## Glossary

<b>Age-specific fertility rate (ASFR)</b>	Measures the annual number of births to women of a specified age or age group per 1,000 women in that age group.
<b>Agriculture</b>	This term is used to describe crops, livestock, and fishing activities.
<b>Armed robbery</b>	The taking of money or goods in the possession of another, from his or her person or immediate presence, by force or intimidation.
<b>Assets</b>	Assets are the property of a business. They may be classified as: Current assets; consisting of cash, stock and book debts; fixed assets; consisting of buildings, plants and machinery; and intangible assets being the value of good will or patents.
<b>Base period</b>	The reference period, to which a series of index numbers relate, this usually expressed as 100.
<b>BCG</b>	(Bacillus Camete Guerin) This is a vaccine against Tuberculosis.
<b>Board Money – (M3)</b>	This is equivalent to (M2) A plus foreign currency deposits.
<b>Broad Money – (M2)</b>	This consists of the currency in circulation, demand, time and savings deposits. The deposits are held by the private sector and exclude those held by the central government.
<b>Broad Money – (M2) A</b>	This is equivalent to (M2) plus certificates of deposits.
<b>Child Mortality Rate</b>	Number of deaths of children aged one year and above but below 5 years of age per 1,000 live births.
<b>Civil case</b>	A lawsuit brought to redress a private wrong such as breach of contract, encroachment, or negligence; or to enforce civil remedies such as compensation, damages, and injunction.
<b>Contraceptive Prevalence rate</b>	Is defined as the percentage of women of reproductive age who or whose sexual partner is currently using, any form of modern contraception method.
<b>Crime</b>	An offence for which one may be punished by law.
<b>Criminal case</b>	Prosecution by the State of a person or organization, for committing a public wrong considered an offense against the State. Standard of proof for crimes is higher than for civil wrongs (torts) and, for major crimes such as a murder, guilt must be established beyond a reasonable doubt (see proof beyond a reasonable doubt).
<b>Crude Birth Rate (CBR)</b>	The number of live births per 1,000 persons in a population in a year.
<b>Crude Death Rate</b>	Number of deaths per 1,000 populations in a given year.
<b>DPT</b>	This is a vaccine against three diseases namely: Diphtheria, pertusis (whooping cough) and Tetanus.
<b>Driving license</b>	Is an official document which states that a person may operate a vehicle, such as a motorcycle, car, truck, or a bus, on a public roadway.
<b>Economic activity</b>	Covers all market production and certain types of non-market production, including production and processing of primary products for own consumption, own-account consumption (owner occupied dwellings) and other production of fixed assets for own use.
<b>Economic Dependency Ratio</b>	Is measured as the ratio between economically dependent persons (sum of unemployed, inactive, and children aged five and under) and employed persons, multiplied by 100
<b>Employed persons</b>	Persons in paid employment who work for wage or salary in cash or in Kind or both and have a formal job attachment.
<b>Employment</b>	This includes all wage and salary earners and managers in all businesses, and directors actively working in incorporated businesses. It includes that working full-time or part-time and those who are permanent or temporary.
<b>Employment status</b>	Refers to the status of an economically active person with respect to

	his/her position at hi/her place of place of work and his/her her mode of remuneration.
<b>Enterprise</b>	This is a single legal entity or a combination of legal entities. It may also be a sole legal unit carrying out one or more activities at one or more locations it may also be several establishments.
<b>Establishment</b>	This is an economic unit engaged in one or predominantly one kind of economic activity under single ownership or control and is situated at a single physical location.
<b>Exports</b>	Outward flows comprising goods leaving the economic territory of a country to the rest of the world.
<b>Foreign reserves</b>	They consist of those external assets available to and controlled by the central Banks for direct financing of balance of payments imbalances, for indirectly Regulating the magnitude of such imbalances through the intervention in Exchange markets to affect the currency exchange rate, and/or for other purposes. Included are monetary gold, Special Drawing Rights (SDRs), reserve position in the fund, foreign exchange assets (consisting of currency, deposits and securities) and other claims.
<b>General Fertility Rate (GFR)</b>	Is defined as the number of live births per 1,000 women ages 15-49 years in a given year.
<b>General Hospitals</b>	These provide preventative, outpatient curative, maternity, inpatient health services, emergency surgery, blood transfusion, laboratory and other general services. They also provide in service training, consultation and research in support of community- based health care programmes.
<b>Gini Coefficient</b>	The Gini coefficient is a measure of statistical dispersion intended to represent the income distribution of a nation's residents.
<b>Gross Domestic Product</b>	The value of goods and services produced with in economic territory of the country.
<b>Gross Enrolment Rate</b>	The ratio of pupils in primary school (regardless of age) to the country total population aged 6- 12 years.
<b>Gross intake Rate</b>	The ratio of pupils enrolled in primary one regardless of age to country total population aged six years.
<b>Gross Output</b>	The production value as compiled from total receipts from industry and non-industry goods and services in an economy, adjusted for stock changes but excluding Excise Duty and Indirect taxes. This is Goss Output at factor cost.
<b>Health Centre</b>	Is a clinic staffed by a group of general practitioners and nurses. Typical services covered are family practice and dental care, but some clinics have expanded greatly and can include internal medicine, pediatric, women's care, family planning, pharmacy, lab, and more.
<b>Homicide</b>	The killing of one human being by another human being.
<b>Human trafficking</b>	The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person, for the purpose of exploitation. Exploitation shall include, at a minimum, the exploitation of the prostitution of others or other forms of sexual exploitation, forced labour or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery, servitude or the removal of organs.
<b>Illicit drug</b>	Illicit drugs are drugs that have been banned or made illegal by the government. These drugs are dangerous and can have many side effects, including death.
<b>Imports</b>	Inward flows of goods from the rest of the world into the economic territory of the country.
<b>Index Number</b>	A number that shows relative change in price or volume between the



	base period and another period.
<b>Industry</b>	This is an economic activity undertaken by a business establishment as specified in the ISIC.
<b>Infant mortality rate</b>	Infant mortality rate is the probability (expressed as a rate per 1000 live births) of a child born alive in a specified period dying before reaching the age of one.
<b>Injured persons</b>	Are accident victims having suffered trauma requiring medical treatment (with or without hospitalization).
<b>Insurance Policy</b>	Is a contract (generally a standard form contract) between the insurer and the insured, known as the policyholder, which determines the claims which the insurer is legally required to pay. In exchange for an initial payment, known as the premium, the insurer promises to pay for loss caused by perils covered under the policy language.
<b>Intermediate Consumption</b>	This is the value of goods and services that are used in the process of production of other goods and services rather than final consumption.
<b>Kerosene</b>	This is fuel used as illuminate for lighting and in some cases for cooking.
<b>Killed persons (in road accident)</b>	Are accident victims who die immediately or within thirty days following the accident. Before 1 January 2005, the time period considered was only six days.
<b>Labor force</b>	Currently active population aged 14 to 64 years who were “employed or unemployed” during the last 7 days.
<b>Labour force participation rate</b>	Ratio of all economically active persons aged 14 – 64 years to the total number of persons aged 14- 64 years.
<b>Large Business</b>	Business establishment employing 100 or more persons.
<b>Life Expectancy at Birth</b>	The average number of years a new born is expected to live given the prevailing deaths rates.
<b>Life insurance</b>	is a contract between an insured (insurance policy holder) and an insurer or assurer, where the insurer promises to pay a designated beneficiary a sum of money (the "benefits") upon the death of the insured person. Depending on the contract, other events such as terminal illness or critical illness may also trigger payment. The policy holder typically pays a premium, either regularly or as a lump sum. Other expenses (such as funeral expenses) are also sometimes included in the benefits.
<b>Literacy</b>	Is the ability to both read and write with understanding (self-reported)
<b>Loan</b>	A loan may be money or securities supplied by one party (the lender) to a second party (the borrower) in a transaction in return for a promised future payment by the borrower. Such transactions normally include the payment of interest due to the lender as per agreed repayment schedules between the two parties.
<b>Marital status:</b>	Personal status of each individual in relation to the marriage laws or customs of the country and defined in the Census in five categories: Never married: an individual who has never been in a union; Married: an individual who was in marital union at the moment of the Census, legally or not; Divorced: an individual who has been separated from his or her spouse through a court decision, according to legislation; Separated: an individual who has separated temporarily from his/her spouse and is awaiting the court decision; Widowed: a man or a woman who has lost his or her spouse by death, not yet remarried
<b>Maternal Mortality Rate</b>	The maternal mortality ratio (MMR) is the ratio of the number of maternal deaths during a given time period per 100,000 live births during the same time-period.
<b>Mean Age of Women at Childbearing (MAWC)</b>	The mean age at childbearing is the mean age of mothers at the birth of their children if women were subject throughout their lives to the age-

	specific fertility rates observed in a given year
<b>Minor</b>	In law, a <i>minor</i> is a person under a certain age—usually the age of majority—which legally demarcates childhood from adulthood. The age depends upon jurisdiction and application, but is generally 18 years old.
<b>National Referral Hospitals</b>	In addition to the services offered at regional referral hospital, they provide comprehensive specialist services and are involved in teaching and health research.
<b>Net Enrolment Rate</b>	The ratio of pupils in primary school aged 6 – 12 to the country total population aged 6 - years.
<b>Net Intake Rate</b>	The ratio of pupils aged six in primary one to the country total population aged 6 years.
<b>Non Traditional exports</b>	Refers to commodities other than traditional exports that have recently featured in Rwanda’ export trade.
<b>Occupation</b>	Refers to the nature of task and duties performed during reference period preceding interview by persons in paid employment, unpaid family work or self – employment jobs.
<b>One stop center</b>	Centers in charge of providing comprehensive response, care and support services for girls and boys, women and men who had survived gender based violence (GBV) or child abuse.
<b>Overdraft</b>	A type of a short term loan particularly used to supply short – term working capital to tide over the production cycle or finance for a seasonal requirements.
<b>Passengers</b>	Travelers in a car, bus, train, plane or ship who are not driving or part of the crew. These also include those embarked and disembarked.
<b>Pension</b>	A benefit, usually money, paid regularly to retired employees or their survivors by private businesses and federal, state, and local governments. Employers are not required to establish pension benefits but do so to attract qualified employees.
<b>Petrol</b>	This is a light hydrocarbon fuel used in positive ignition engines. Another name used for this type of fuel is premium motor spirit.
<b>Physical violence</b>	is the intentional use of physical force with the potential for causing death, disability, injury, or harm. Physical violence includes, but is not limited to, scratching; pushing; shoving; throwing; grabbing; biting; choking; shaking; slapping; punching; burning; use of a weapon; and use of restraints or one’s body, size, or strength against another person.
<b>Population Density</b>	Population per unit area. The number of people living per unit of an area (e.g. per square mile); the number of people relative to the space occupied by them.
<b>Prison</b>	Place where people are kept as a punishment for crimes or while waiting for trial.
<b>Prisoner</b>	A person kept in prison as a punishment for crime or waiting for trial.
<b>Private Households</b>	Consists of one or more persons living together and sharing at least one daily meal.
<b>Proportional morbidity ratio</b>	This is the proportion attributable to a given cause of illness. It is a proxy for the prevalence of sickness in a population.
<b>Psychological harassment</b>	A form of mistreatment in which there is intent to cause mental or emotional pain or injury; PH includes verbal aggression, statements intended to humiliate or infantilize, insults, threats of abandonment or institutionalization; PH results in stress, social withdrawal, long-term or recalcitrant depression, anxiety
<b>Public Liability Insurance</b>	a form of insurance, compulsory for any business in contact with the public, which pays compensation to a member of the public suffering injury or damage as a result of the policyholder or his employees failing to take reasonable care.
<b>Rape case</b>	The crime of forcing another person to submit to sex acts, especially

	sexual intercourse.
<b>Refined activities rate</b>	Is defined as the quotient between the total economically active population in a given period and the population in productive age groups during the same period.
<b>Regional Referral Hospitals</b>	In addition to the services offered at the general hospital, these hospitals offer specialties services such as psychiatry, ear, and throat (ENT), radiology, pathology, ophthalmology as well as higher level surgical and medical services, including teaching and research.
<b>Resident Population</b>	Persons who have lived for more than six months in the place where they were enumerated or who intended to live for more than six months in that place. They represent the population usually living in a place.
<b>Residents</b>	Persons whose usual residence is Rwanda including those whose nationality is not Rwanda.
<b>Retained Reserves</b>	This is the increase in value of a currency or the increase in value of fixed assets consisting mainly of freehold land and buildings.
<b>Revaluation reserves</b>	These kinds of reserves arise due to the revaluation of fixed assets but cannot be paid out as dividends because they are not realized profits.
<b>Road accident</b>	A road accident refers to any accident involving at least one road vehicle, occurring on a road open to public circulation, and in which at least one person is injured or killed. Intentional acts (murder, suicide) and natural disasters are excluded.
<b>Sex ratio</b>	Is the number of males per 100 females in the population.
<b>Sexual violence</b>	Sexual violence (SV) is any sexual act that is perpetrated against someone's will. SV encompasses a range of offenses, including a completed nonconsensual sex act (i.e., rape), an attempted nonconsensual sex act, abusive sexual contact (i.e., unwanted touching), and non-contact sexual abuse (e.g., threatened sexual violence, exhibitionism, verbal sexual harassment). All types involve victims who do not consent, or who are unable to consent or refuse to allow the act.
<b>Standardized Death Rates (%)</b>	is a ratio between the observed number of deaths in an study population and the number of deaths would be expected, based on the age- and sex-specific rates in a standard population and the age and sex distribution of the study population.
<b>Teaching Services</b>	Teaching services comprises of teachers of primary schools, secondary schools, commercial and technical colleges and institutions.
<b>The mean age at first marriage.</b>	Is the mean age of men or women at first marriage if subject throughout their lives to the age-specific marriage rates of first marriages only in a given year.
<b>Total Fertility Rate (TFR)</b>	It measures the average number of births a group of women would have by the time they reach age 50 if they were to give birth at the current age-specific fertility rates.
<b>Trade Balance</b>	A Trade Balance, or Balance of Trade, is the difference between the monetary value of exports and imports of a specific country's economic output over a certain period of time. It is one of many economic fundamentals that affect the relative value of a country's currency. A positive or favorable balance of trade is known as a trade surplus when exports exceed imports.
<b>Traditional Civil Servants</b>	These are employees of line ministries and self-accounting government departments.
<b>Traditional Exports</b>	Refers to long term export cash crops introduced to Rwanda long time ago, that is coffee and Tea.
<b>Treasury Bill</b>	These are short- term bearer securities with maturities of 91 days, 182 days, 273 days or 364 days issued by Bank of Rwanda.
<b>Under Five Mortality Rate: (%)</b>	It is the probability (expressed as a rate per 1000 live births) of a child born alive in a specified period dying before reaching the age of five, if

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	subject to current age-specific mortality rates.
<b>Underemployment</b>	Refers to persons who work less than 40 hours per week, but were willing and available to work additional hours within the last seven days.
<b>Value added</b>	The value of outcome when the factors of production interact to avail goods and services. Value added is the difference between the value of gross output and the value of intermediate inputs. Value added comprises of the following:
<b>VAT</b>	Is a form of consumption tax? From the perspective of the buyer, it's a tax on the purchase price. From the seller's perspective, it's the tax only on the value added to a product, material or service.
<b>Wage Bill</b>	<p>All cash payment made by employers in return for labor provided by the employees. The payment includes salaries and wages, overtime, holiday pay, bonuses, commissions, sick leave and any other allowances paid in cash to the employees.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Compensation of employees</li> <li>➤ Consumption of fixed capital (depreciation)</li> <li>➤ Licenses</li> <li>➤ Interest</li> <li>➤ Operating surplus (usually) net profit or loss and other small items.</li> </ul>

**The Fourth Population and Housing Census (RPHC4):** It has been conducted in August 2012 and has shown that the total population was 10,515,973, females represent 51.8% of the total population. Rwanda experienced a significant socioeconomic and health transformation over the last 10 years, where life expectancy increased from 51 years in 2002 to 64 years in 2012. The population density reached 415 inhabitants per square kilometer in 2012.

**MDG's, EICV and DHS indicators:** In this chapter of survey statistics indicate how far Rwanda is toward MDG's target through EICV and DHS data. Over the last 5 years, poverty falls significantly from 56.7 percent to 44.9 percent. Likewise maternal mortality rate and child mortality reached 476 per 100,000 and 76 per 1000 respectively against MDGs targets of 268 in maternal mortality rate and 50 in child mortality rate to be achieved in 2015.

**Health and Nutrition:** According to the Ministry of Health report, health facilities increase from 750 in 2011 to 862 in 2012 which is an increase of 14.9%. In 2012 the population per one doctor is 15,428 which represent an increase of 9% from the previous year (2011). HIV prevalence among pregnant women is 1.18%.

**Education:** Increase occurs in Net enrollment from 95.9% in 2011 to 96.5% in 2012 in primary school and 25.7% to 28% in secondary school in same period. In high education learning, the number of students has increased from 73,674 from 2011 to 76,629 in 2012.

**Environment:** CO<sub>2</sub> gas emission per capita is estimated at 0.94 in 2012; the temperature varies around 20.17 and 19.84 degree Celsius in last five years. In 2012 the area of natural forests is evaluated at 258,066.67 hectares and 404,227.40 hectares for all areas covered by forest plantations. In land management and mapping, 99.8% of parcels have been demarcated and adjudicated and 59% vectorized. The main mineral exported from Rwanda is cassiterite with 4,636,642 kg in volume. The total exported volume of minerals is 7,588,282 kg in 2012.

**Agriculture:** Production of cash crops fluctuates during the last five year especially the coffee production decreased from 19,319 tons in 2010 to 16,372 tons in 2011, and increased to 19,955 tons in 2012, and a decrease occurs also in tea production from 24,066 tons in 2011 to 22,502 tons to 2012. Average market prices for rice and beans are respectively 719Frw and 324Frw in 2012 from 579Frw and 313Frw respectively in 2008.

**Water and Electricity production:** In 2012, the production of electricity increased at 13.74% and the number of electricity customers increased at 27.84%. At the same time, the water production increased at 17.97% and the number of water customers 8.32%.

**Transportation and Communication:** The number of commercial passengers has been 488,903 in 2012 against 377,327 in 2011. The number of vehicles increased also from 105,324 in 2011 to 124,938 in 2012. The mobile phone penetration has increased from 41.48 % in 2011 to 53.1 % in 2012.

**Travel and Tourism:** 87 % of visitors in 2012 have used the land mode of transport. 87% of visitor arrivals in Rwanda are from Africa. 47% of tourists in Rwanda visited Volcanoes National Park and only and 23 % of them is Rwandans.

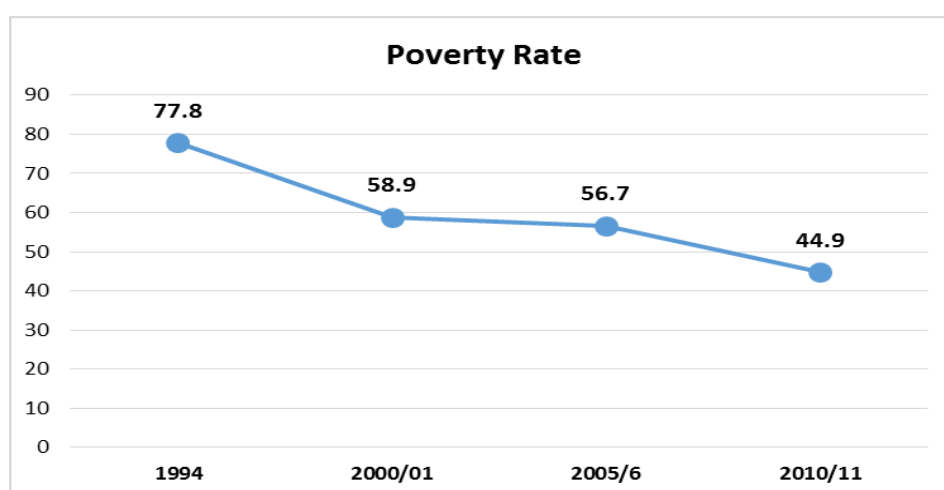
**Income, Expenditure and wealth:** In the year 2012, GDP at current prices was Rwf 4,363 billion, up from Rwf 3,828 billion in 2011. By shares, 45% of GDP was generated by the tertiary sector (services) compared to 33% generated by the primary sector Agriculture.

**Prices Indexes:** From January 2012 to December 2012, a slight evolution occurs in CPI from 112.17 to 116.93. The PPI evolution came from 174.0 in January to 179.3 in December 2012.

**Banking, Insurance and Finances:** In banking, the new authorized loans by sector of activities and maturity, the commercial & hotels sector is the most activity interested by the loan bank which evaluated at Rwf 201.5 billion out of Rwf 498.5 billion loans delivery in 2012.

**Business Enterprise and Foreign Trade:** In 2012, the most part of world interacted with Rwanda is Asia in the import exchanges by 638.2 millions USD, and Africa in export exchanges by USD 473.81 million.

**Law enforcement, Court and Order:** In 2012, 69,354 cases have been judged and 67,304 new cases have been reported in 2012. In 2012, 62,984 driving licenses have been delivered by National Police; 57,349 to male and 5,635 to female.

Figure 1.1 Resident Population.

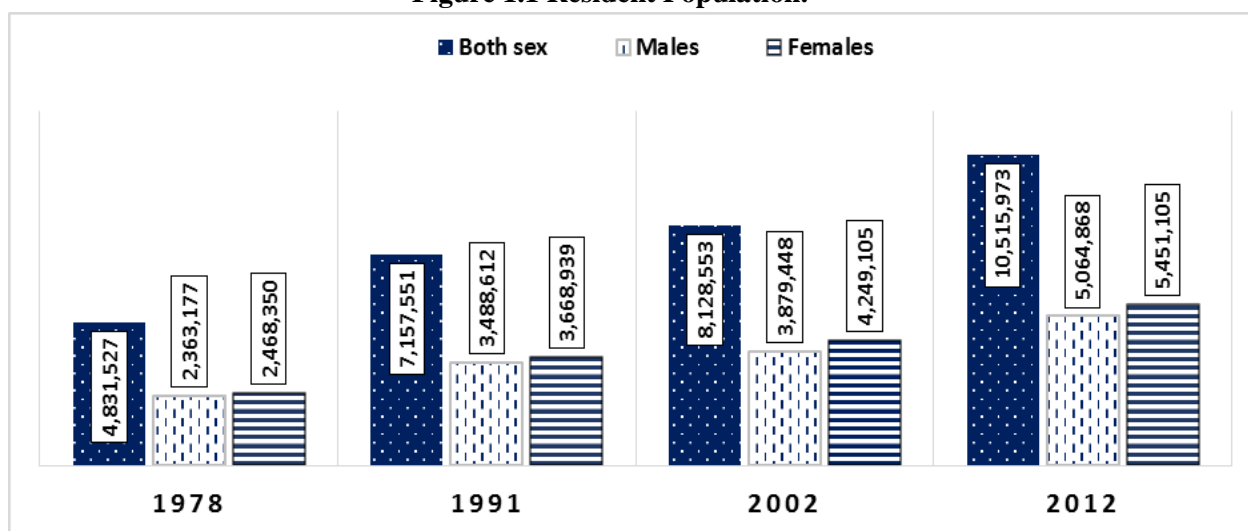


Figure 1.2 Average annual growth rate of resident population (%)

