.4%) and in Mushonyi (14.4%).

3.2.6 Proportion of Youth (age 16-30) neither in employment nor in education or training in Rutsiro District by sex, district, and area of residence.

The results of 5RPHC-2022 indicate that, In Rwanda the proportion of Youth (16-30) neither in employment nor in education or training stood at 39.5 %. It is higher among females (43.8 %) than males (34.9 %). In the Western Province, the proportion of youth (16-30) neither in employment nor in education or training is 42.6 %, it is lower among males (38.5%) than females (46.3%). 2022 census results also revealed that the aforementioned proportion is higher in rural areas of the Western Province (44.6%) than in urban areas of the Western Province (36.1 percent). The proportion of youth (16-30) neither in employment nor in education or training among people residing in Rutsiro district stood at 42.2%. It is much higher (42.6%) among people residing in rural areas of Rutsiro district than the ones residing in urban areas (35.8 %). The table below (Table 3.9) indicates results on Proportion of Youth (16-30) neither in employment nor in education or training in Rutsiro District by Sex, Sector, and Area of Residence.

3.3 Persons with disabilities

In 2015, 193 countries agreed to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals with a commitment where possible, "to disaggregate the statistics they generate by disability to provide important insights about the extent to which persons with disabilities (PWDs) are being included in society, benefit from government programmes, or are included in the workforce. At the national level, 3.4% of the resident population aged 5 years and above have a disability while in Rutsiro district, the disability prevalence rate is 3.2%. At sector level, the highest prevalence rates of the resident population aged 5 years and above with disability are in Kivumu (4.9%). The lowest is in Rusebeya (1.7%).

Regarding the prevalence of disability among the population age 5 years and above by type of disability, 1.4% have a disability of not seeing, 1.1% have a disability of walking. All the remaining type of disabilities (Hearing, communicating, Remembering or concentrating, self-care, short stature and albinism their respective prevalence is under 1.0%). The table below indicates that in Rutsiro District the prevalence of disability of seeing is at 1.20 %, the prevalence of walking disability occupies 1.16% while the disability of hearing and that of remembering or concentrating occupy 0.55% each. All the remaining disabilities have a prevalence below 0.5%.

3.4 Elderly Population (60 years and above)

Rwanda has enacted laws such as the Law No 088/01 of 07/09/2020 (Office of the Official Gazette of Rwanda, 2020) on Presidential order ratifying the protocol to the African charter on human and peoples' rights on the rights of older persons in Africa adopted by the twenty sixth ordinary session of the Assembly, held in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, on 31 January 2016 through an Official Gazette No.27 of 07/09/2020 and Law No.59/2008 of 10/09/2008 on prevention and punishment of gender-based violence (Office of the Official Gazette of Rwanda, 2008), whose Article 32 sets the penalty for violence against an elderly person.

It is over two decades since the United Nations convened the First World Assembly on Ageing (Vienna, 1982) (National Academy of Sciences, National Research Council, 2001)) that launched an international action programme, which was the first international instrument on ageing, to provide a foundation for the formulation of policies and programmes on ageing. This was done to guarantee economic and social security to older people and other opportunities to contribute to national development.

3.4.1 Elderly population of Rutsiro district by Sector

In 2022, the elderly persons constitute 6.9 % of the total resident population of Rutsiro district. The share of the elderly females (7.9%) is higher than the male's one (5.9%), reflecting the higher life expectancy for women. By sector, Mushonyi (9.1%) and Kigeyo (8.5%) have the highest share of elderly among their total population while Rusebeya has the lowest share (5.2%).

3.4.2 Employment among elderly people

In Rwanda, people keep on working until old age, the share of employed persons among the elderly population stands at 28.2%. The aforementioned share is higher among the elderly males (33.7%) than elderly females (24.3%). In Rutsiro district, 27.8% of elderly people were employed. The percentage of employed elderly people is higher among males than females (32.5% versus 24.6%). Employment among elderly residents is high in Kivumu sector (36.8%) and it is low in Mushonyi sector (12.1%) and in Musasa sector (12.7%).