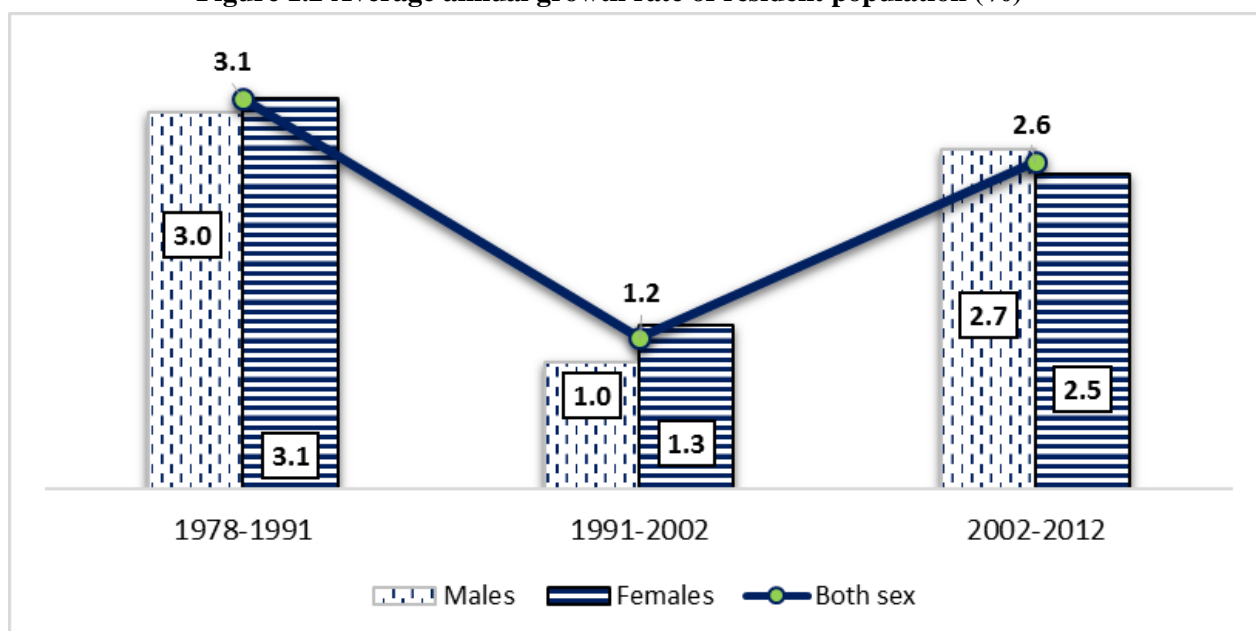


Figure 1.3 Life expectancy at birth

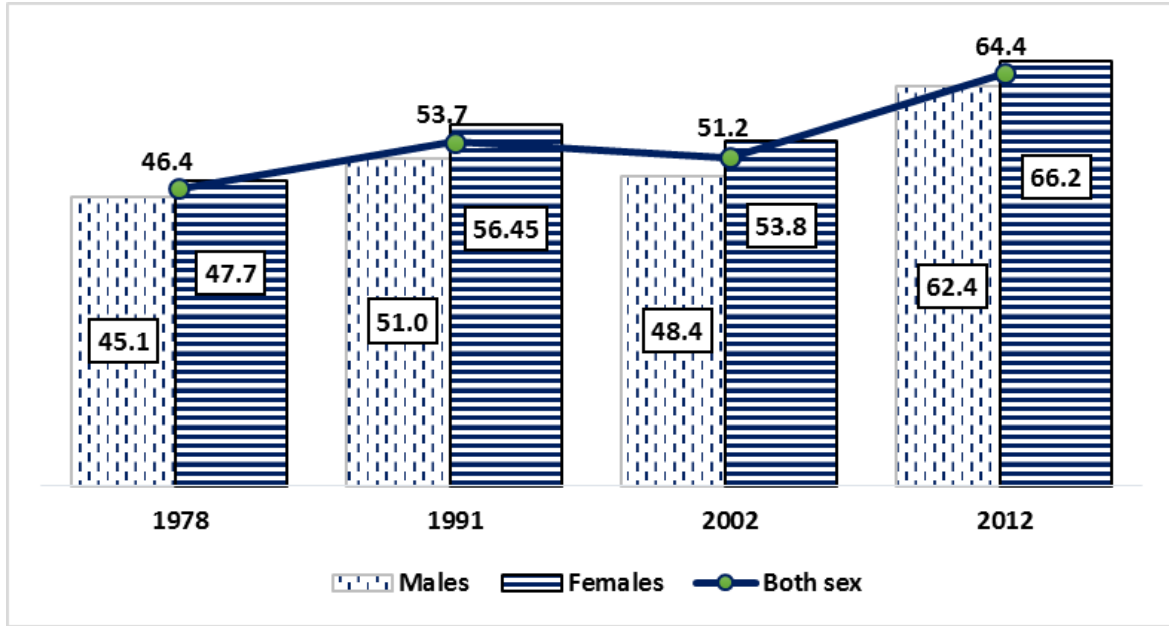
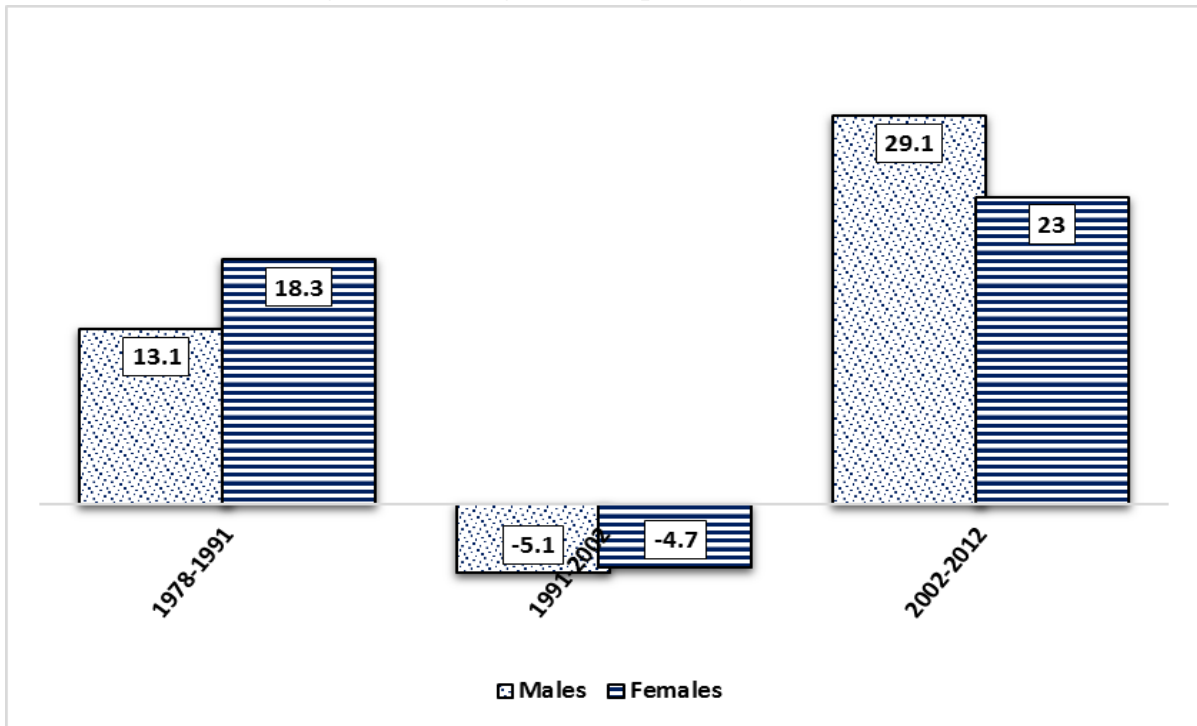
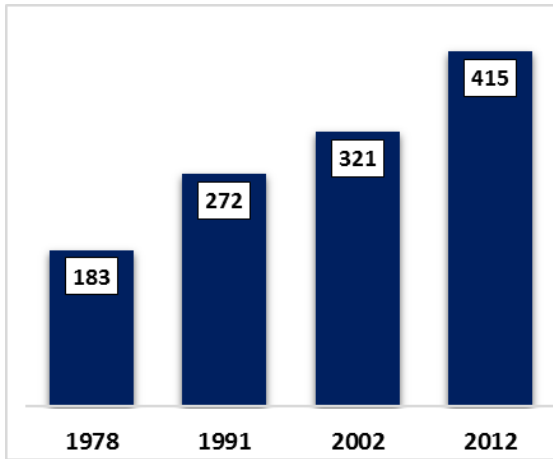


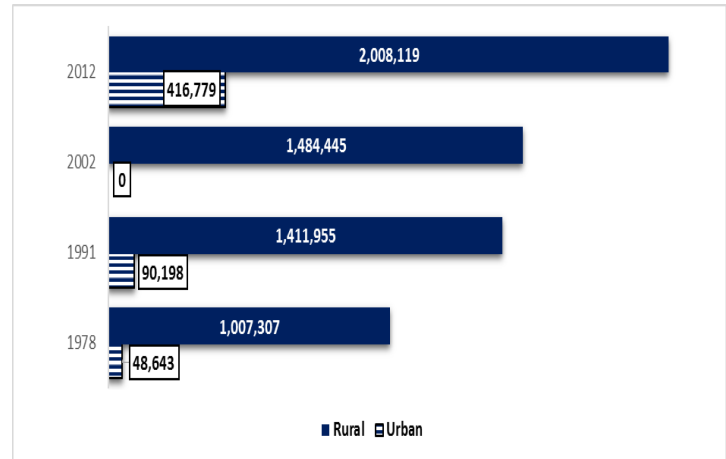
Figure 1.4 Change in life expectancy at birth (%)



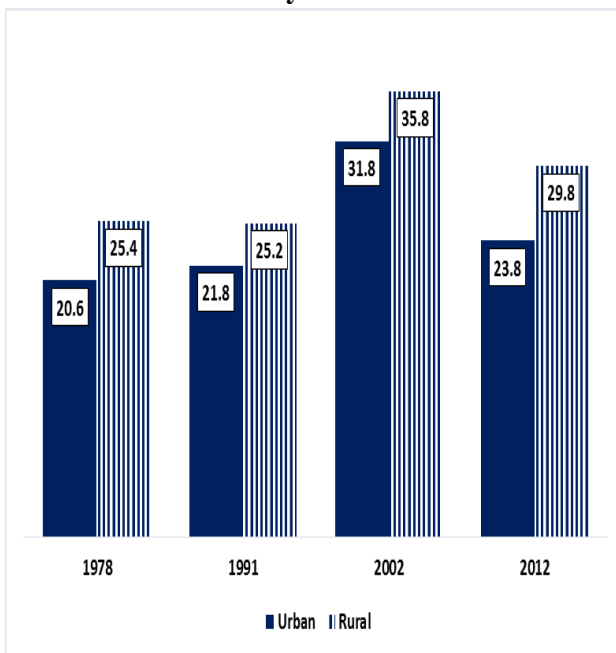
**Figure 1.5 Population Density**

**Figure 1.8 Percentage of Elderly population (60 +)**

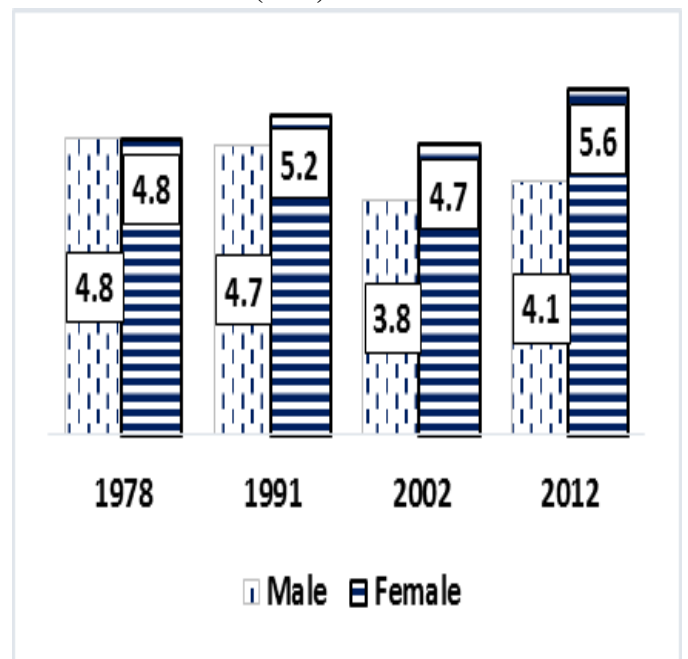




Figure 1.9 Percentage of households possessing following assets

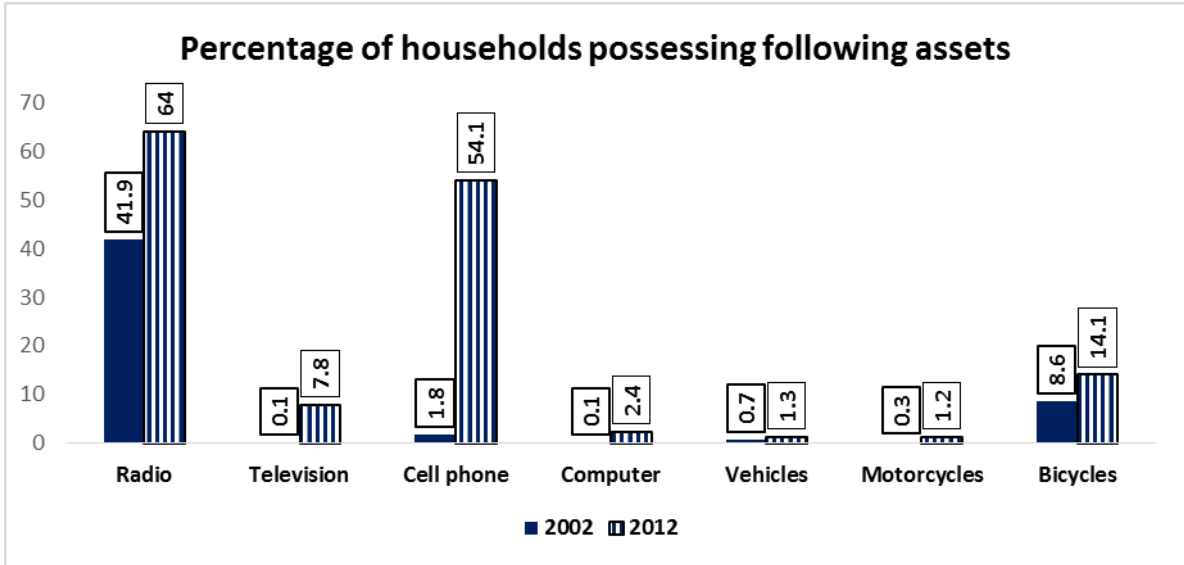


Figure 1.10 Level of education

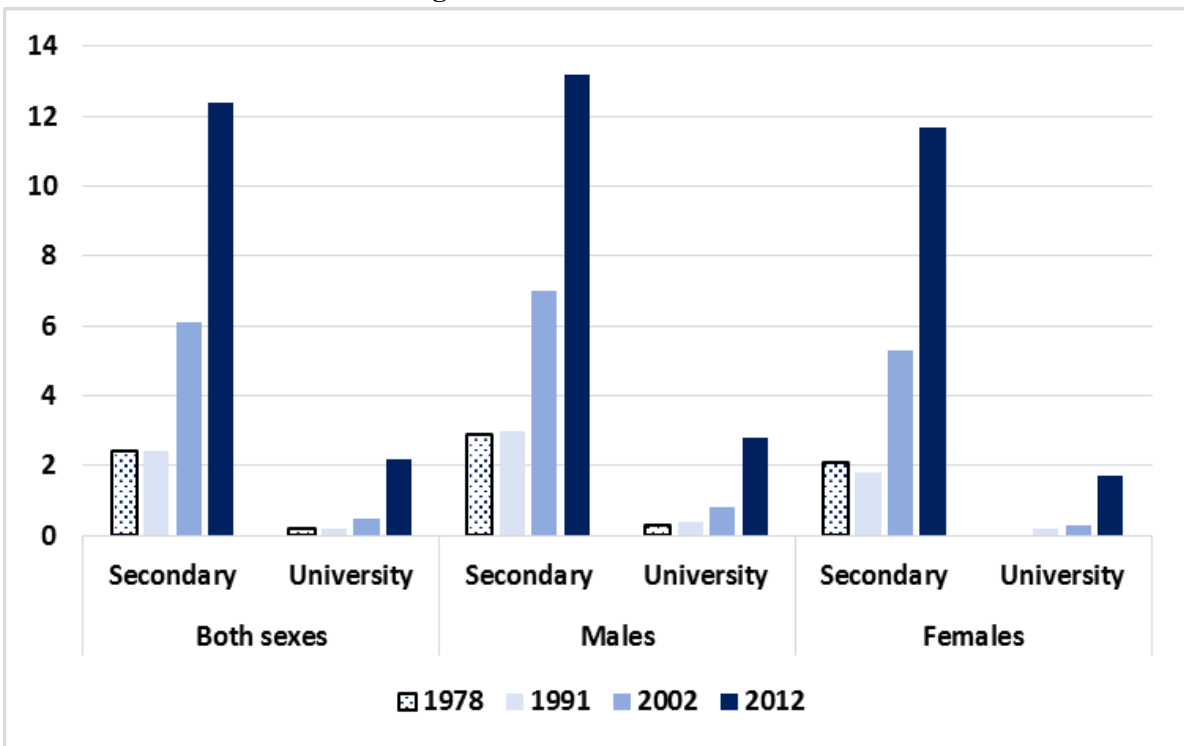


Figure 1.11 Trend in Fertility

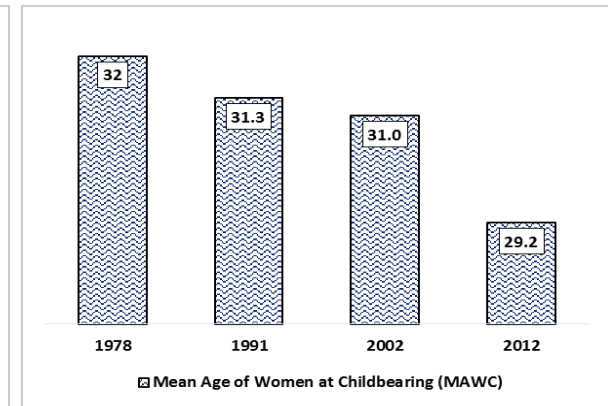
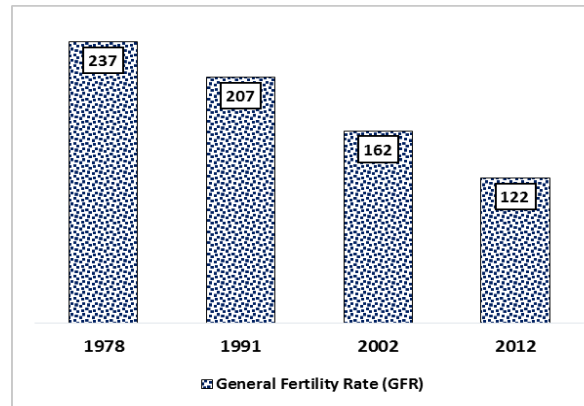
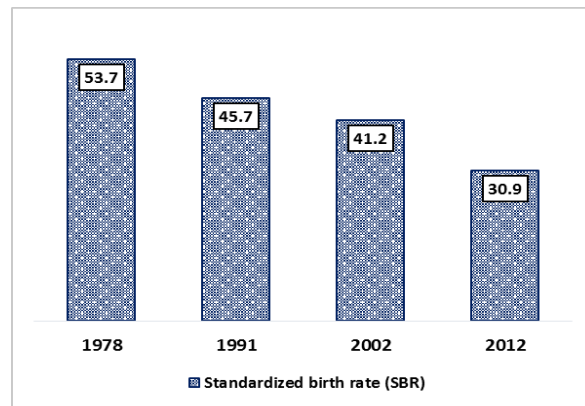
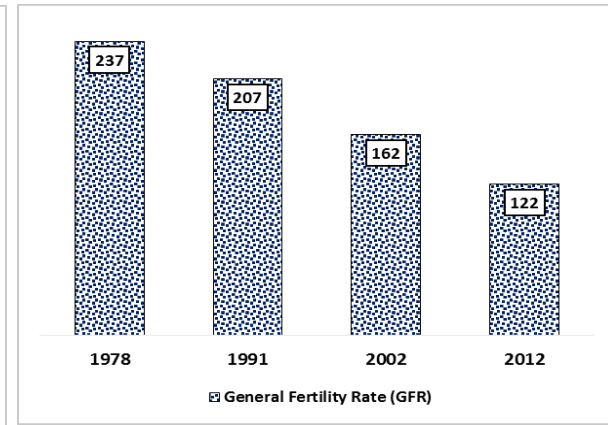
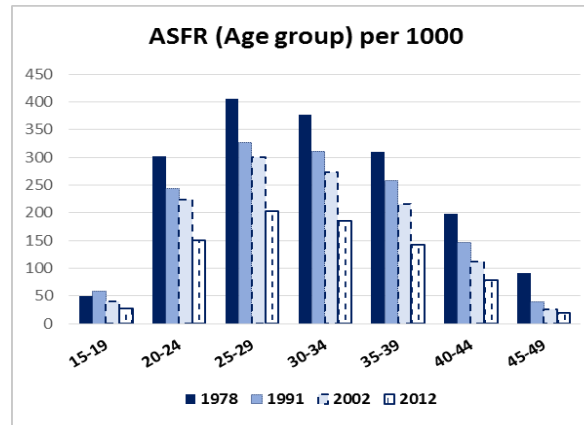
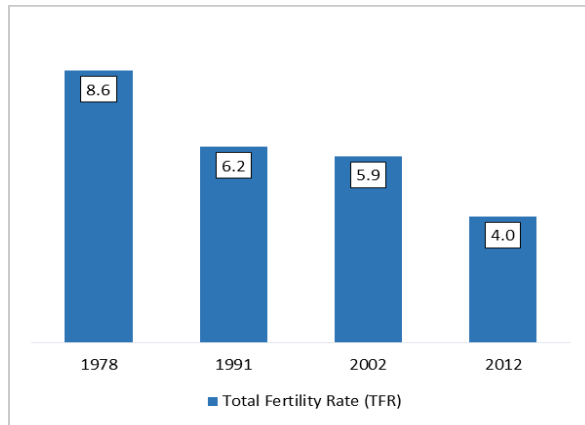


Figure 1.12 Trend in Mortality

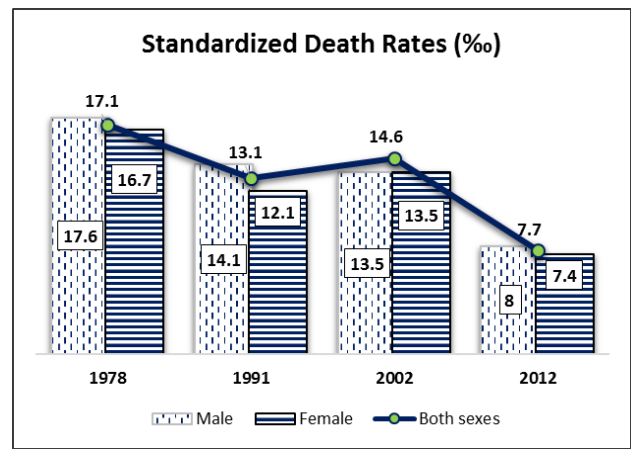
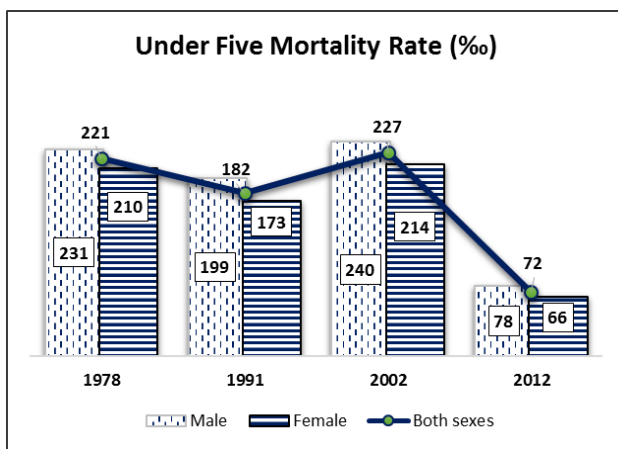
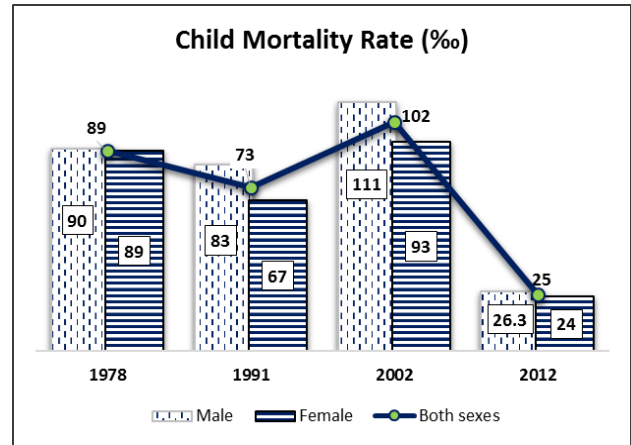
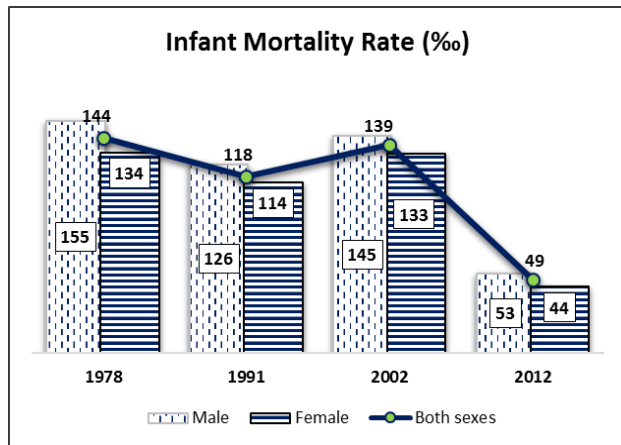
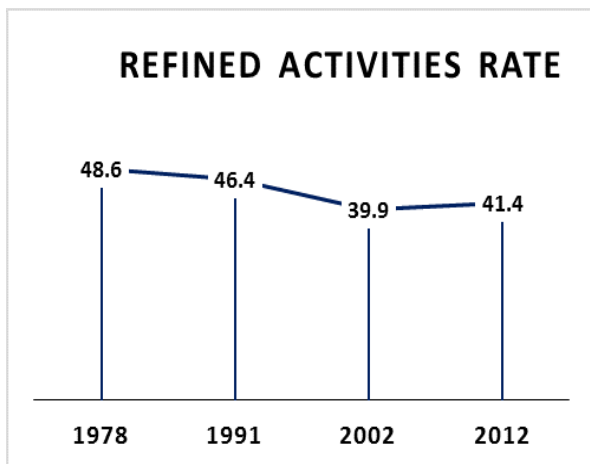
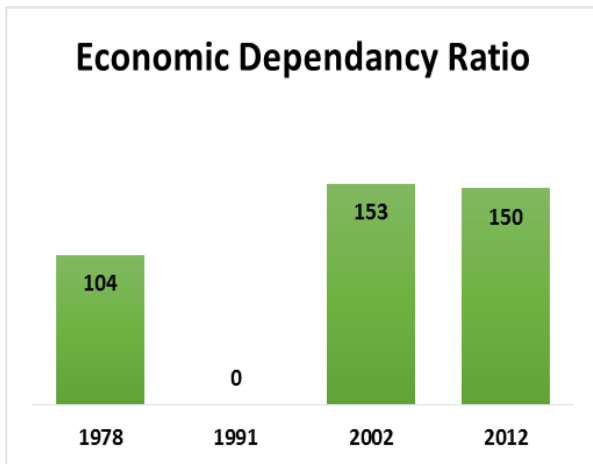
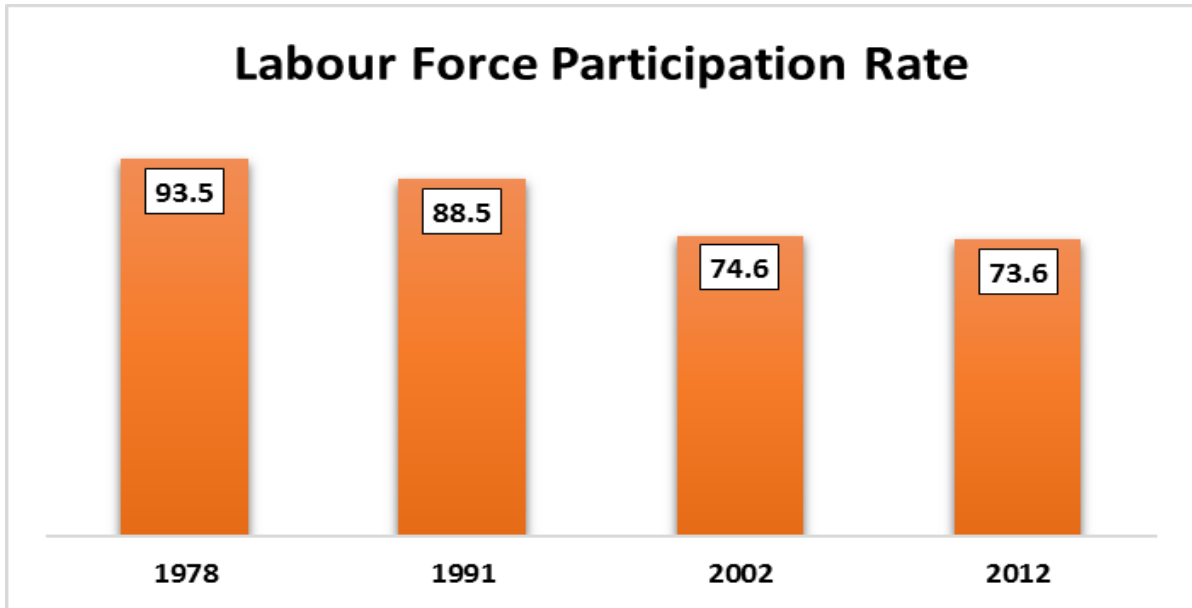


Figure 1.13 Labour Force

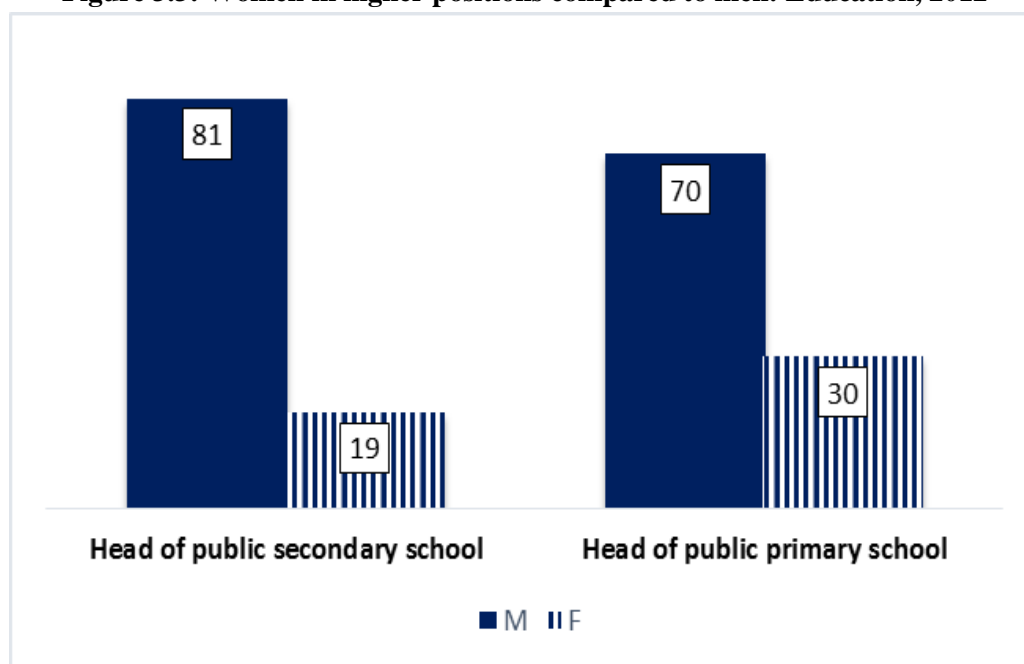
**Figure 3.1: Women in higher positions compared to men: General Prosecutor, 2012**