3.4.3 Marital status of elderly people

In Rutsiro district, more than half of the elderly population (69.3%) were living in union (Married to one wife/husband officially, married to one wife/ husband not officially, Live in a polygamous union) and 28.2% were widowed. The rate of celibacy among elderly was 1.4% while divorce or separation rate is 1.1%. Marital status among the elderly varies slightly by sector of residence. Marriage among elderly people is more important in Mushonyi (79.3%), Kigeyo (73.1%), Murunda (72.4%) and Ruhango (70.1%). widowhood is widespread in Rusebeya sector (34.3%) and Nyabirasi sector (32.8% each). The table below illustrates distribution of elderly people across sectors.

CHAPTER 4: HOUSEHOLDS AND HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS

4.1 Household characteristics

In this chapter, the 5th Population and Housing Census 2022 investigated households and housing characteristics; those include household size, households' heads by sex, type of habitat, housing tenure, materials used for construction, sources of energy used for lighting and cooking, water sources, sanitation facilities, asset possessed by household and mode of waste and disposals.

4.1.1 Number and mean size of the private households

The results of the 5th RPHC 2022 indicate the total of 3,312,743 private households in Rwanda. The western province has 671,506 households and Rutsiro district has 86,802 households. The average household size in Rutsiro District is 4.2 persons per household. At the Sector level, the highest sizes are found in Nyabirasi (4.5 persons/household). The smallest household sizes are found in Musasa (4.0 persons/household). The table below indicates number of households and size of household members per sector.

4.1.2 Private households' heads of Rutsiro District

The results of the 5th RPHC 2022 revealed that 28.9% of private households are headed by women at national level. In Rutsiro district, private households headed by females are 28.7%. At sector level, the highest percentages of households headed by women are found in Mukura (30.8%) and Ruhango (30.5%) while the lowest are found in Boneza (24.9%).

4.2 Housing Characteristics

4.2.1 Type of habitat

The results of 5th Population and Housing Census 2022 revealed that in the Western Province the predominant type of habitat is Umudugudu (Planned rural settlement) with 70.5% and Dispersed/ Isolated housing (18.5%). It is in same as in Rutsiro district as one of districts of the Western Province. The most common type of habitat in Rutsiro district is Umudugudu (Planned rural settlement) with 80.5% followed by Dispersed/ Isolated housing (15.1%). The type of habitat varies across sectors. Umudugudu (Planned rural settlement) is most prevalent in Musasa (95.7%), Kivumu (93.7%) and Mushonyi (93.6%) while the low percentages are in Mushubati (41.7%) and Rusebeya (57.0%). The sectors with the high percentages of dispersed/isolated housing units are Mushubati (39.4%) and Rusebeya (35.1%). The table below displays results by sector.

The type of habitat in Rutsiro district are the same in both urban and rural areas but at the different percentages: the predominant types are umudugudu/Planned rural settlement (97.3% in urban areas against 79.5% in rural areas), followed by dispersed/isolated housing (1.4% in urban areas against 15.9% in rural areas). 4.2.2 Tenure of the housing

The results of 5th RPHC 2022 indicate that the ownership of housing in the Western Province represents 80.5%, tenants represent 13.5% and free lodging represents 4.9%. In Rutsiro district, 85.8% of housing units are occupied by owner while 9.4% are occupied by Tenants and 4.3% by free lodging. At the sector level, the percentage of owners of households' units is high in Musasa (89.8%), Mukura (88.4%) and Manihira (88.2%) and low in Ruhango (82.9%), Kivumu (84.1%), and Gihango (84.5%). The percentage of tenants of housing units is high in Ruhango (13.0%), Gihango (11.2%), Murunda (10.8%) and Kivumu (10.2%) and low in Mukura (6.9%) and Musasa (7.1%). The high percentages of free lodging are found in Mushubati (5.5%), Kivumu (5.3%) and Boneza (5.1%). The table below indicate details:



In Rutsiro district, 3 types of tenure of housing units (owners, tenants, and free lodging) predominate in urban areas as well as in rural area and their percentages vary substantially according to the area of residence. The percentage of owners of housing units is 77.8% in urban areas against 86.2 % in rural areas, the percentage of tenants of housing units is 16.9 % in urban areas against 8.9 % in rural areas. The percentage of free lodging is 4.4 % in urban areas against 4.3 % in rural areas. The figures below indicate details

4.2.3 Material of the housing units

4.2.3.1 Main materials of the roof

The results of 5th RPHC 2022 indicate that housing units are mainly covered by iron sheets in Rwanda (74.1%), in the Western Province, the iron sheets represent (59.0%). In Rutsiro district, housing units are mainly covered by local tiles (86.0%), followed by iron sheets (13.6%). The variation by sector is not very significant. The high

percentages of housing units covered by local tiles are found in Mushonyi (91.0%), Nyabirasi (90.6%) and Mukura (89.7%). The lowest is found in Boneza sector (73.7%). The high percentages of housing units covered by iron sheets are found in Boneza (26.1%) and Mushubati (20.9%). The table below displays details:



The results of the census reveal that the materials used for roofing of the households' units in Rutsiro district are the same in both rural and urban areas of Rutsiro district: the predominant roofing materials are local tiles (86.2% in rural and 82.4% in urban areas). The percentage of housing units covered by iron sheets is 13.4% in rural areas while it is 17.4 in urban areas. The figure below illustrates details:

4.2.3.2 Main materials of the walls

The results of the census show that the housing units of wall are mostly built with Sun dried bricks with cement in Rwanda (36.3%), Sun-dried bricks without cement (30.7%), wood with mud without cement (18.1%) and wood with mud and cement (7.5%). In the Western Province, the most housing units of wall are Sun dried bricks without cement (47.5%, followed by sun dried bricks with cement (26.7%). In Rutsiro district, walls of the housing units are also mostly built with Sun dried bricks without cement (66.2%) and Sun-dried bricks with cement (29.6%).

At the sector level Sun dried bricks without cement are the mostly used materials in Mukura (76.5%), Rusebeya (73.9) and Murunda (73.0%). Sun dried bricks with cement is the most frequently used material in Boneza (46.3%) and Kigeyo (42.4%). The table below displays details:



The main materials used for walls of the housing units in Rutsiro district vary according to the area of residence. In urban areas, they are mostly sun-dried bricks without cement (53.6%), sun-dried bricks with cement (38.4%), wood with mud and burnt bricks with cement (3.1%). In rural areas, sundried bricks without cement are predominant wall materials with 67.0% followed by sundried bricks with cement (29.1%) and wood with mud without cement (1.3%). 4.2.3.3 Main materials of the floor

The results of the 5RPHC 2022 indicate that the main material of the floor of the housing units is the Earth (60.4%) in countrywide. In the Western Province, the Earth is also the main material of the floor of the housing units (74.6%). In Rutsiro district, the main material of the floor of the housing units is Earth (78.4%) followed by cement (18.7%) and Burnt bricks (2.6%). At sector level, the Earth as main material used for the floor is most found in Mukura (89.7%), Nyabirasi (88.0%), Rusebeya (86.2%), Manihira (84.9%), and Kivumu (80.3%). The highest percentage of the housing units with cement as main material used for the floor is found in Boneza (36.6%) and Kigeyo (26.0%) and the high percentage of housing units whose floor in Burnt bricks is found in Murunda (6.5%), Musasa (6.0%), Gihango and Ruhango (5.6% each). 

The results of census indicate the main materials used for floor of the housing units in Rutsiro district are mostly earth, cement and burnt bricks. In urban both urban and rural areas, the predominant materials are earth (64.1% in urban areas versus 79.2% in rural areas) followed by cement (31.1% in urban areas against 18.0% in rural areas) and burnt bricks (4.0% in urban areas versus 2.5% in rural areas). 4.3 Source of energy of the private households

4.3.1 Grid line connectivity in Rutsiro district

At national level, the results of the 5th RPHC 2022 revealed that 52.5% of private households are connected to the national grid while 47.5% are not connected. In Western Province, the percentage of private household connected to the national grid line is 49.0% while it is 44.8% in Rutsiro district. At the sector level, Private households of Boneza(65.2%), Kivumu(62.6%), Nyabirasi(60.2%), Gihango(57.7%), Mushonyi(55.8%) and Kigeyo(51.2%) are connected at more than 50% while in other remaining sectors they are connected at a percentage of less than 50%. 