**Figure 3.3: Women in higher positions compared to men: Education, 2012**

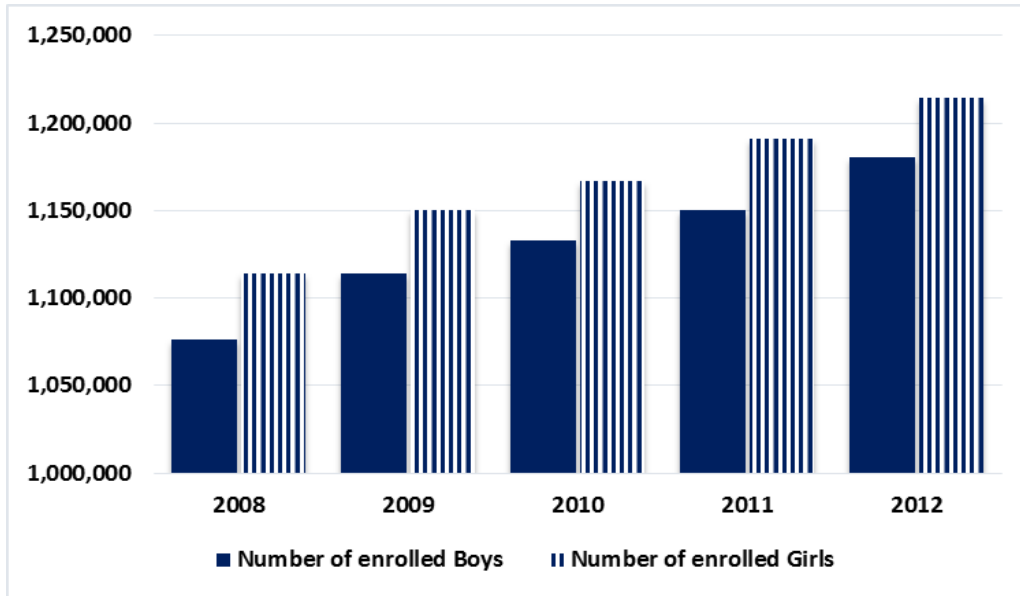

**Figure 3.4: Primary education enrollment**

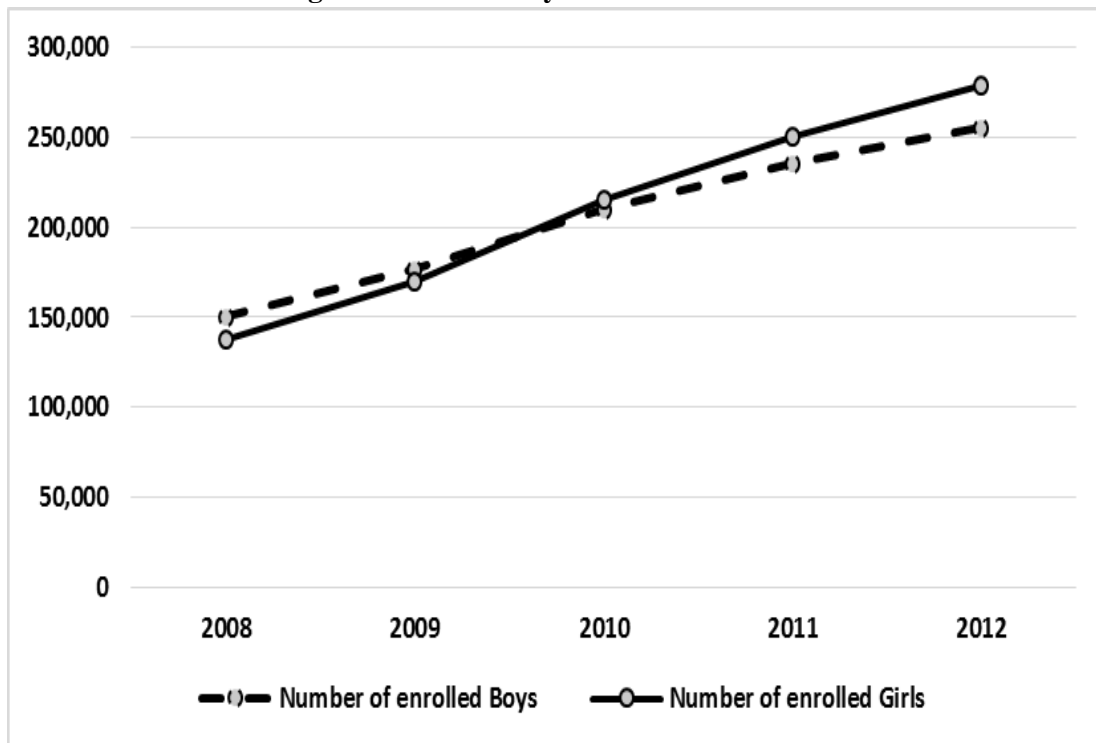

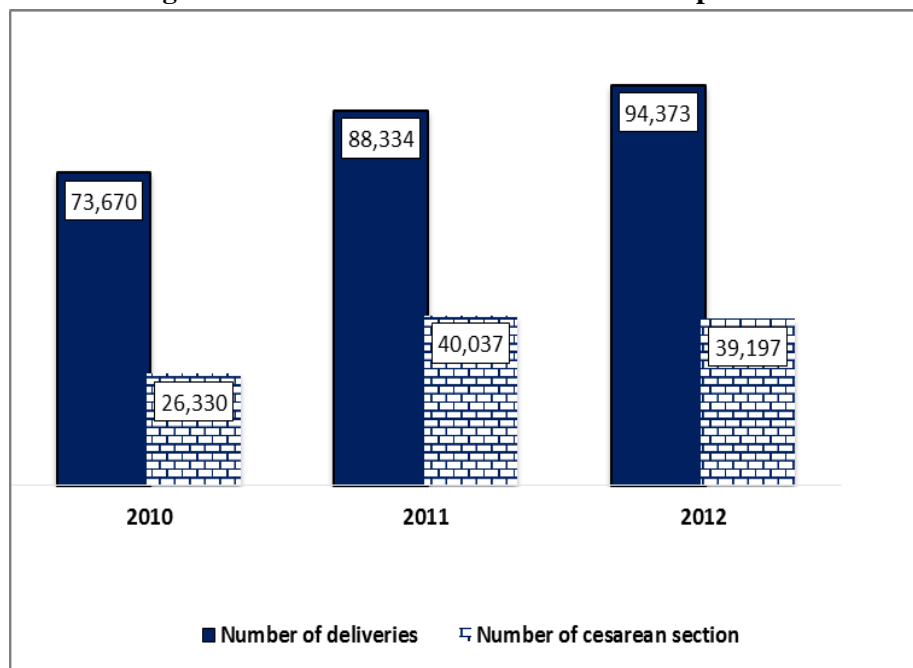

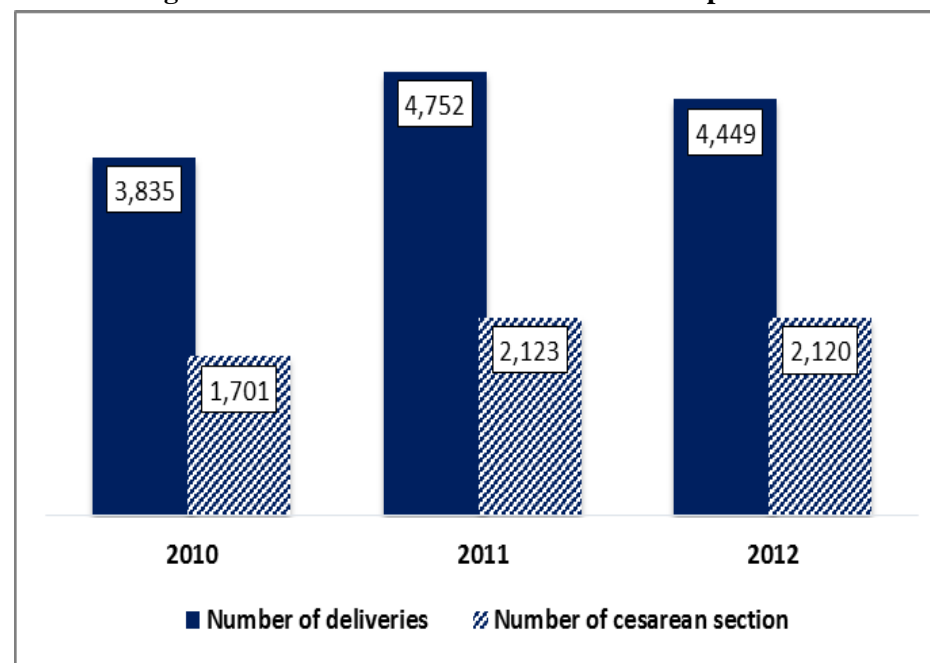

**Figure 4.2: Caesarian sections in referral Hospitals**

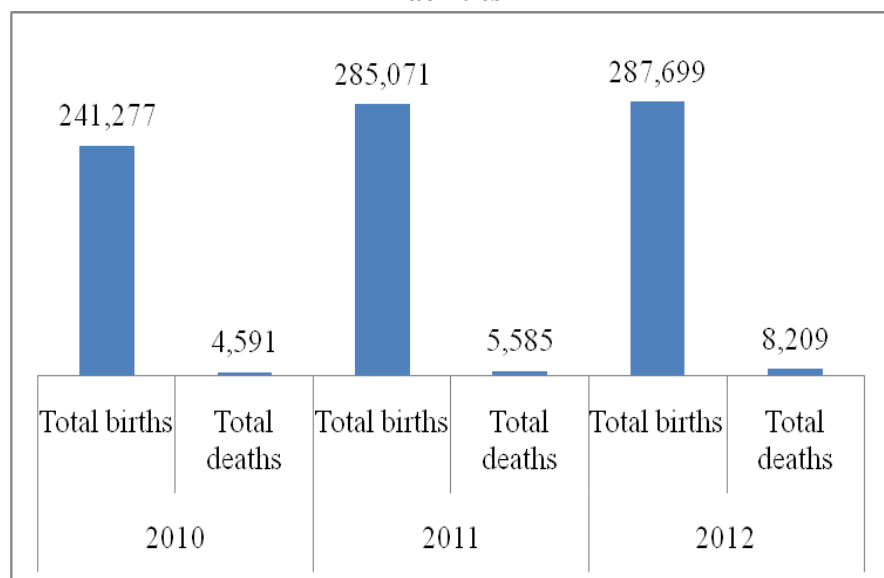

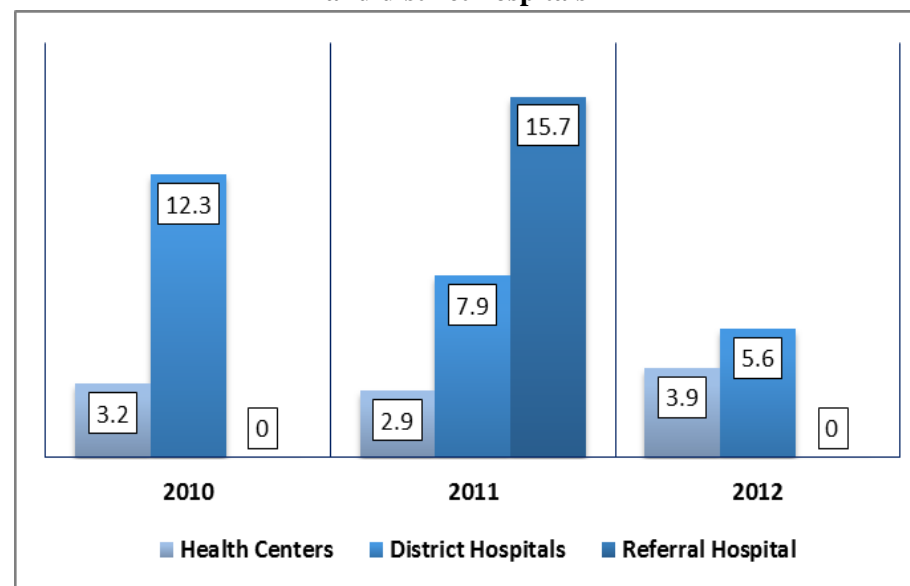

**Figure 4.4: % of low BW in public health centers, referral hospitals and district hospitals**



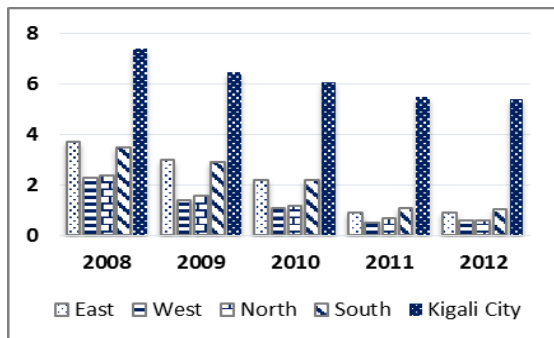

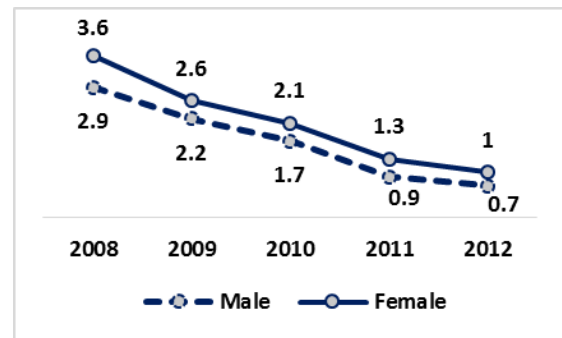

Figure 4.7: HIV voluntary tested by sex in 2010 to 2012

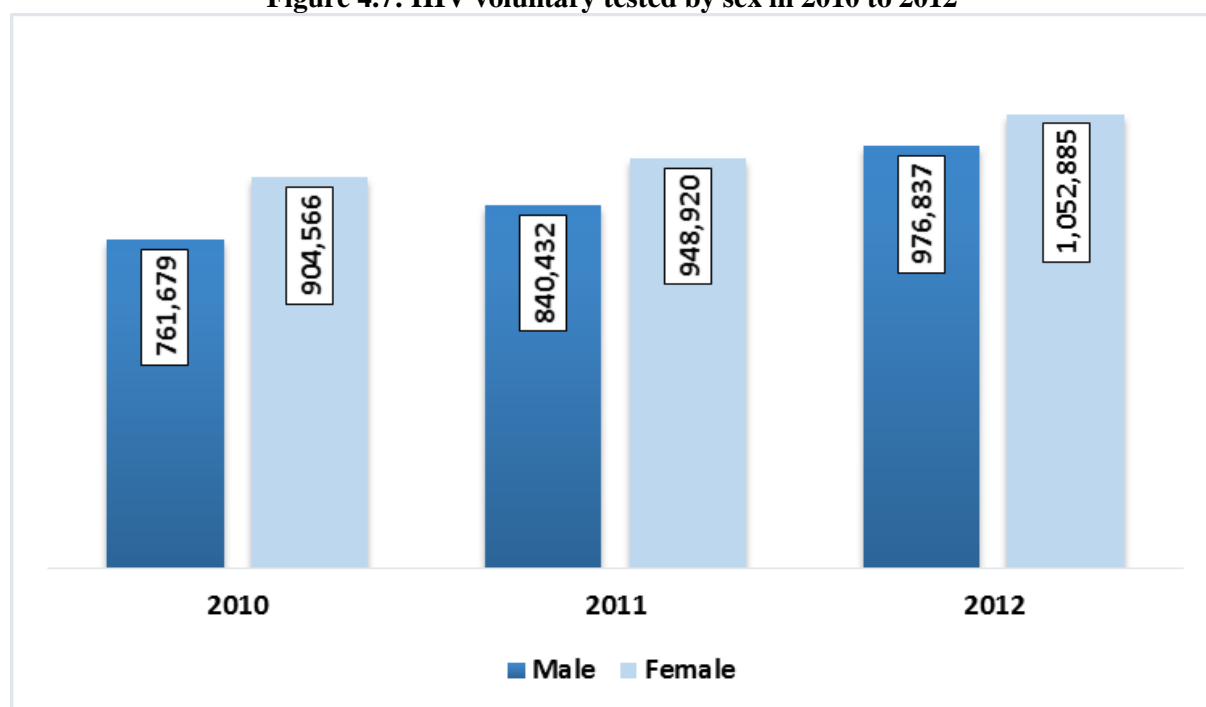

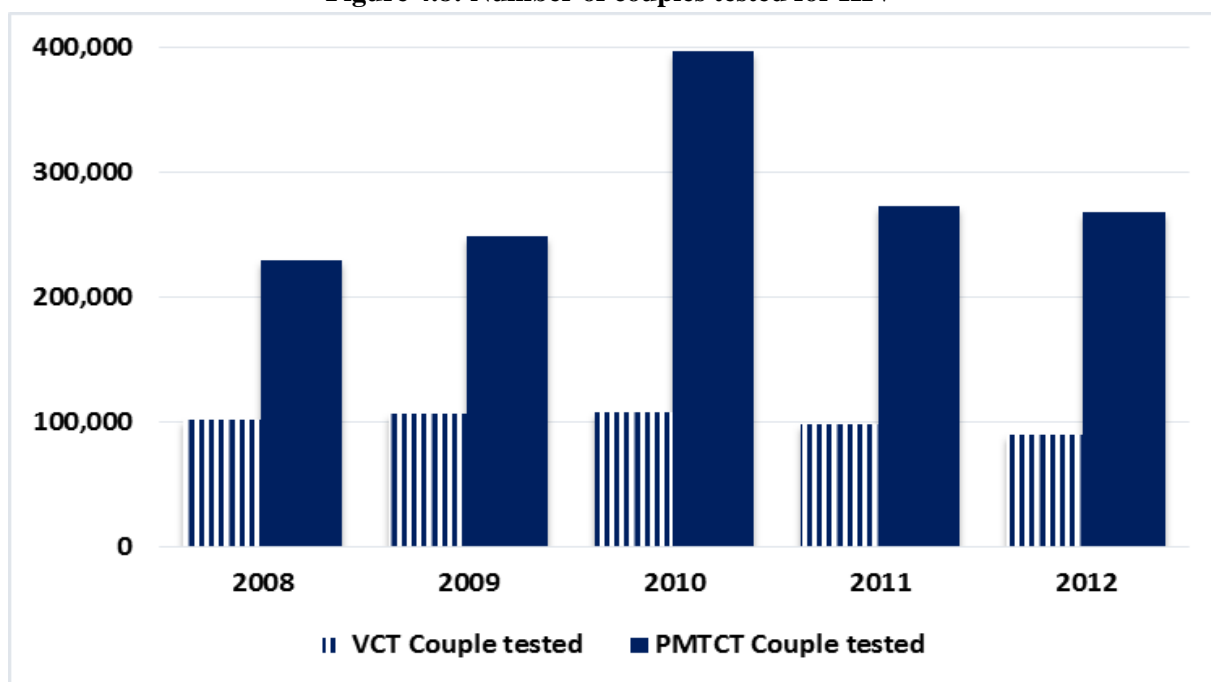

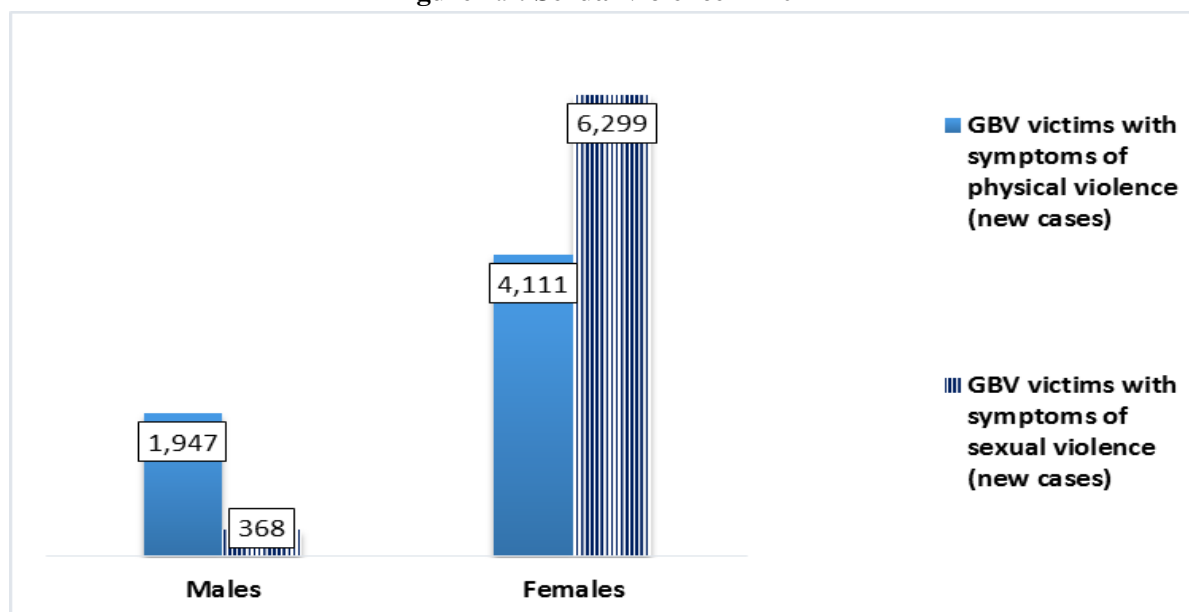

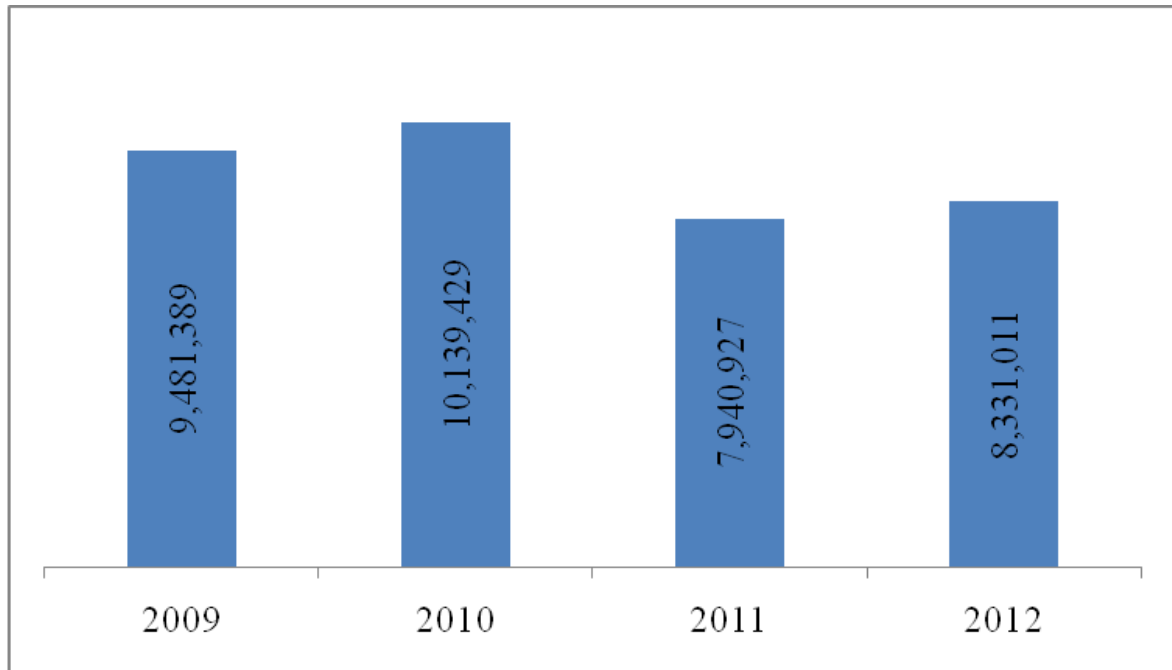

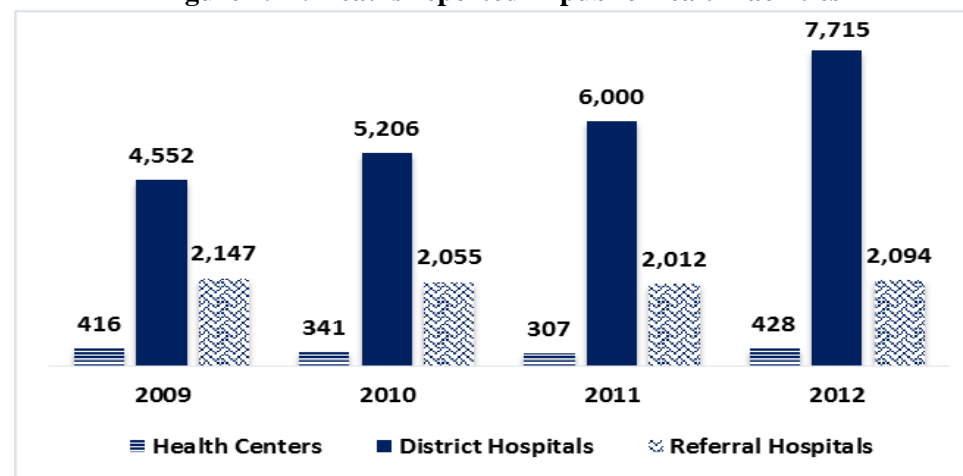

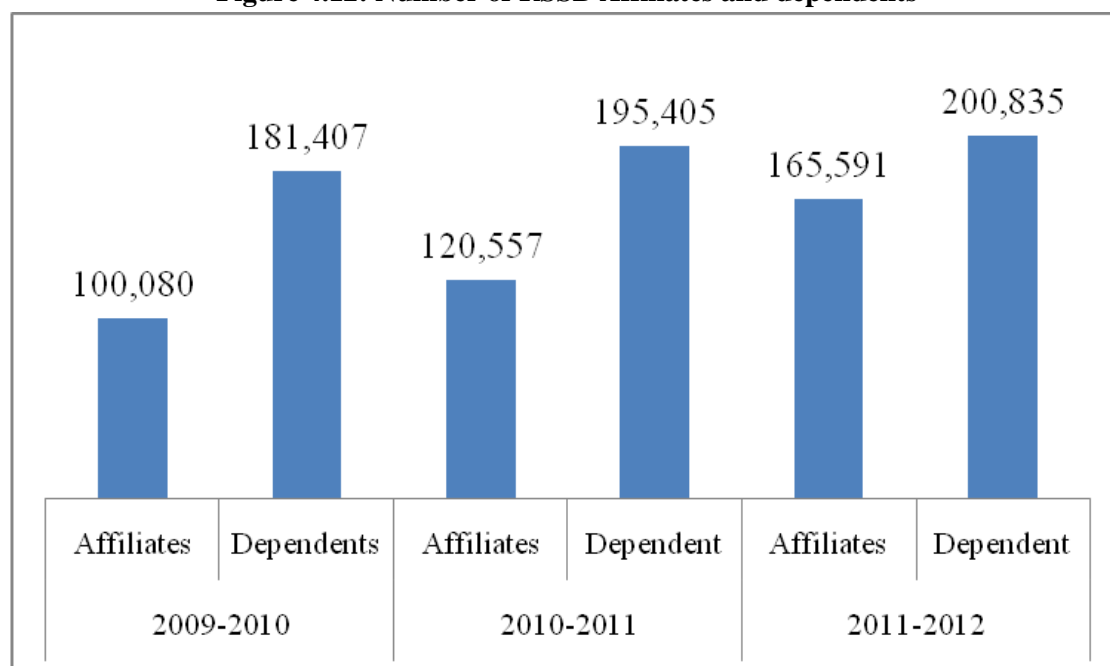

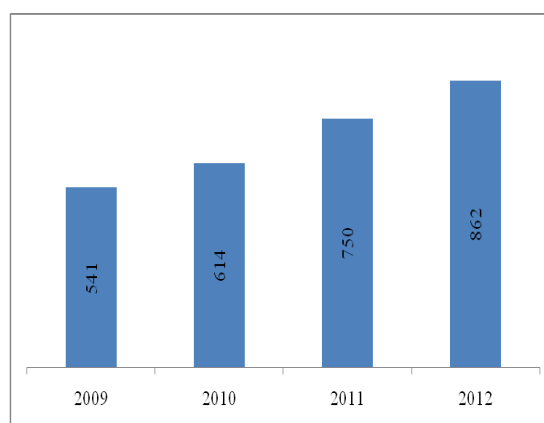

**Figure 4.13: Number of Health Facilities**

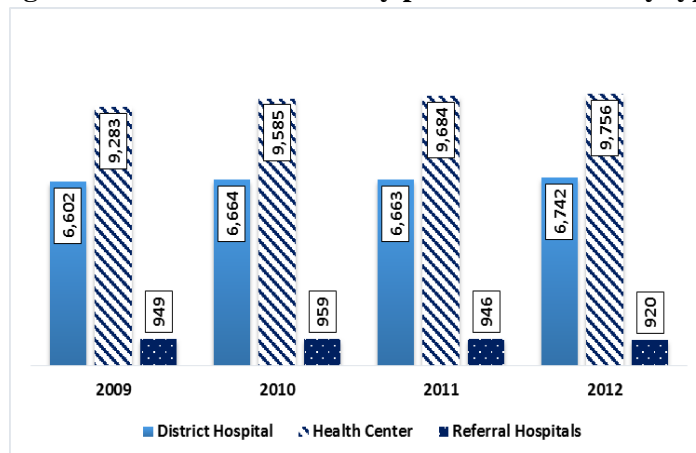

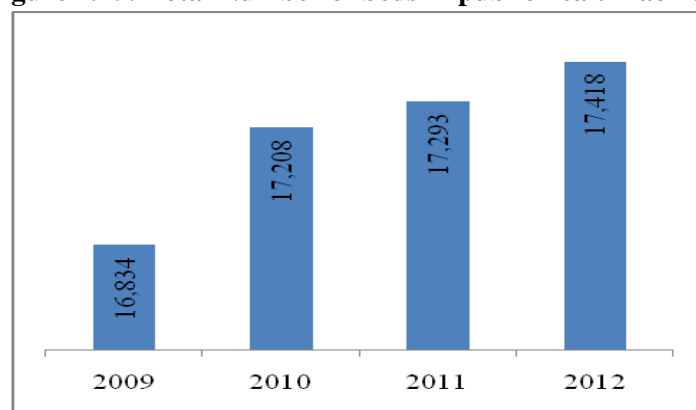

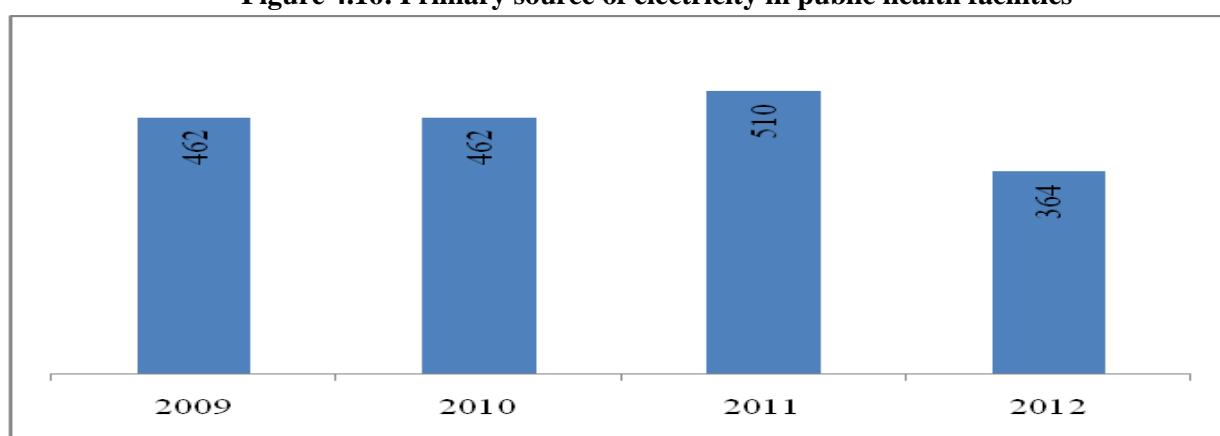

**Figure 4.16: Primary source of electricity in public health facilities**

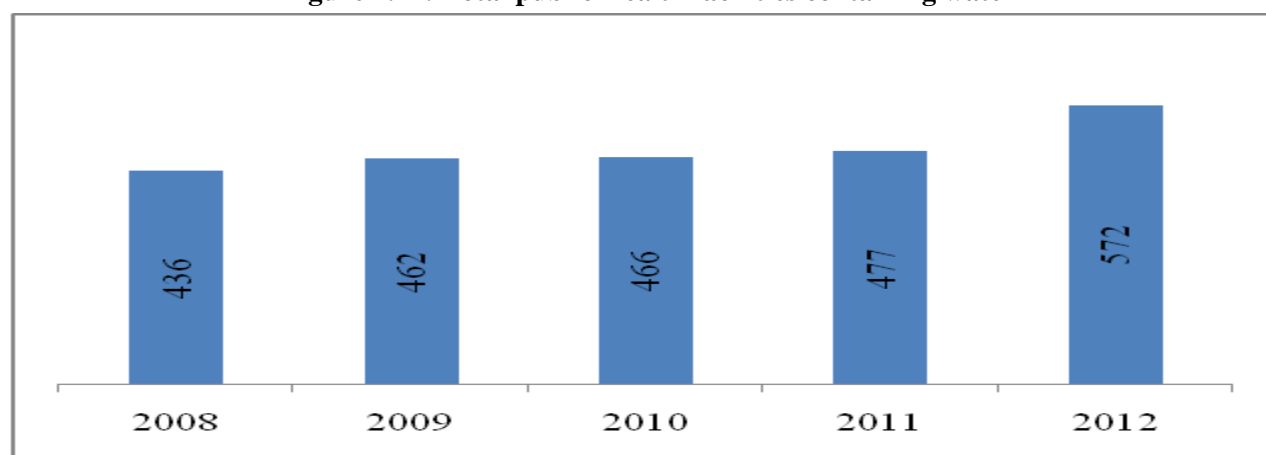

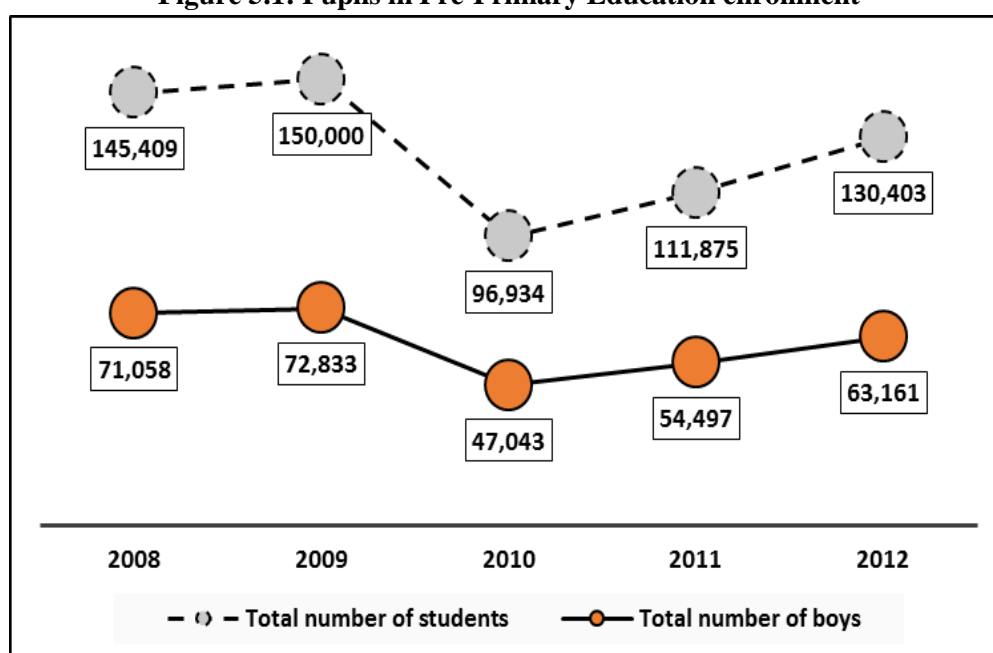

**Figure 5.1: Pupils in Pre-Primary Education enrollment**



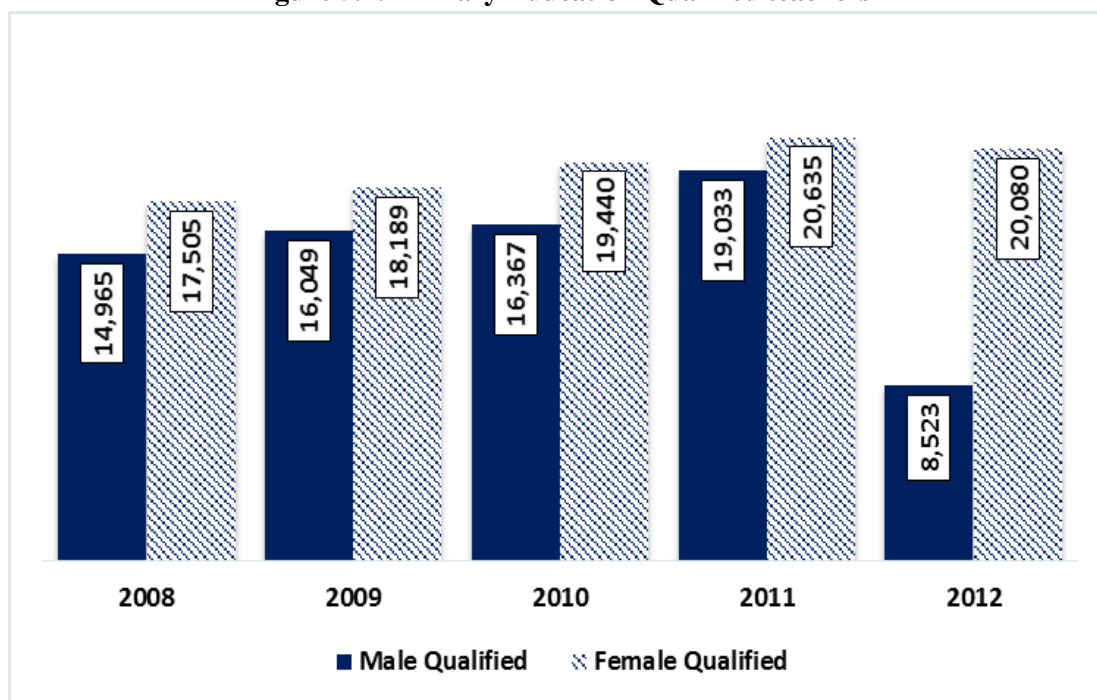

**Figure 5.2: Primary Education Qualified teachers**

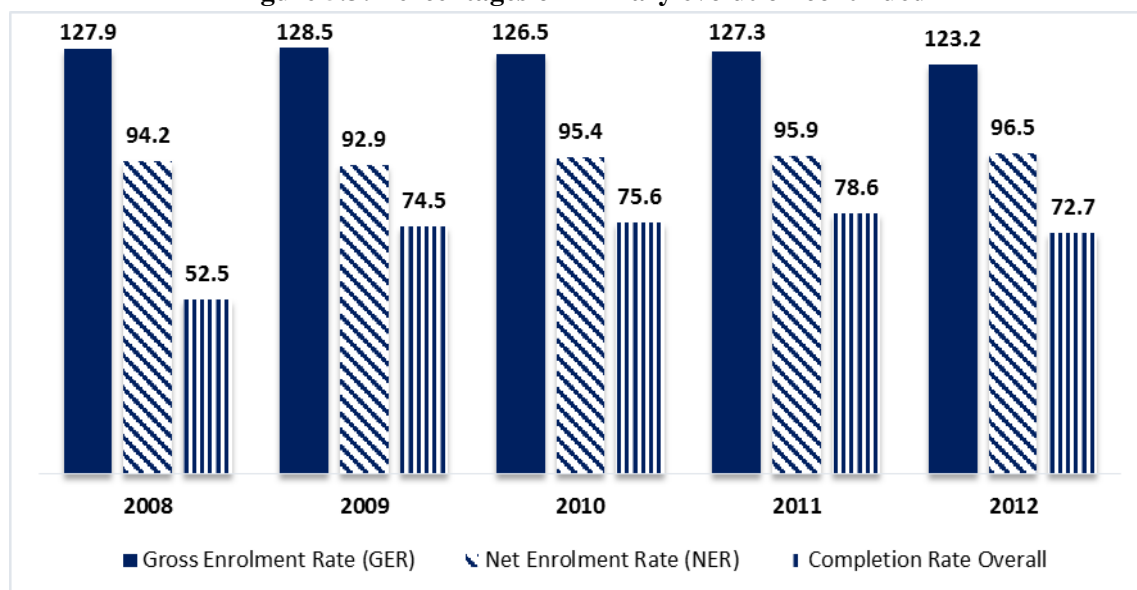

**Figure 5.3: Percentages of Primary evolution continued**



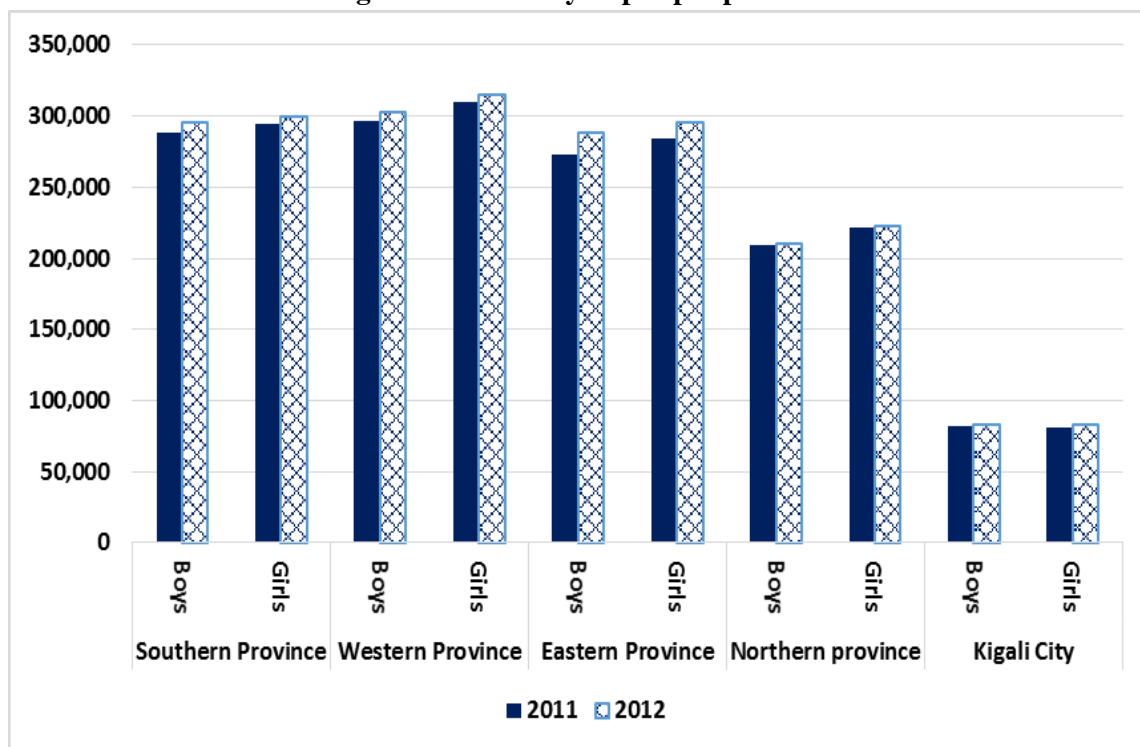