4.3.2 Main source of energy for lighting in Rutsiro district

In Rutsiro district, the main source of energy for lighting used by households is electricity (50.2%). At the sector level, the percentage of households using electricity for lighting is high in Boneza (69.0%), Kivumu (64.0%), Gihango (61.1%) and Nyabirasi (60.1%). The sectors with the high percentages of private households using flashlight/phone flashlight for lighting are Mukura (50.0%) and Rusebeya (45.7%). Firewood's are most found in Rusebeya (21.5%), Ruhango (20.4%), Nyabirasi (16.4%) and Kigeyo (15.5%). Table below provides details:





The sources of energy for lighting in Rutsiro districts are the same in both urban areas and rural areas where in urban areas they are mainly electricity (64.2%), followed by flashlight/phone flashlight (17.9%), firewood's with 12.1% and candles (3.8%). In rural areas, 49.3% of private households use electricity as main source of energy for lighting while 32.2% use flashlight/ phone flashlight, 13.9% use firewood and candle is used by 1.6% households. 4.3.3 Main sources of energy for cooking in Rutsiro district

At the district level, the main sources of energy for cooking used by the private households are firewood (95.6%) followed by charcoal (3.5%) and gas (0.2%). At the sector level, firewood is the most used source of cooking energy by private households in Mushonyi (97.2%) and Musasa (97.0%) followed by Kigeyo and Rusebeya (96.6% each). Sectors with the high percentage of private households using charcoal as main source of cooking energy are Gihango (6.3%), Murunda (4.9%) and Mushubati (4.7%). Sectors with the highest percentages of private households using gas as main source of cooking energy are Gihango (0.8%), Boneza (0.4%), and Murunda and Mushubati (0.3% each). 

4.3.4.1 Main source of drinking water

The results of 5RPHC 2022 reveal that improved water sources is the most water sources in Rwanda that represent (82.3%). In Rutsiro district, 61.2% of private households use improved water sources. At the sector level, the percentage of the private households using water from improved sources is highest in Kivumu (83.2%), and the lowest in Rusebeya (35.3%). The table below provides details:



4.3.4.2 Main type of toilet facility

The results of census reveal that the main types of toilet facility used by the private households in Rwanda are Pit Latrine with constructed floor slab used by one household (68.8%) and Pit Latrine with constructed floor slab used by several households (19.9%). The situation is the same as in Rutsiro district where Pit Latrine with constructed floor slab used by one household occupies 76.5%, Pit Latrine with constructed floor slab used by several households is 13.0% and Pit Latrine without constructed floor slab used by one household (7.2%). At the sector level, the percentages of households using pit latrine with constructed floor slab used by one household are high in Mushonyi (82.8%) and Musasa (81.5%) while it is low in Kivumu (72.8%%), For pit latrines with constructed floor slab used by several households, Kivumu (16.4%), Rusebeya (16.1%) and Nyabirasi (16.0%) are the sectors with the high percentage of private households using this kind of toilet. The high percentage of private households used by one household are in Rusebeya (14.2%) and Mukura (10.1%). The table below indicates the types of toilets facilities.



According the area of residence, the types of toilet facility used by the private households are pit latrine with constructed floor slab used by one household (77.3% in urban areas and 76.4% in rural areas), pit latrines with constructed floor slab used by several households(14.4% in urban areas and 12.9% in rural areas) and pit latrines without constructed floor slab used by one household(4.3% in urban areas against 7.4% in rural areas). 4.3.4.3 Mode of waste disposal in Rutsiro district