Figure 5.4: Primary Pupils per province

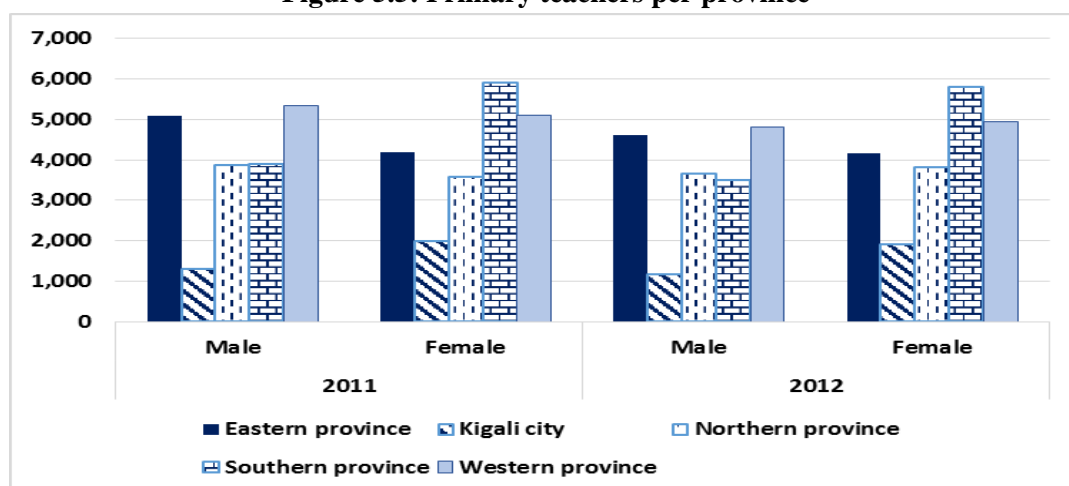

**Figure 5.6: Primary Schools per province**

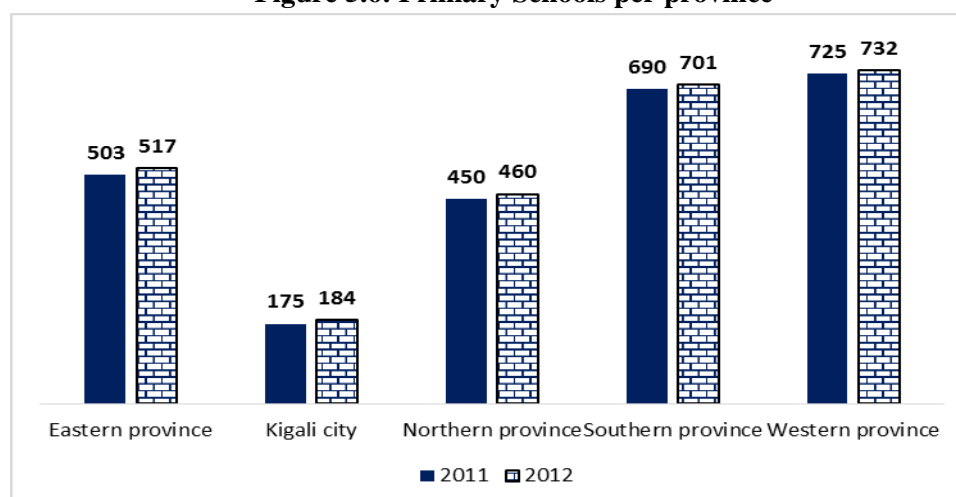




Figure 5.7: Primary Classrooms per province

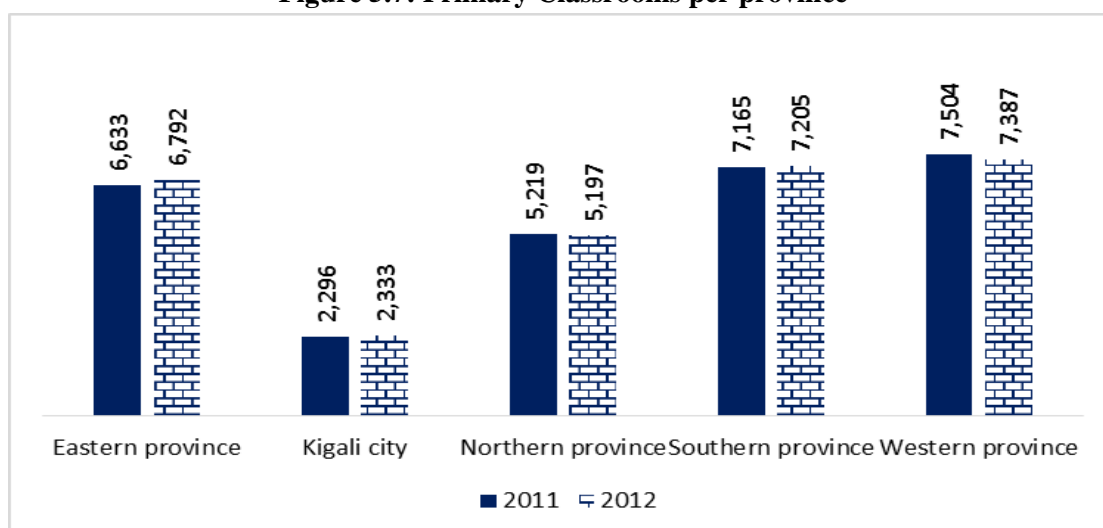


Figure 5.8: Primary Desks per province

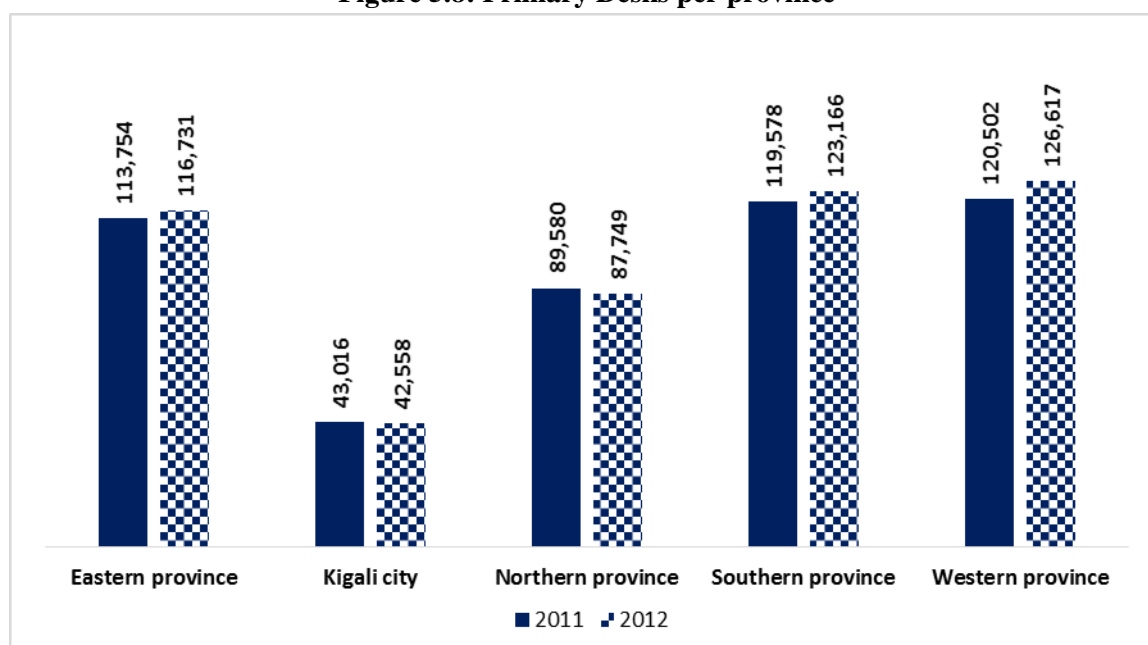

Figure 5.9: Primary School Teaching Staff by Province in 2012

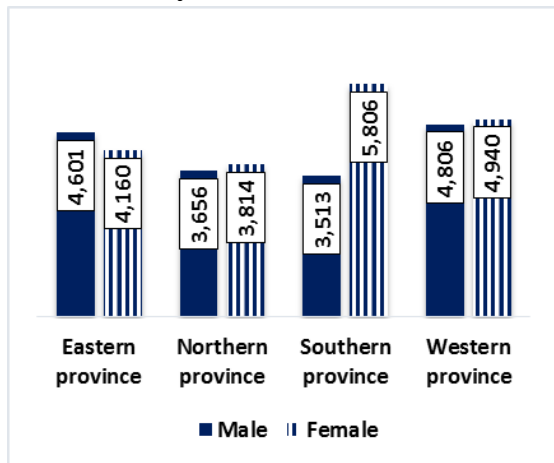
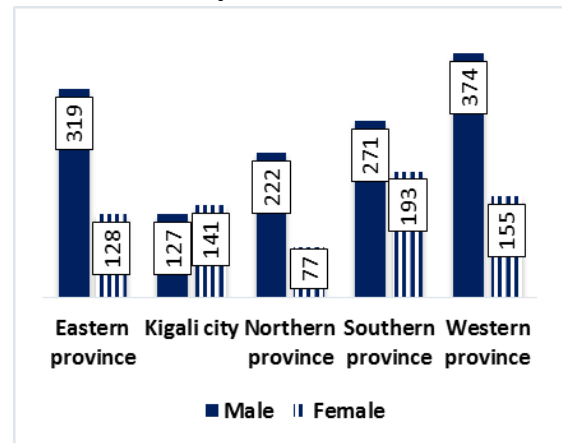


Figure 5.10: Primary School Administrative Staff by Province in 2012

Figure 5.11: Secondary Education Gross Enrolment Rate (GER) by sex

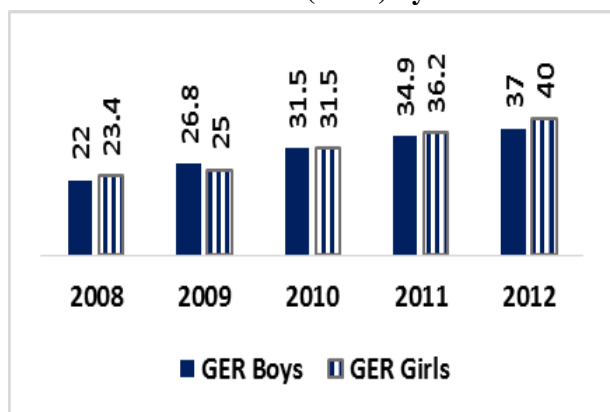
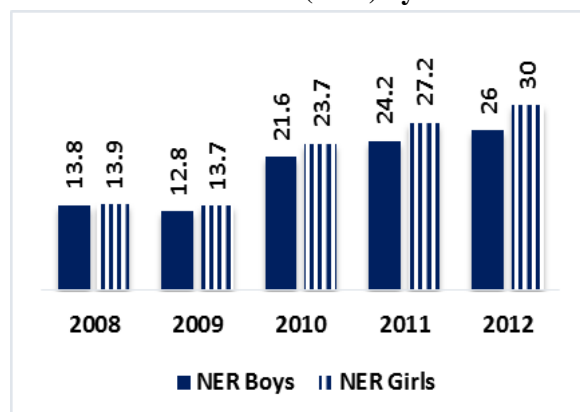


Figure 5.12: Secondary Education Net Enrolment Rate (NER) by sex

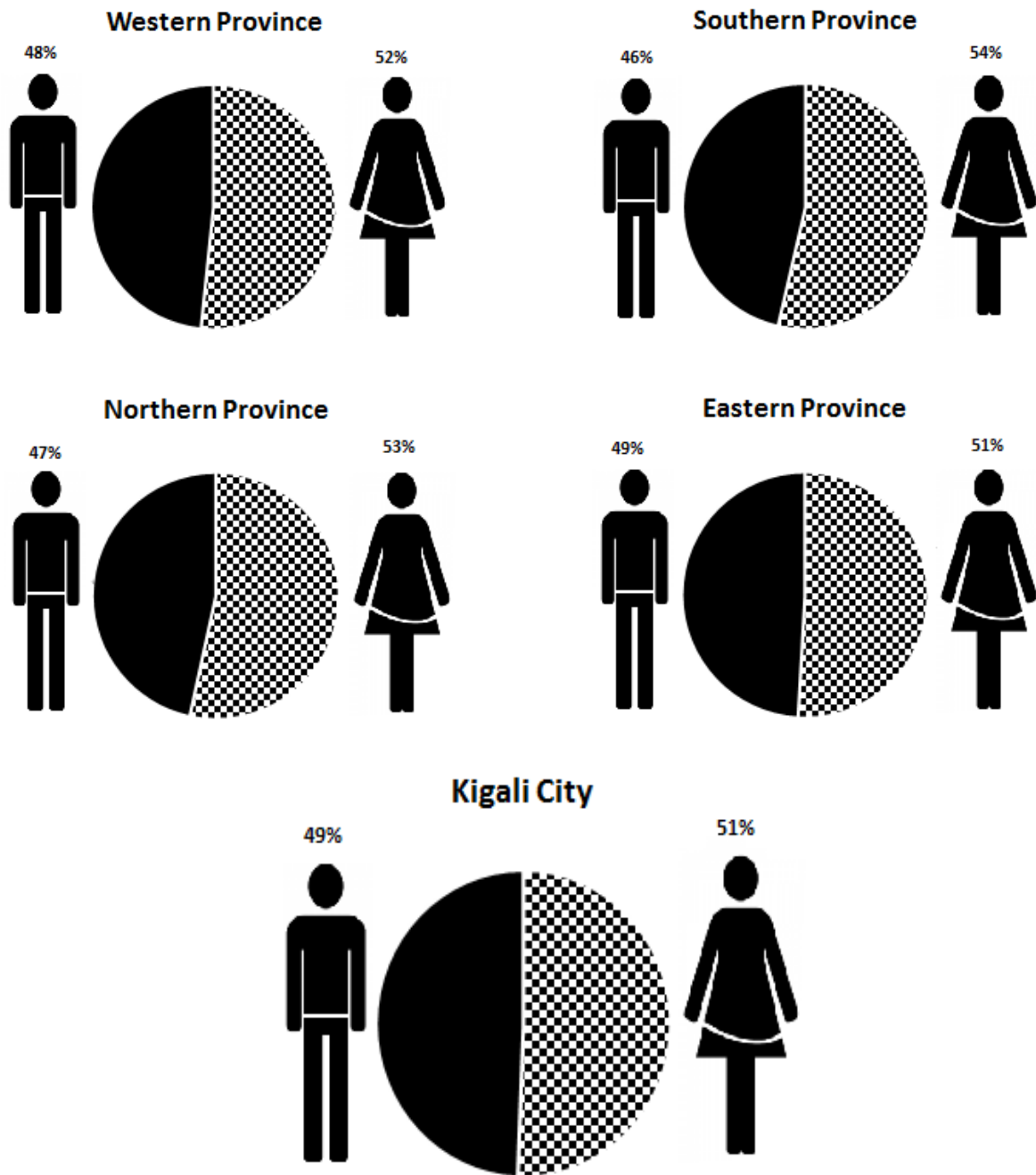

Figure 5.13: Secondary Students by province (%) in 2012

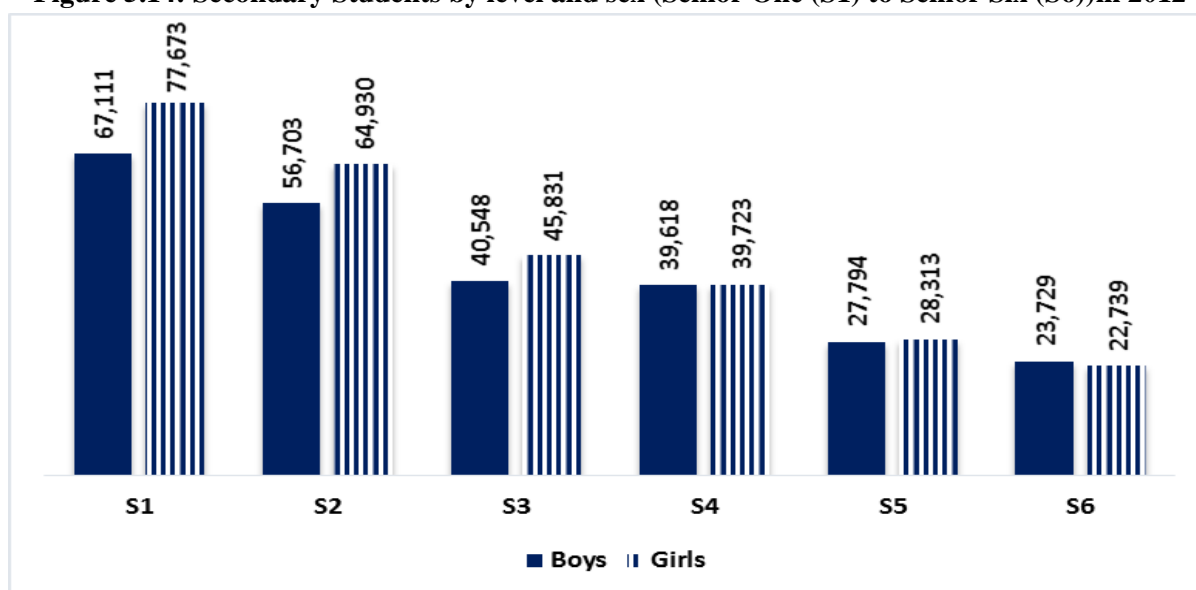

Figure 5.15: Secondary schools per province

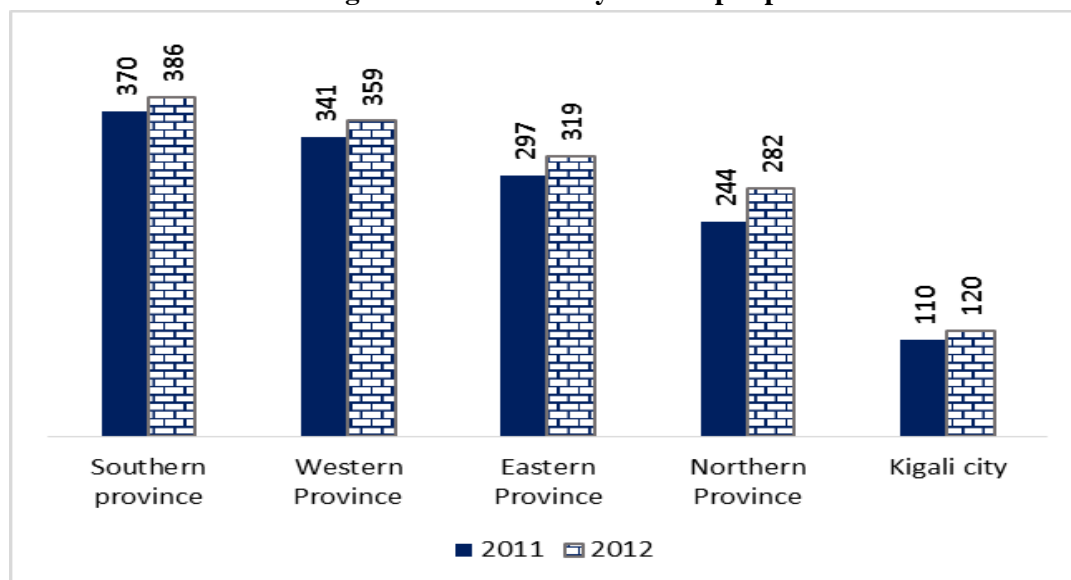


Figure 5.16: Secondary classrooms per province

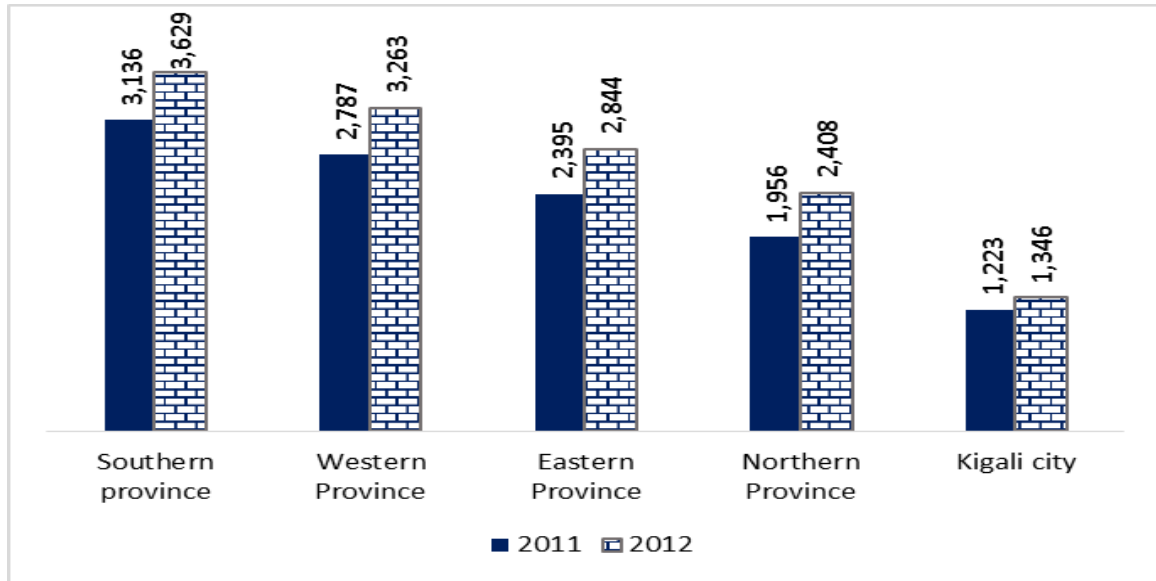


Figure 5.17: Secondary desks per province

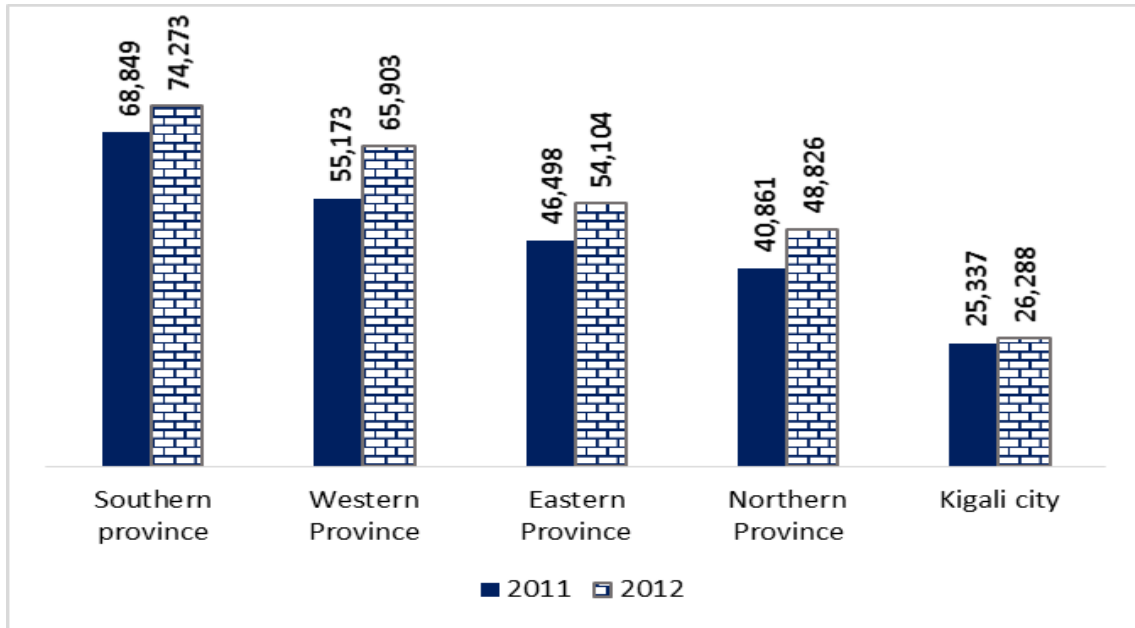

Figure 5.18: Secondary teaching staff by sex and provinces 2012

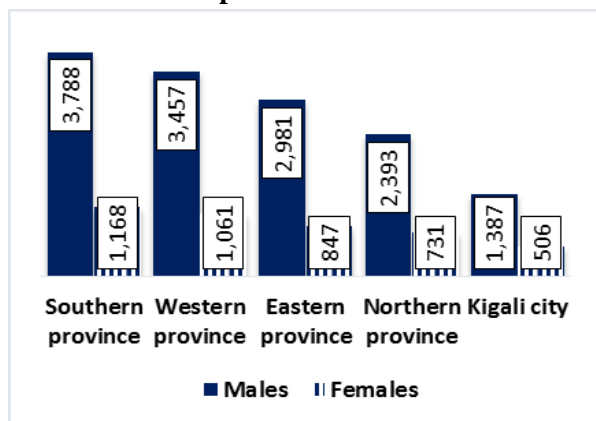
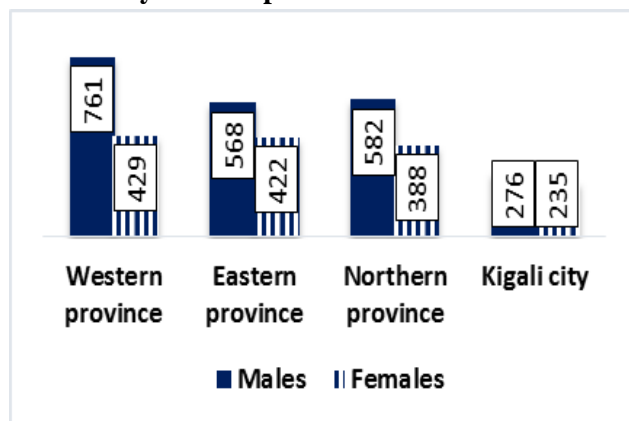


Figure 5.19: Secondary administrative staff by sex and provinces 2012

Figure 5.20: Students' enrolment in VTC's

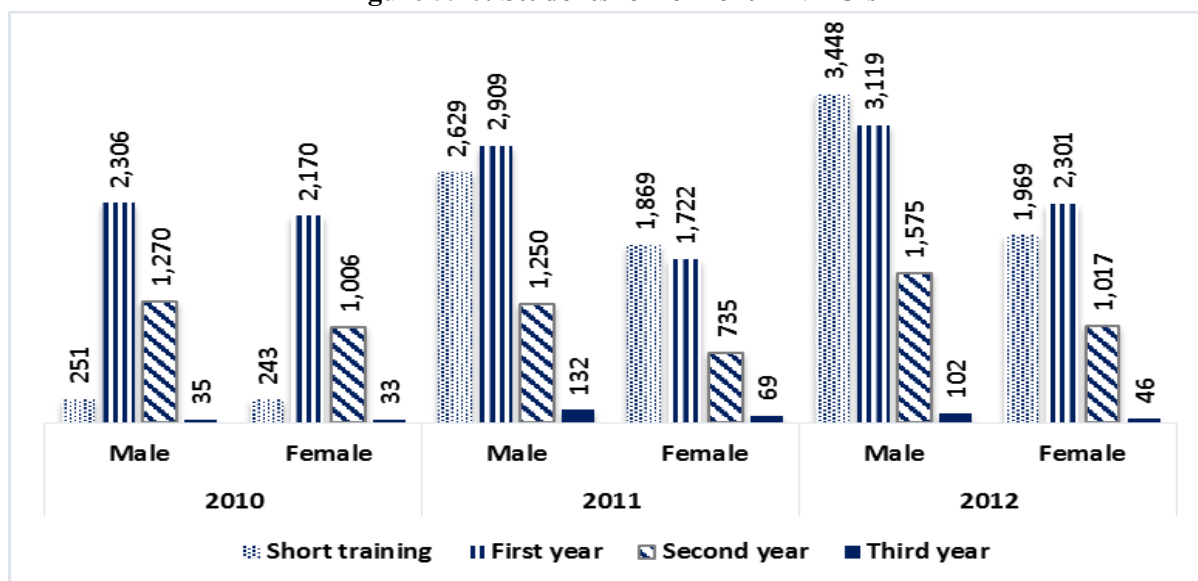
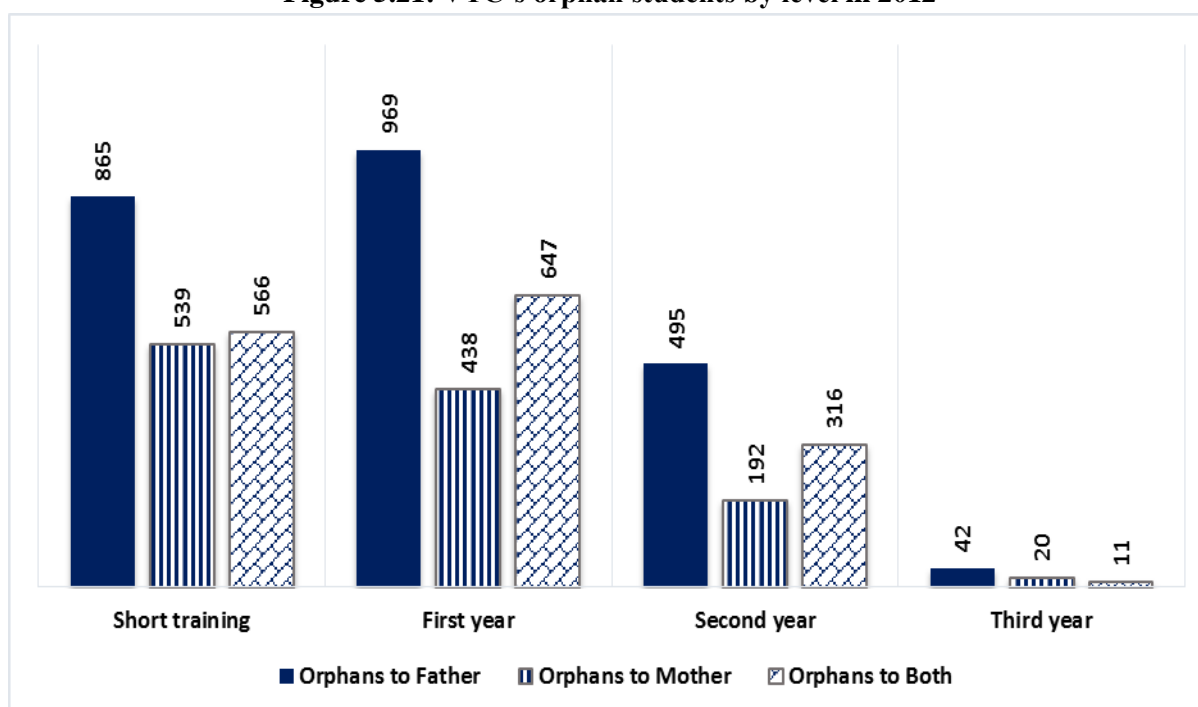

Figure 5.21: VTC's orphan students by level in 2012

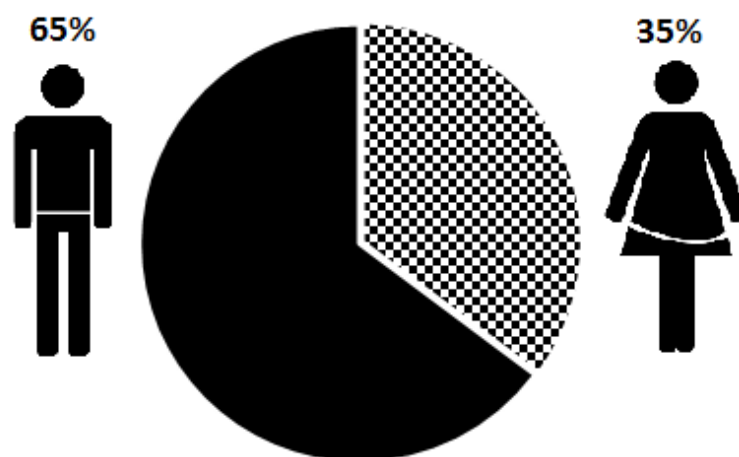

**Figure 5.23: Higher Education learning students by kind of institutions and sex**

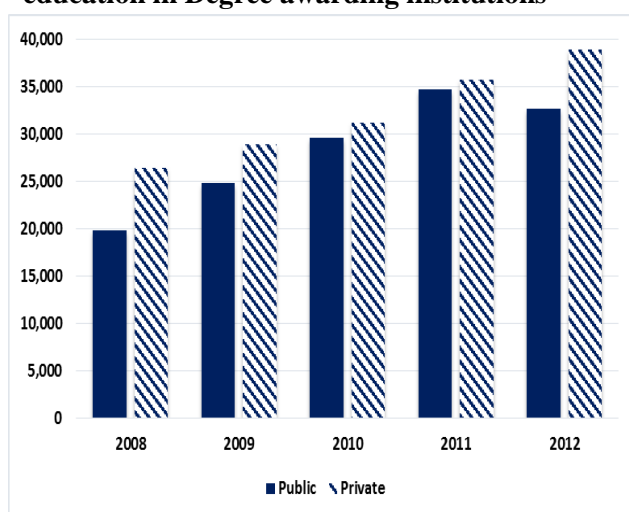

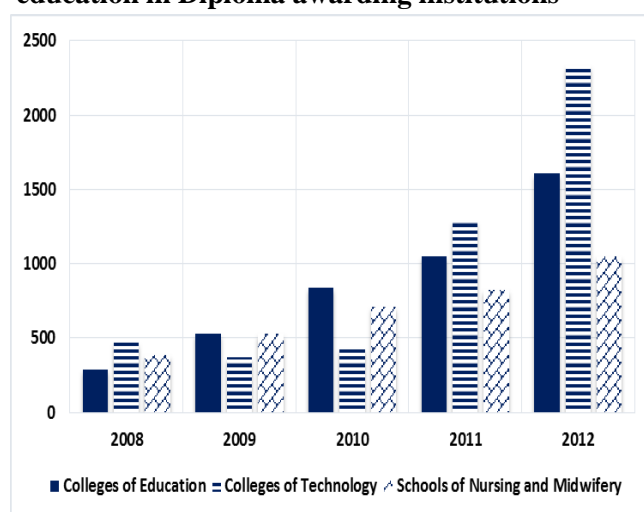

**Figure 5.25: Student enrolment in tertiary education in Diploma awarding institutions**

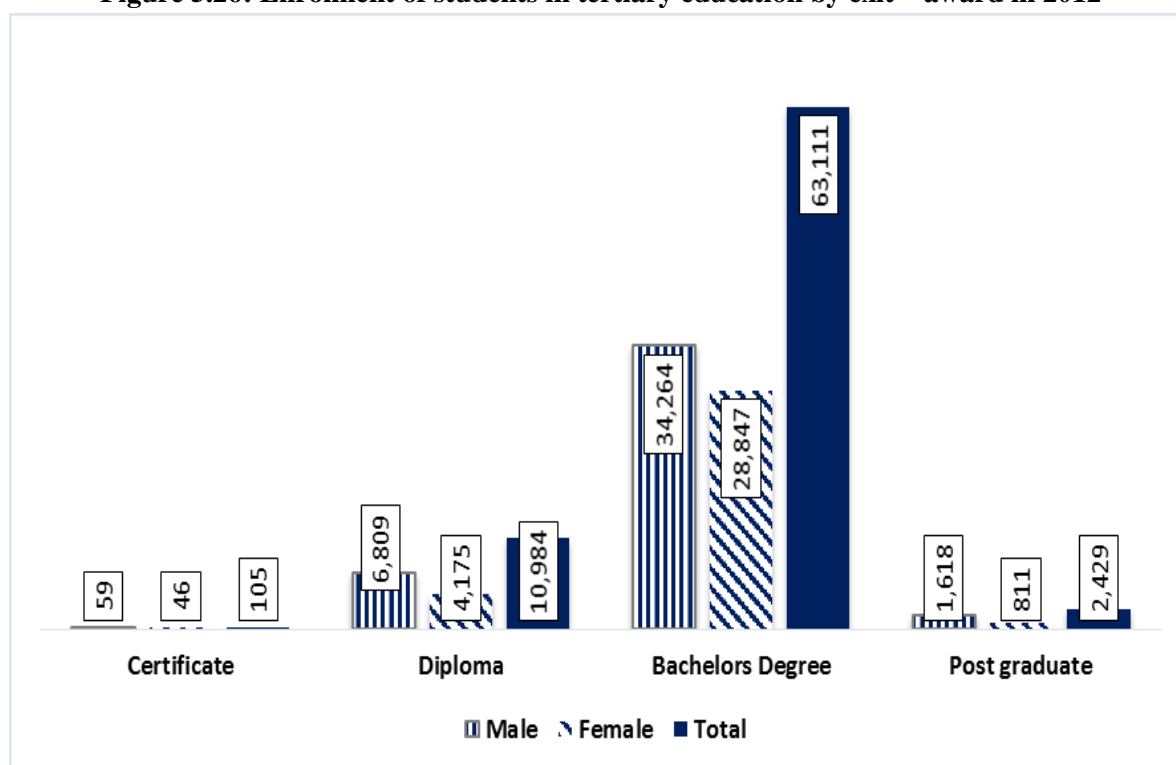

Figure 5.27: Profile of tertiary education students per 100,000 inhabitants by sex