The results of the census reveal that, In Rutsiro district, the high percentage of households evacuate their waste buy sing household compost dumping (49.9%), 42.8% of private households evacuate their waste by throwing it in the household's fields or bushes while 5.4% evacuate their waste by putting them in public compost. At the Sector level, the high percentages of households evacuating their waste through the compost dumping are in Kivumu (67.4%), Kigeyo (56.7%), and Manihira (52.5%). Private households evacuate their waste by throwing them in the household's fields or bushes are most in Ruhango (58.3%) and Rusebeya (54.7%). The high percentages of private households by using public compost are in Murunda (8.9%). The table below indicates details:

The results of the census indicate the main modes of waste disposal used by the households. The main modes of evacuate waste disposal used by households in both urban areas and rural areas are household compost dumping (60.7% in urban areas against 49.3% in rural areas), throwing waste in household's fields/bushes (33.8% in urban areas against 43.3% in rural areas) and using public compost dumping (3.1% in urban areas against 5.5% in rural areas). 4.4 Assets possessed by private households in Rutsiro district

4.4.1 Communication assets possessed by private households in Rutsiro District

Other mode of

waste disposal

At the district level, 75.8% of private households possess a radio, 73.0% a mobile phone, 9.9% a smartphone, 4.1% a TV and 0.9% a computer. The percentages of private households possessing a radio and mobile phone are high in Boneza (84.7% for radio and 82.5% for mobile phone), Mushonyi (82.8% for radio and 80.8% for mobile phone), Kigeyo (81.7% for radio and 80.4% for mobile phone) and Musasa (80.0% for radio and 76.8% for mobile phone). The percentage of private households possessing a television is high in Boneza (7.6%) while it is low in Nyabirasi (1.7%). The sectors with high percentages of households with smartphone are Boneza (16.1%) and Gihango (13.0%) while the percentage of households possessing this asset is low in Rusebeya (5.6%). The computer is mostly possessed in Gihango (1.8%), Boneza (1.6%) and Murunda (1.4%). The table below provides details:

4.4.2 Access to the Internet


The results of the 5th RPHC-2022 indicate that the percentages of households with at least one member using internet are 22.2% at national level while they are 16.6% in Western Province and 11.0% in Rutsiro district. At sector level, the high percentages of households with at least one member using internet are high in Boneza (16.9%), Gihango (14.7%), Musasa (12.9%) and Kigeyo(12.7%). The sectors with the lower percentages of households with at least one member using internet are Rusebeya (7.2%) and Nyabirasi (7.4%). The table below presents details.

CHAPTER 5: AGRICULTURE IN RUTSIRO DISTRICT

The agriculture was the one of the areas of investigation of the 5th Rwanda Population and housing census conducted in 2022. The households engaged in Livestock husbandry; the number of private crop farming households cultivating different types of crops, by Sector, the number of private households raising different types of livestock, by Sector and type of household raised in district were captured in the census.

5.1 The households engaged in crop farming and livestock husbandly

The results of 5th RPHC 2022 revealed that Nationally, 2,280,854 of private households (68.9%) are engaged in agriculture, among them 62.6% are engaged in crop farming and 50.4% are engaged in Livestock husbandry. In Rutsiro district, Agricultural households represent 68.9% with 77.2% of households engaged in crop farming and 63.0% Households engaged in Livestock husbandry. At the sector level, the highest percentages of agricultural households are found in Mukura (91.3%) and Mushubati (89.1%) where crop farming are more represented with percentage of 87.0% and 85.6%. The high proportions of Households engaged in Livestock husbandry are in Mukura (73.3%) and Musasa (67.7%). The table below provides details:

5.2 Distribution of private household engaged in crop farming of different types of crops, by Sector

The results of 5th Population and housing census 2022 indicate that the most cultivated crops by the private households of Rutsiro District are maize, beans, fruits, sweet potatoes, cassava, banana, and Irish potatoes. Private households cultivated maize are more found in Mukura, Kivumu, Nyabirasi and Mushubati while beans are more found Mushubati, Mukura, Nyabirasi and Gihango. Fruits, banana, and sweet potatoes are more found in Mushubati, Musasa and Mukura. Boneza, Mushubati and Musasa have the high number Private households cultivated cassava. Rusebeya and Mukura have a high number of those cultivated Irish potatoes.

5.3 Distribution of private households engaged in raising different types of livestock, by Sector