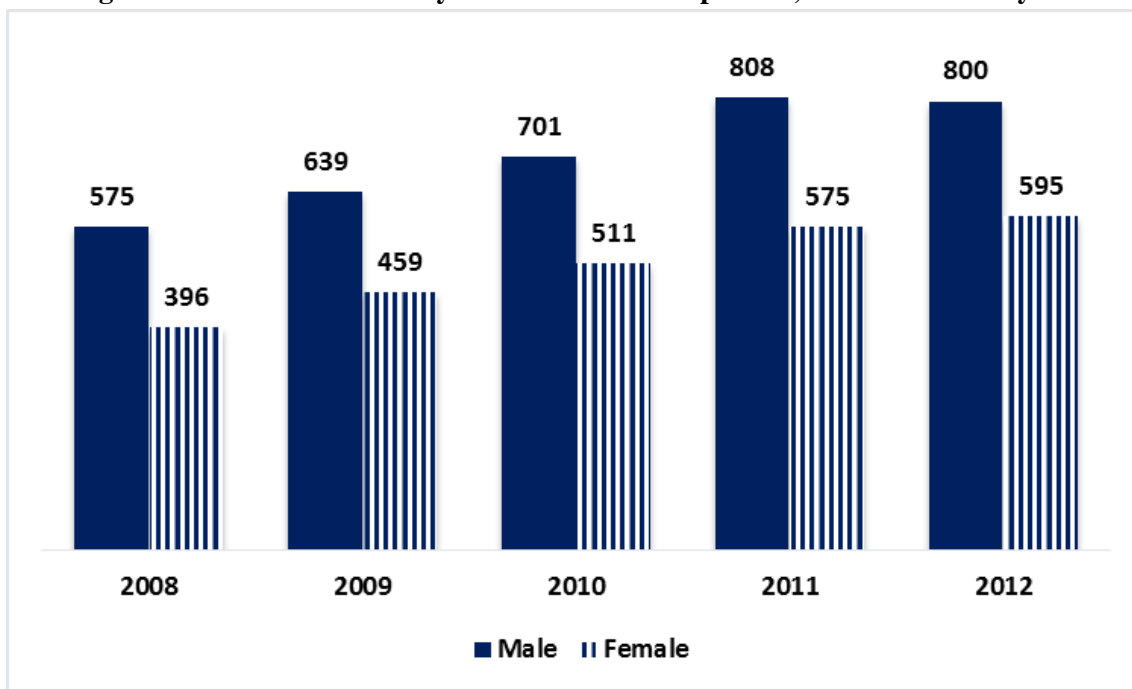


Figure 5.28: Profile of tertiary education students by sex and category

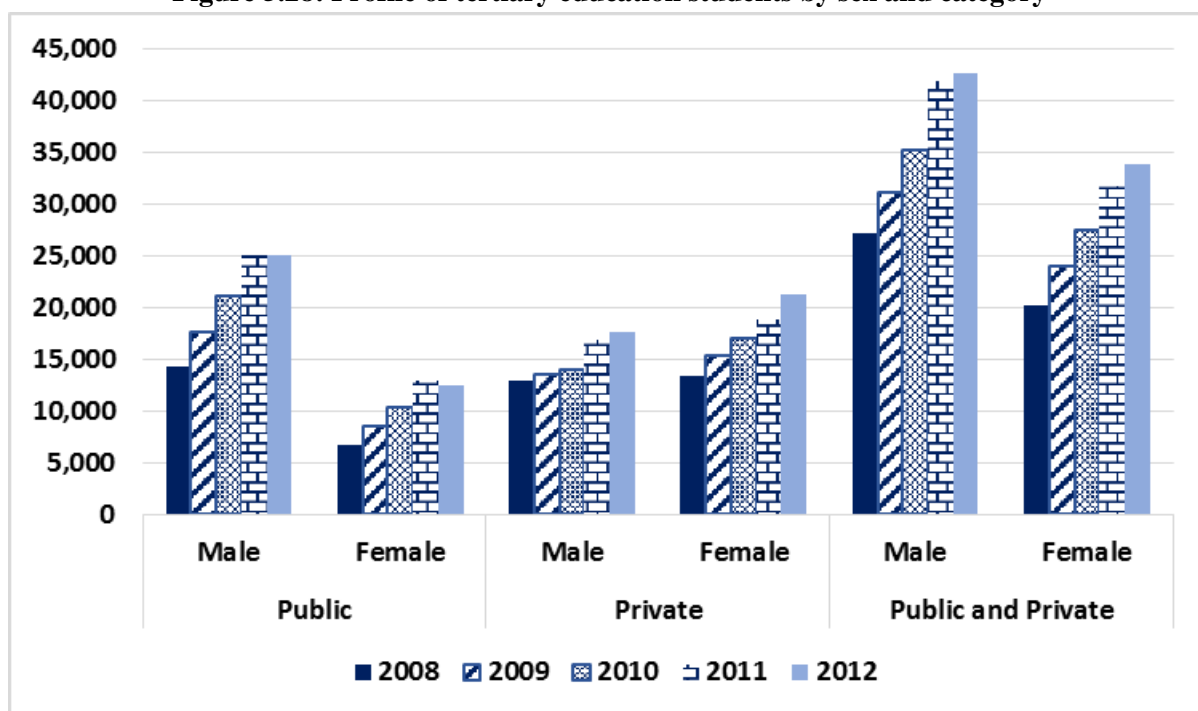

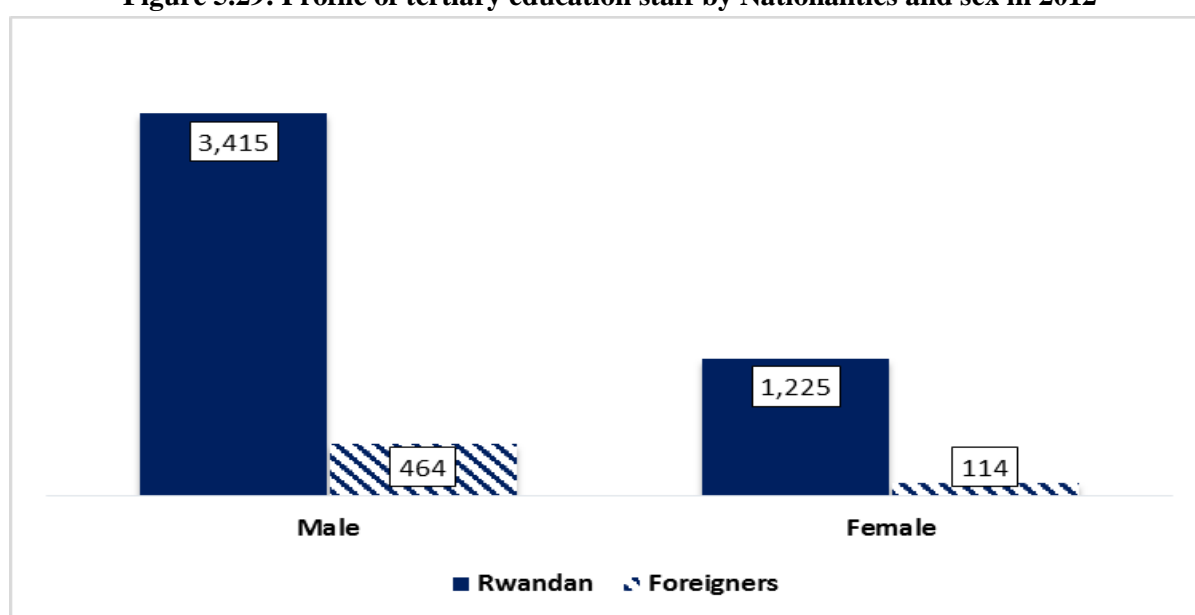

**Figure 5.29: Profile of tertiary education staff by Nationalities and sex in 2012**



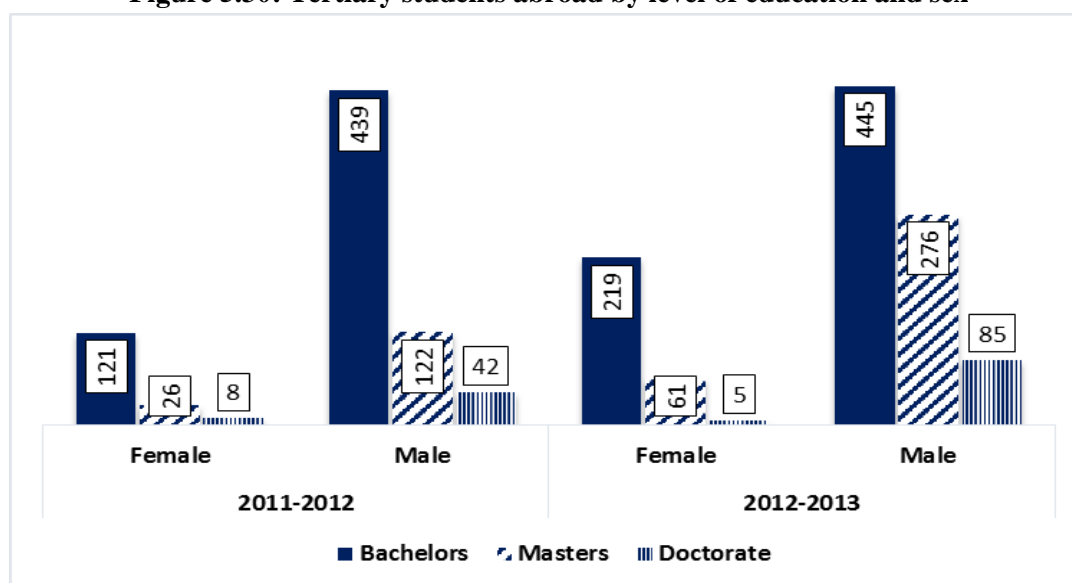

**Figure 5.30: Tertiary students abroad by level of education and sex**

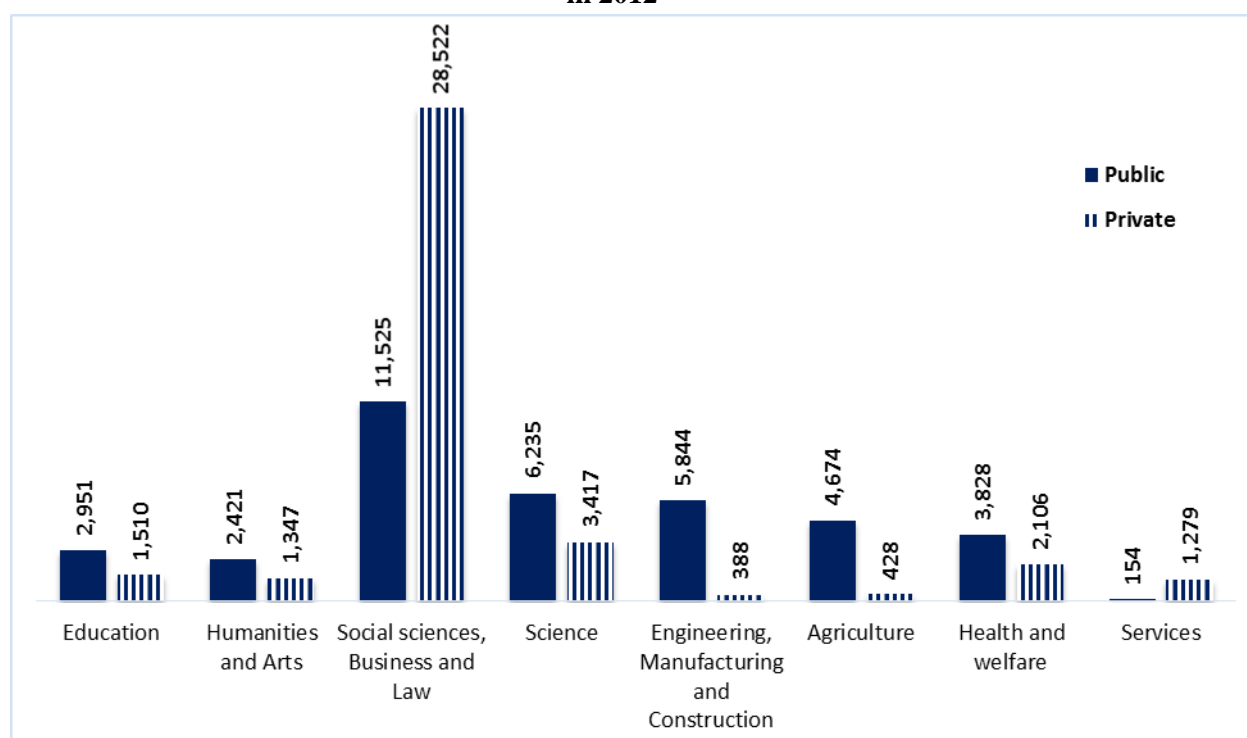

**Figure 5.31: Number of tertiary education students by field of education and sector of education in 2012**

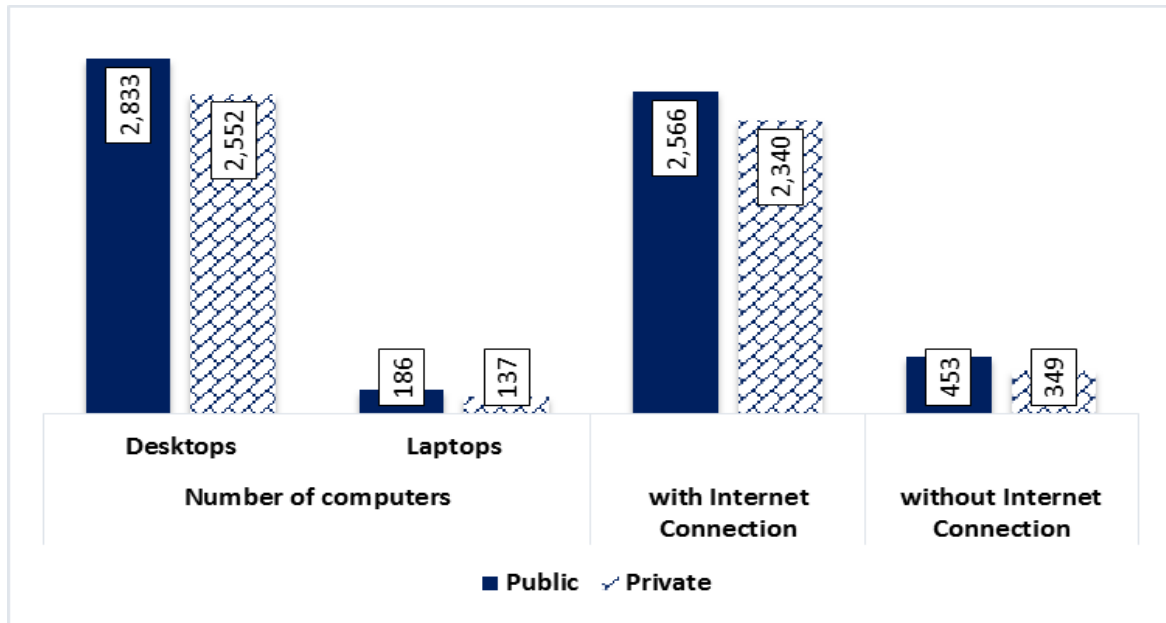

**Figure 5.32: Number of computers and internet connection in tertiary education by sector of education, 2012**

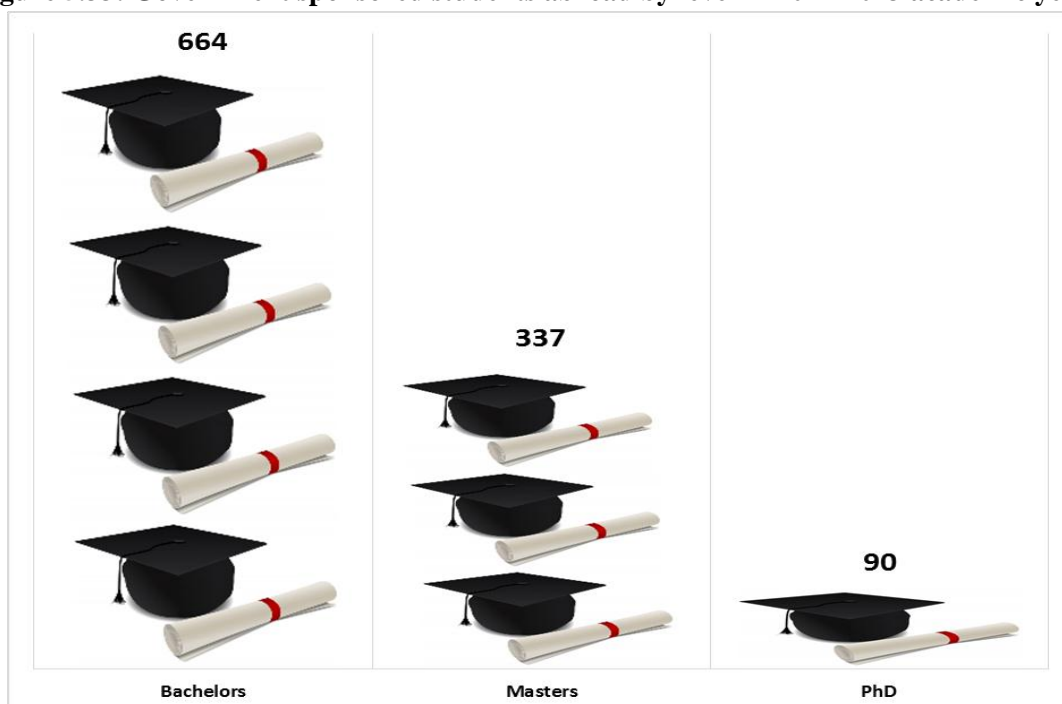

Figure 5.34: Adult literacy centers by ownership in Rwanda, 2012

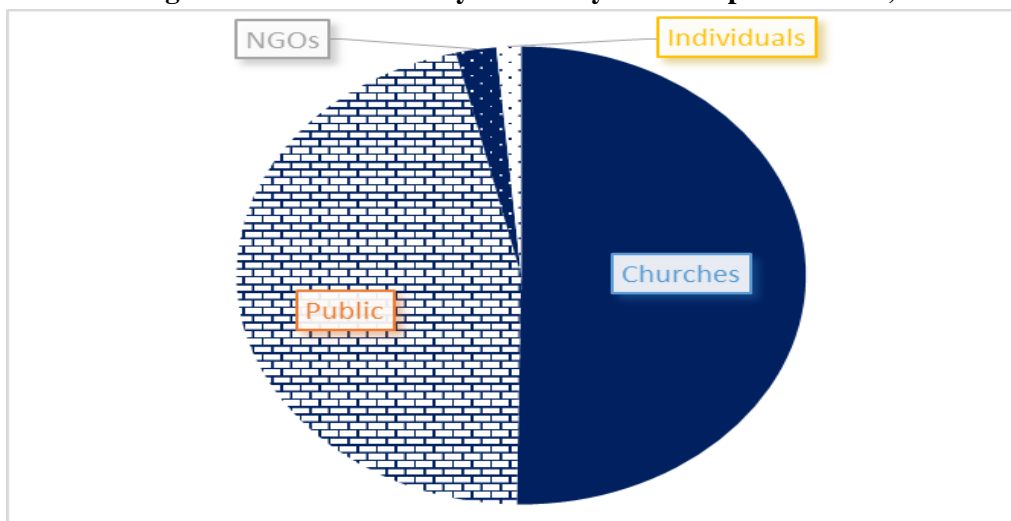

Figure 5.35: Total Adult literacy learners by sex in 2012

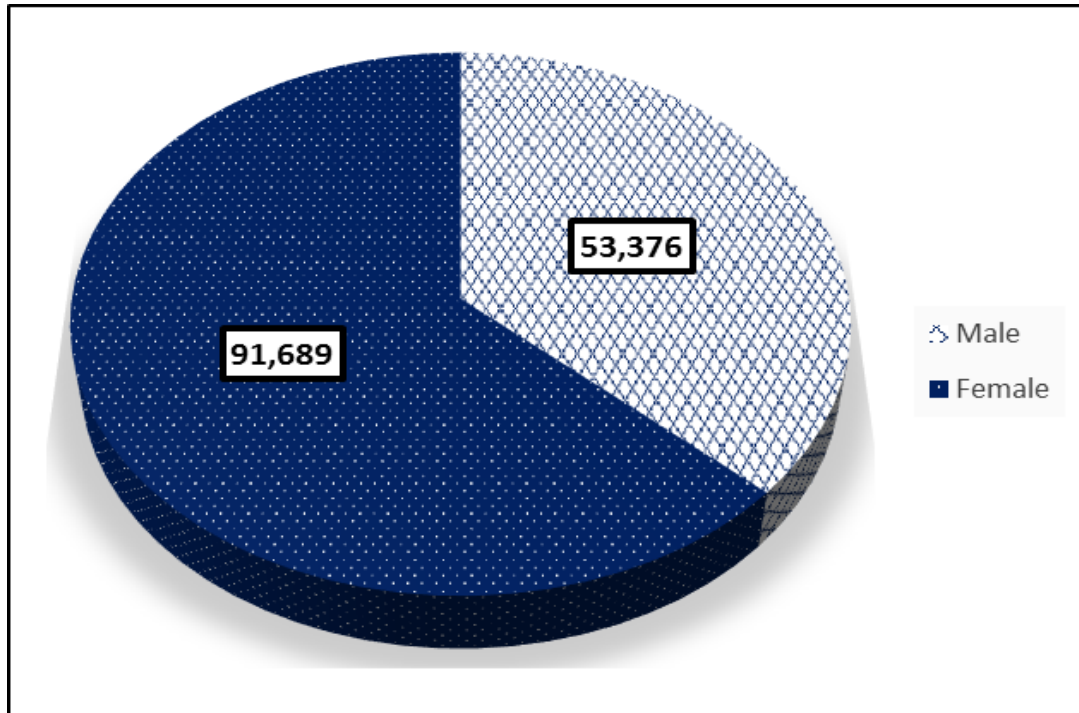

Figure 5.36: Adult literacy instructors by Province and sex, 2012

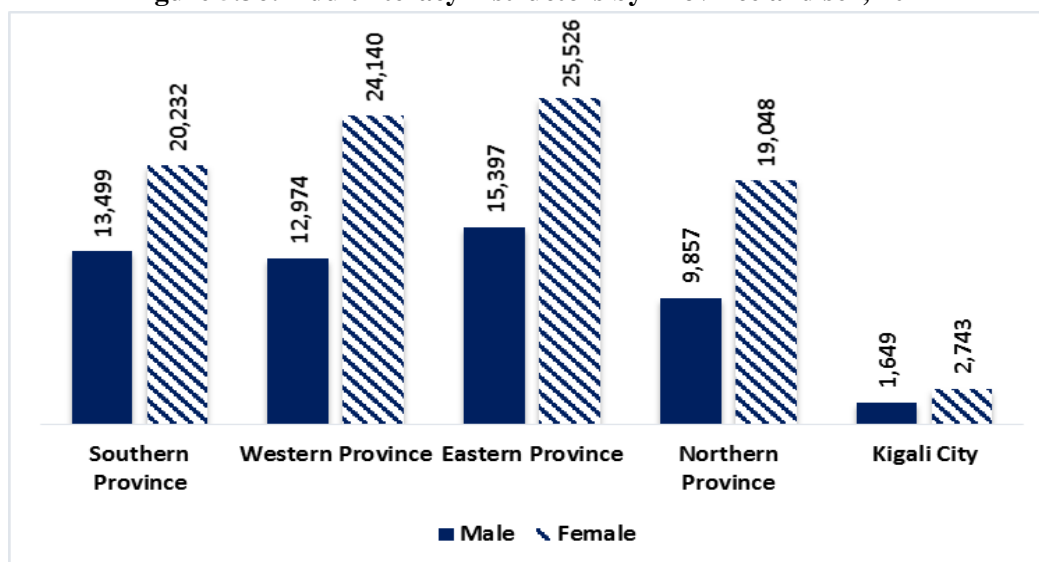
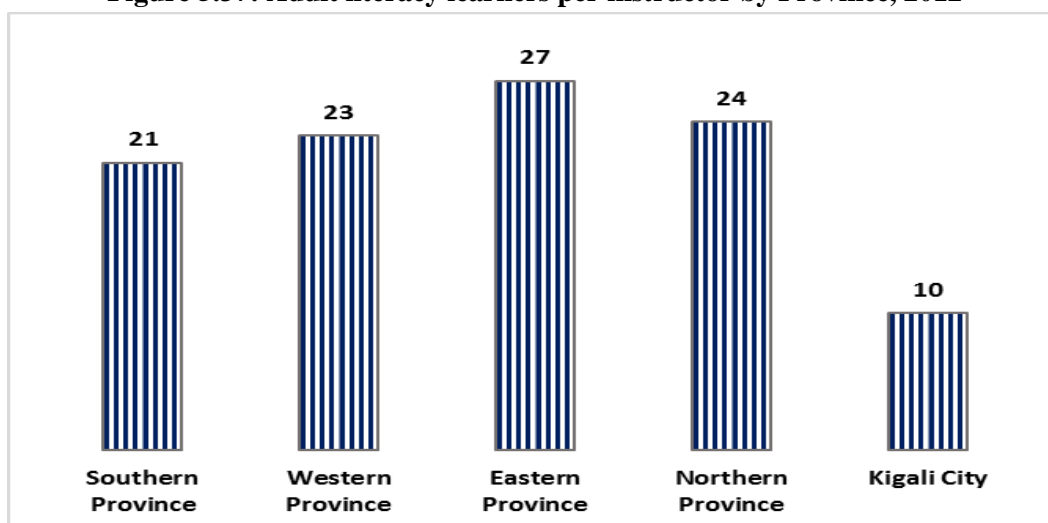


Figure 5.37: Adult literacy learners per instructor by Province, 2012

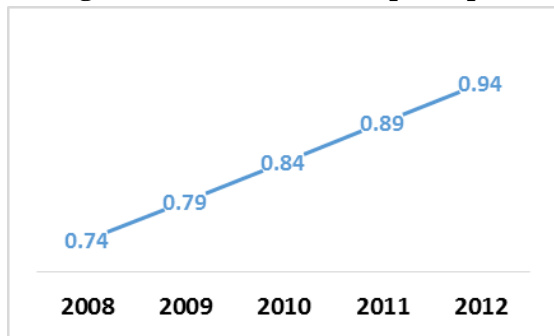

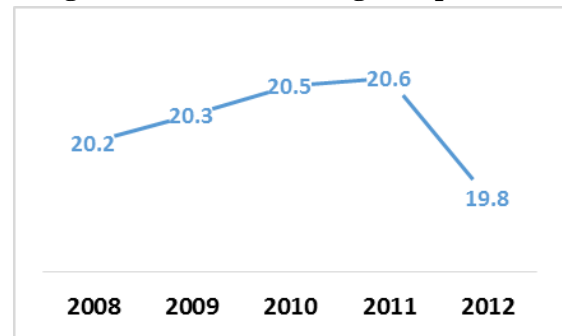

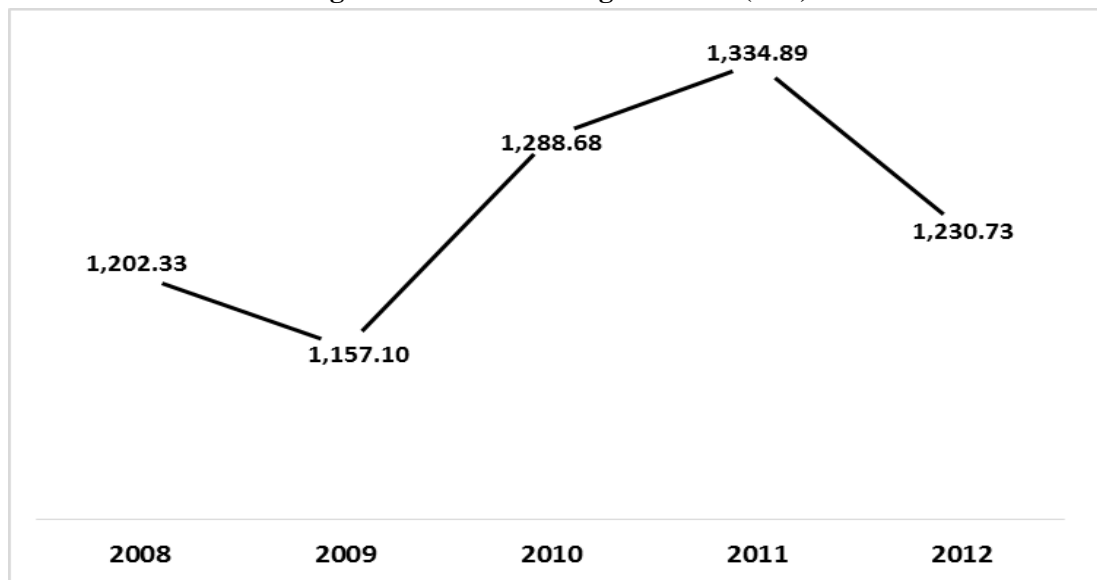
**Figure 6.1: CO<sub>2</sub> emissions per capita**

Figure 6.5: Volume of mineral exports in kg by year

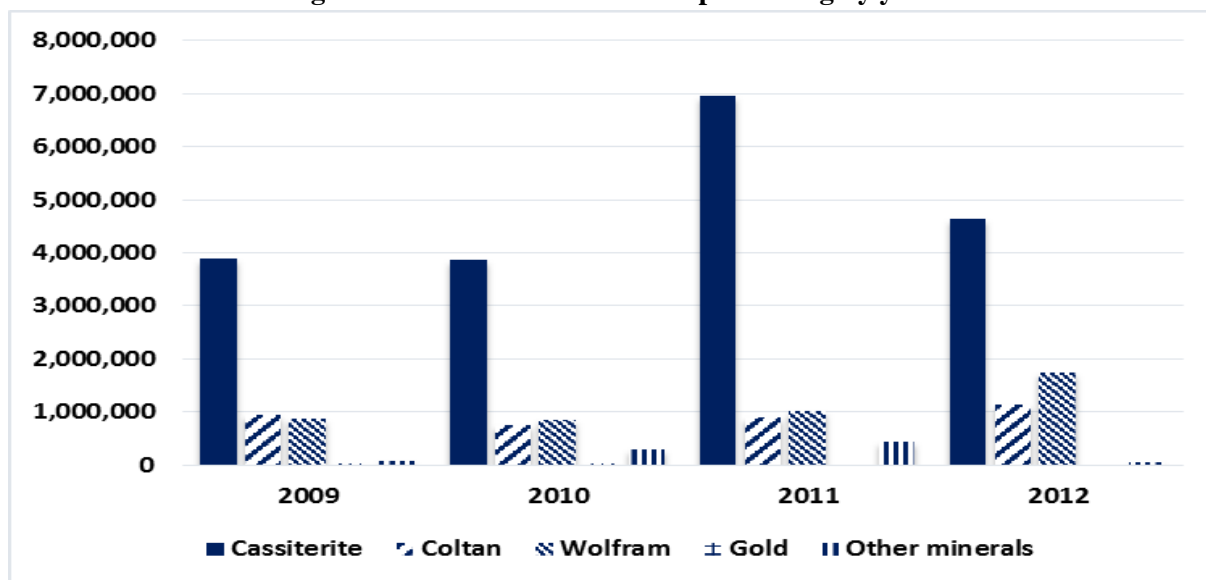
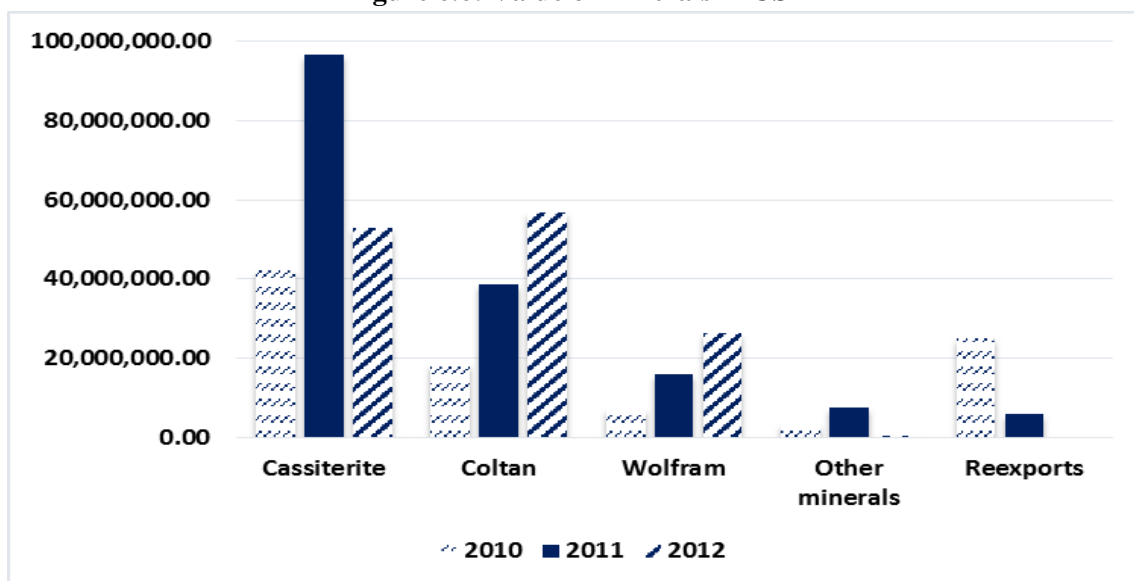

**Figure 6.6: Value of minerals in USD**

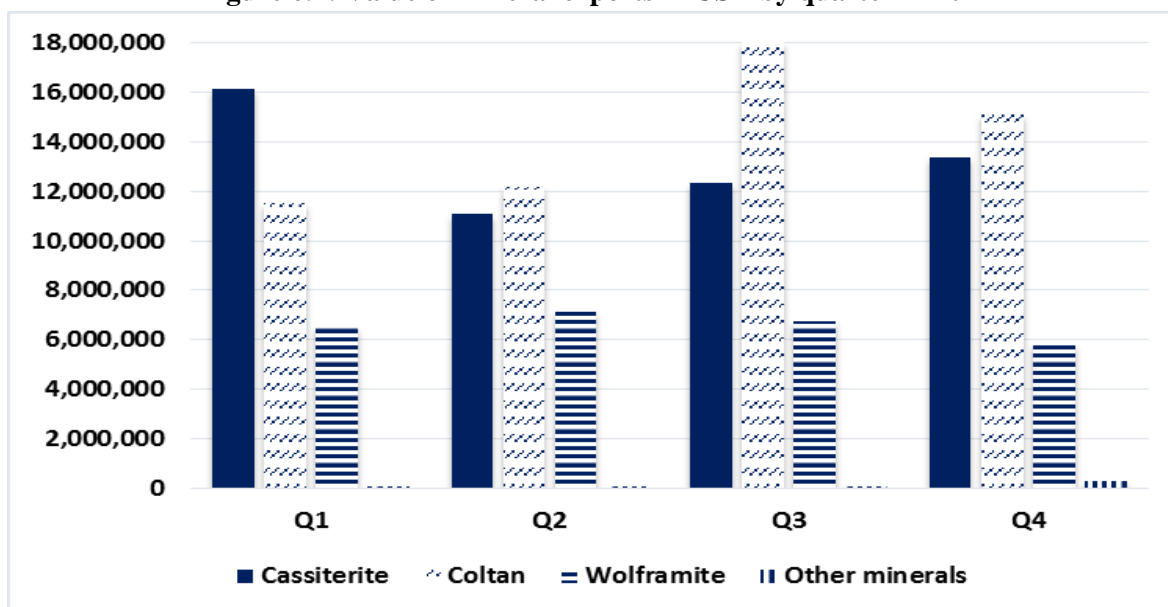

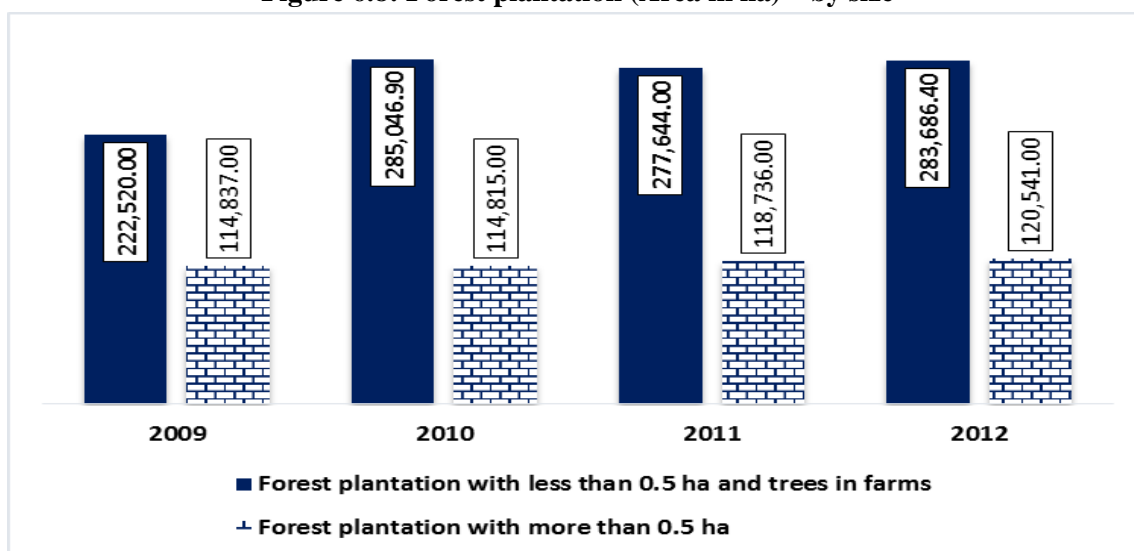

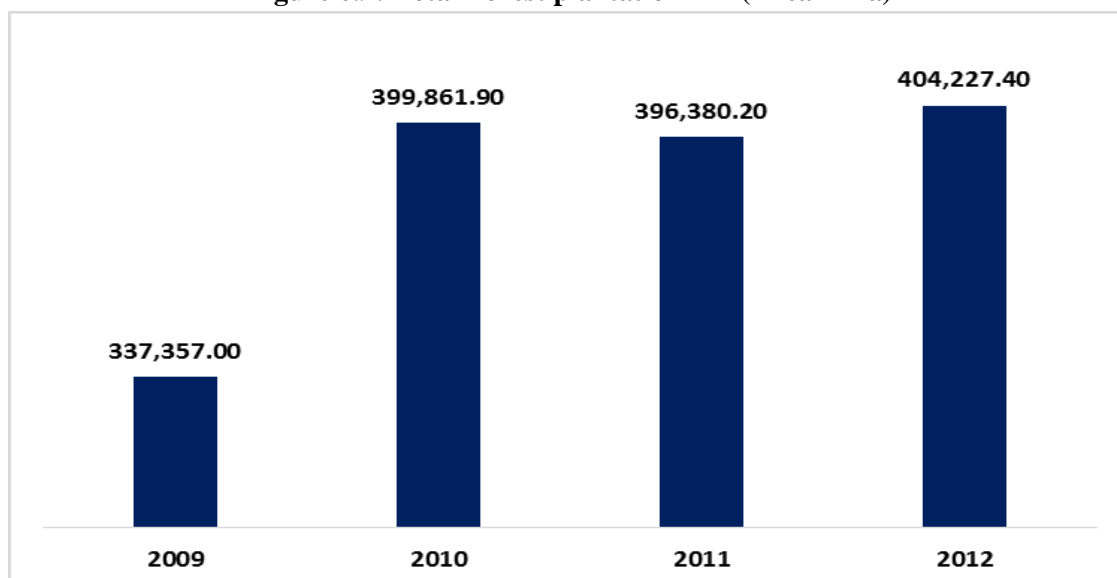

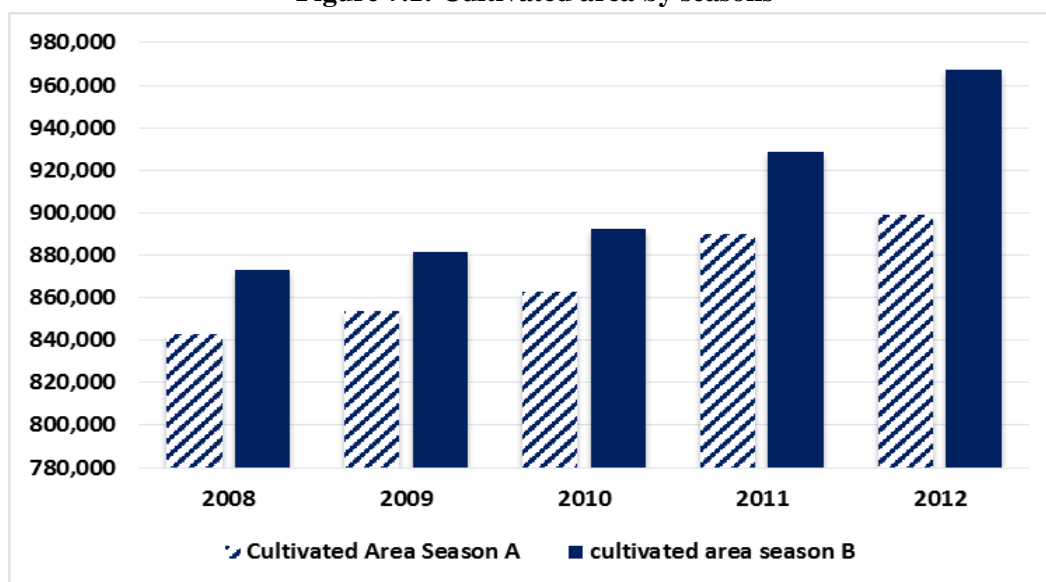

**Figure 7.1: Cultivated area by seasons**

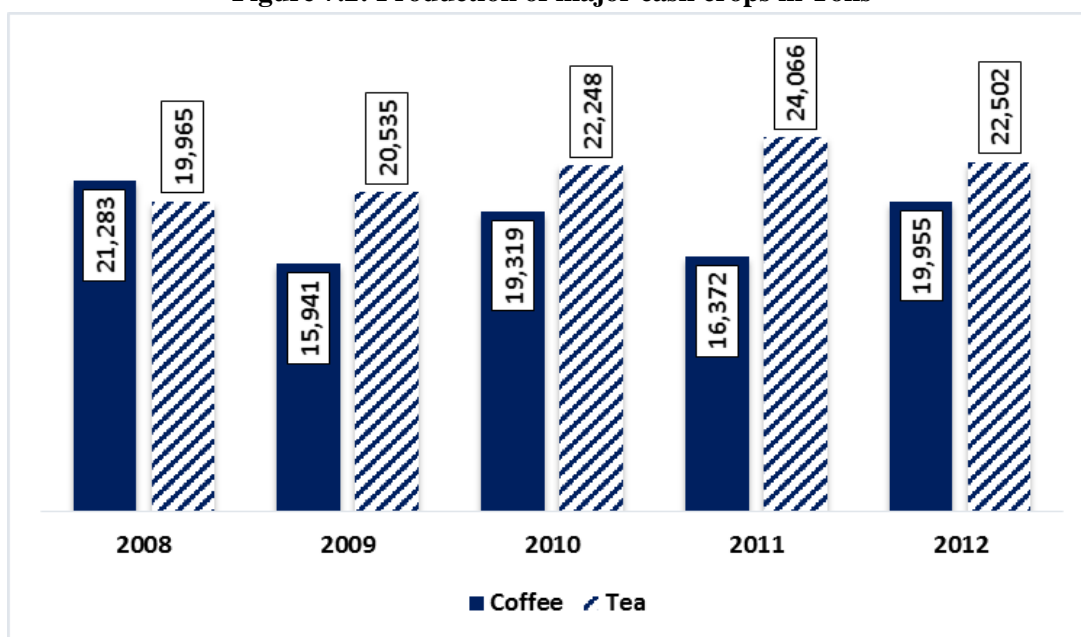

**Figure 7.2: Production of major cash crops in Tons**

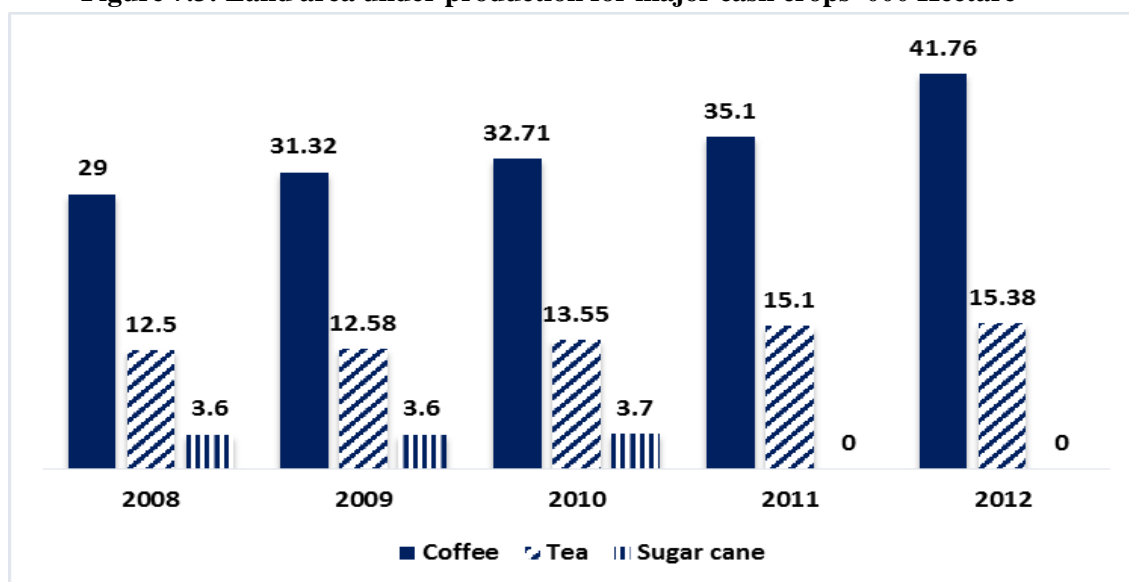

**Figure 7.3: Land area under production for major cash crops '000 Hectare**



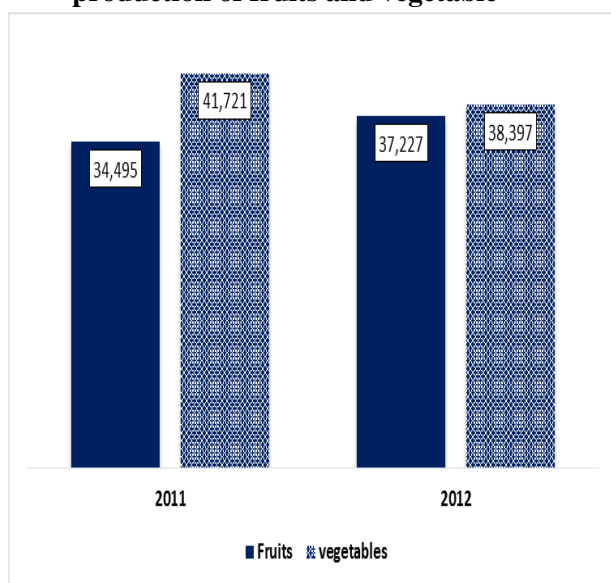

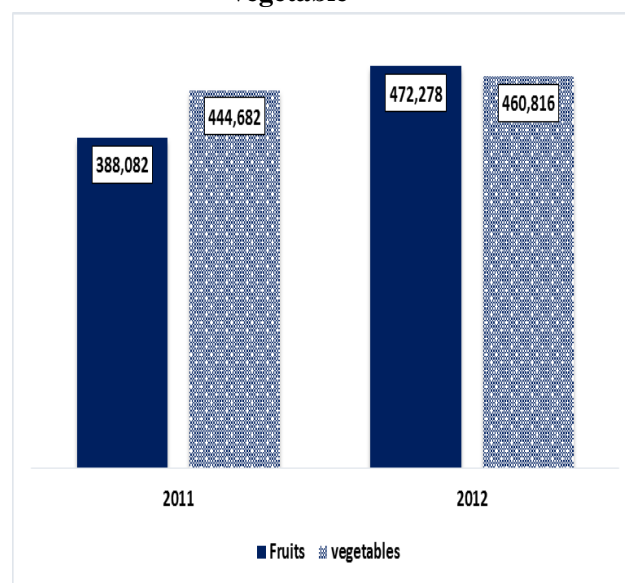

**Figure 7.5: Total production of fruits and vegetable**

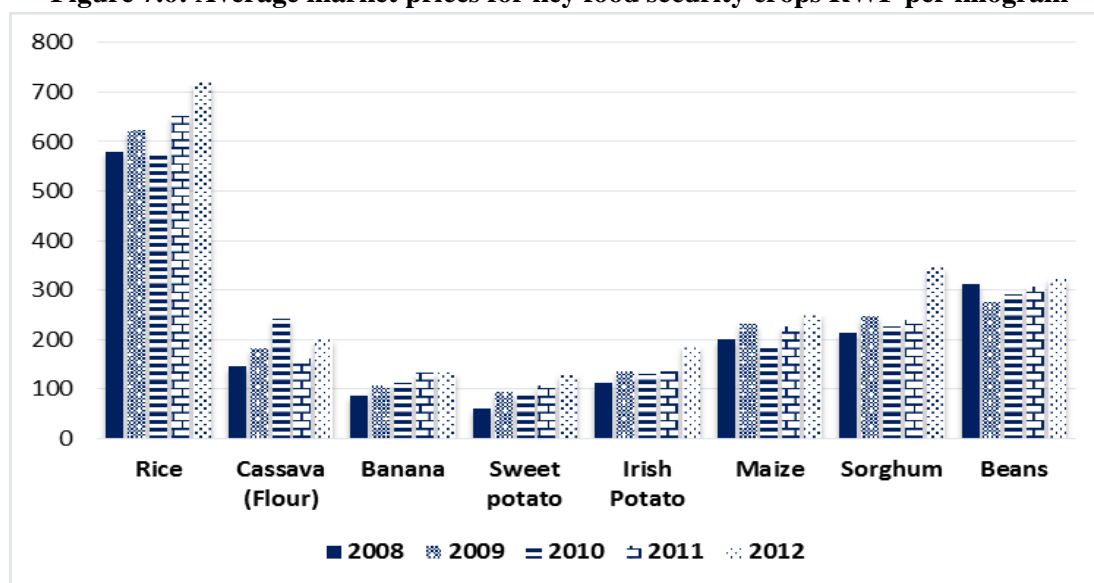

Figure 7.7: Livestock population by type '000' head

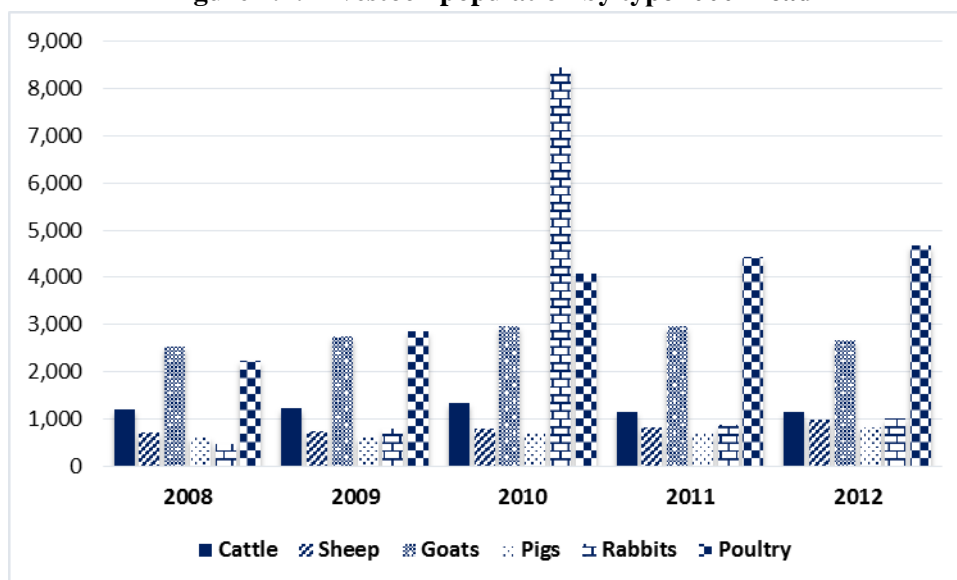

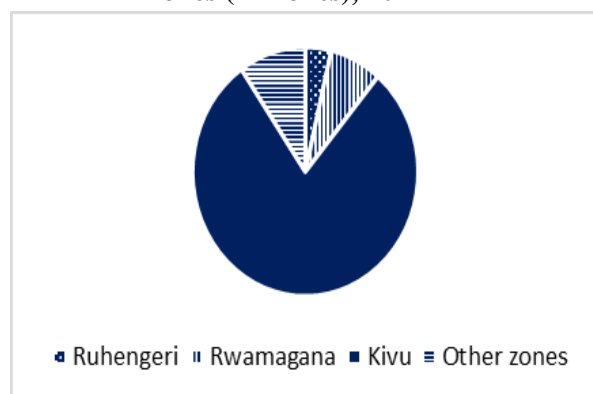

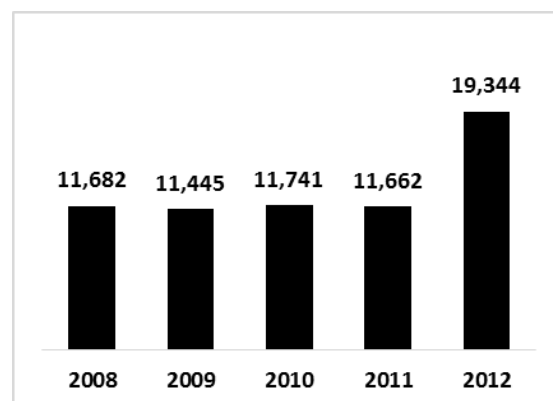

**Figure 7.9: Fishery Statistics (in Tones)**



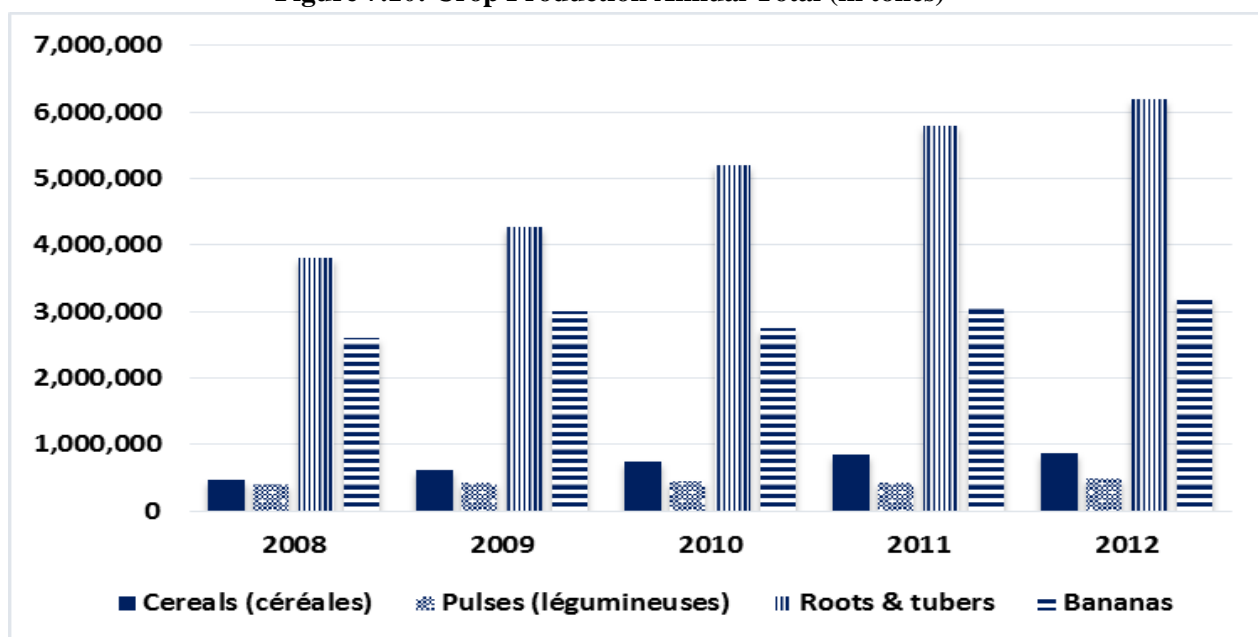

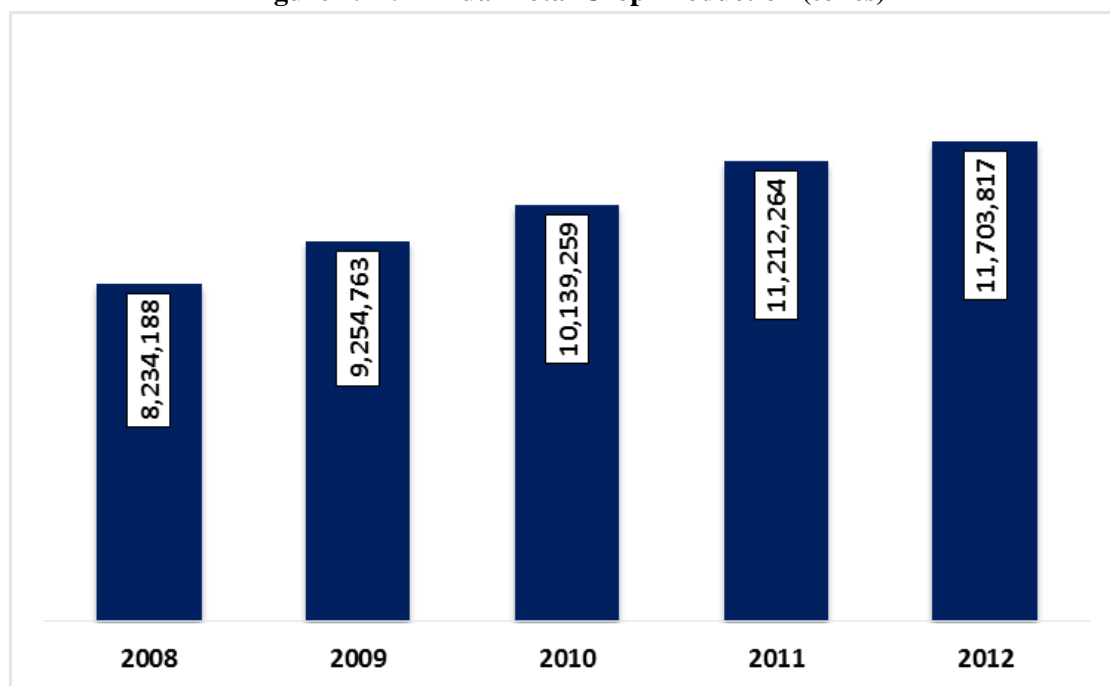

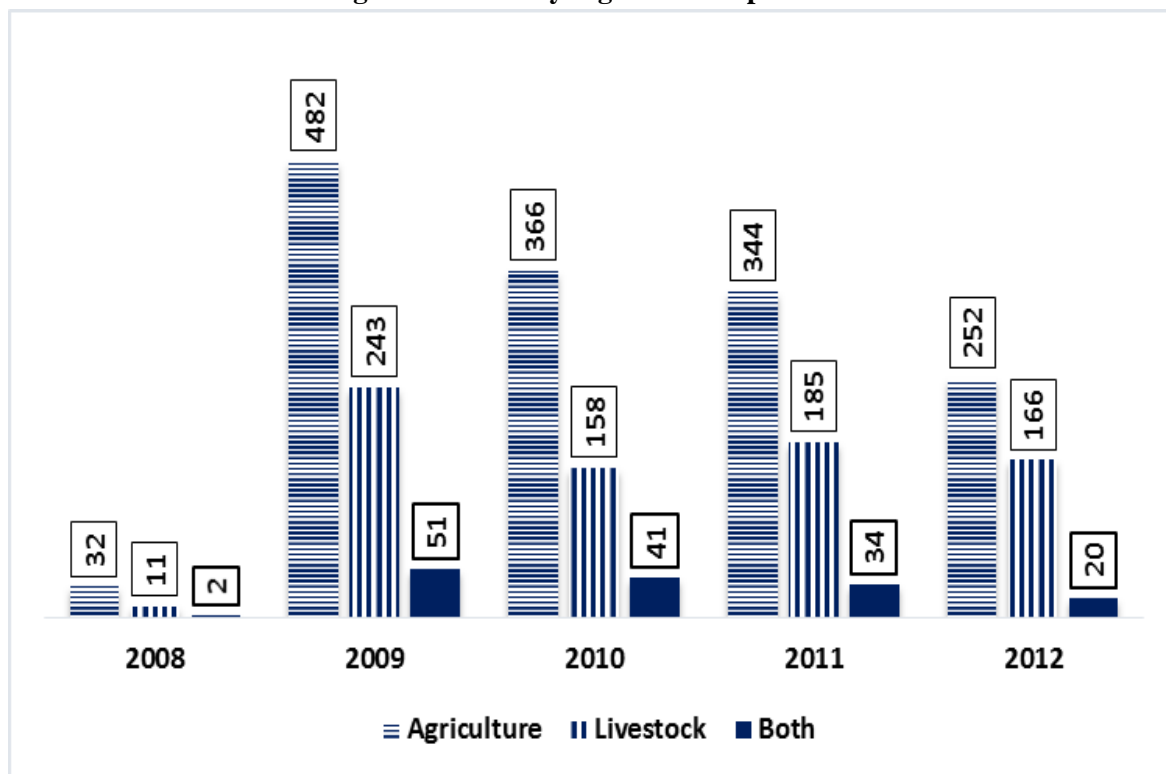

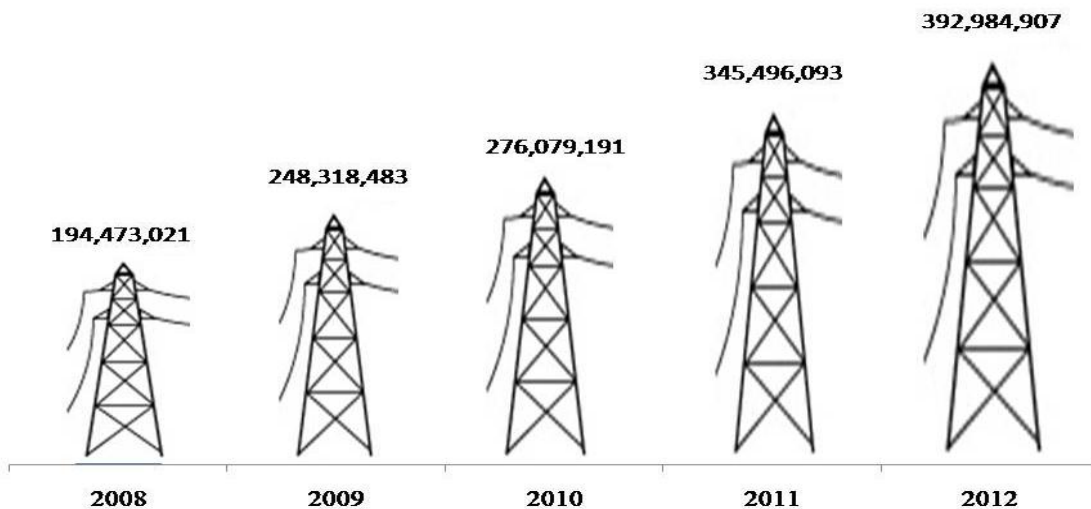

**Figure 8.1: Total production of electricity**



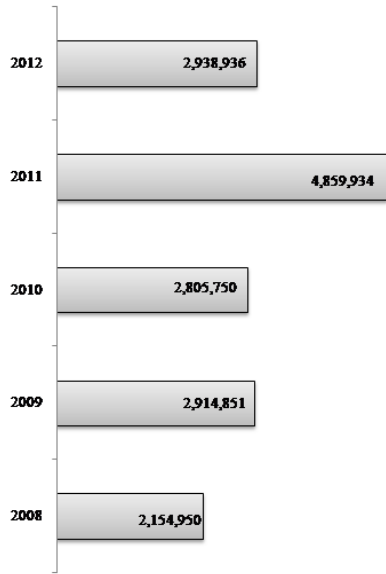

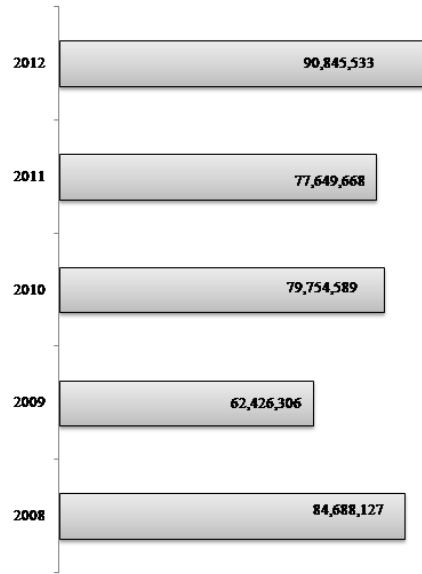

**Figure 8.3: Electricity Consumption level**

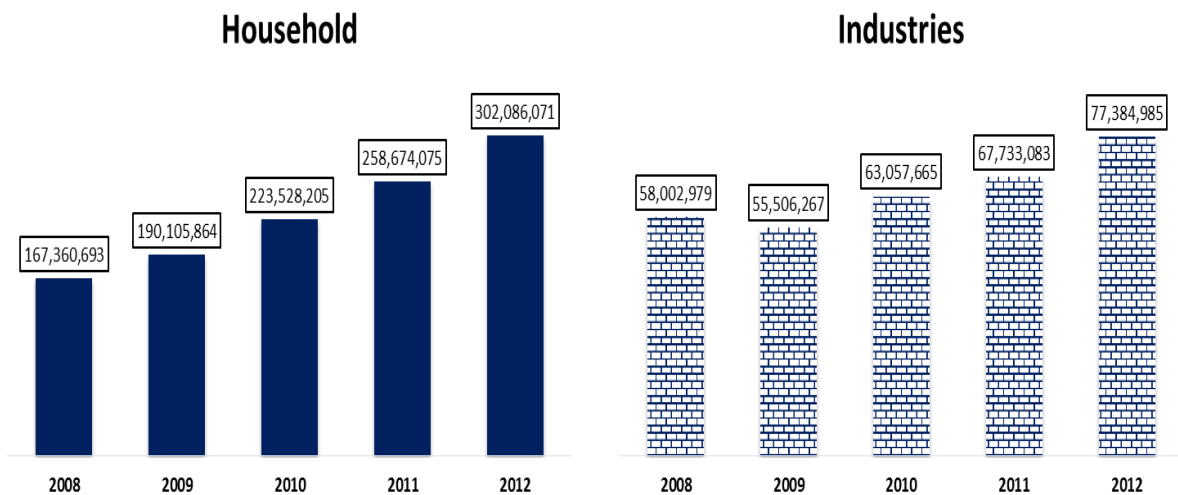




Figure 8.4: Electricity Consumption price/unit (Rwf)

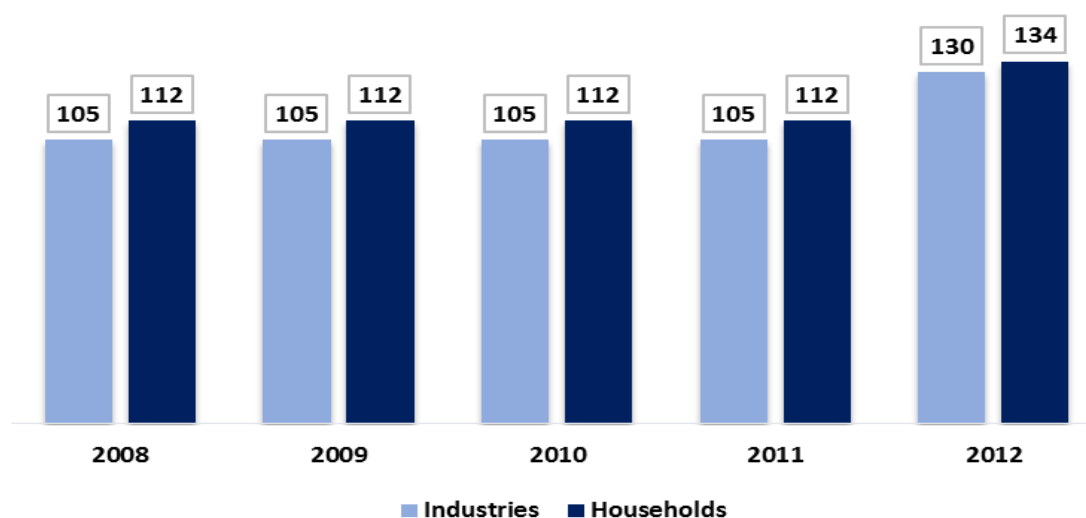

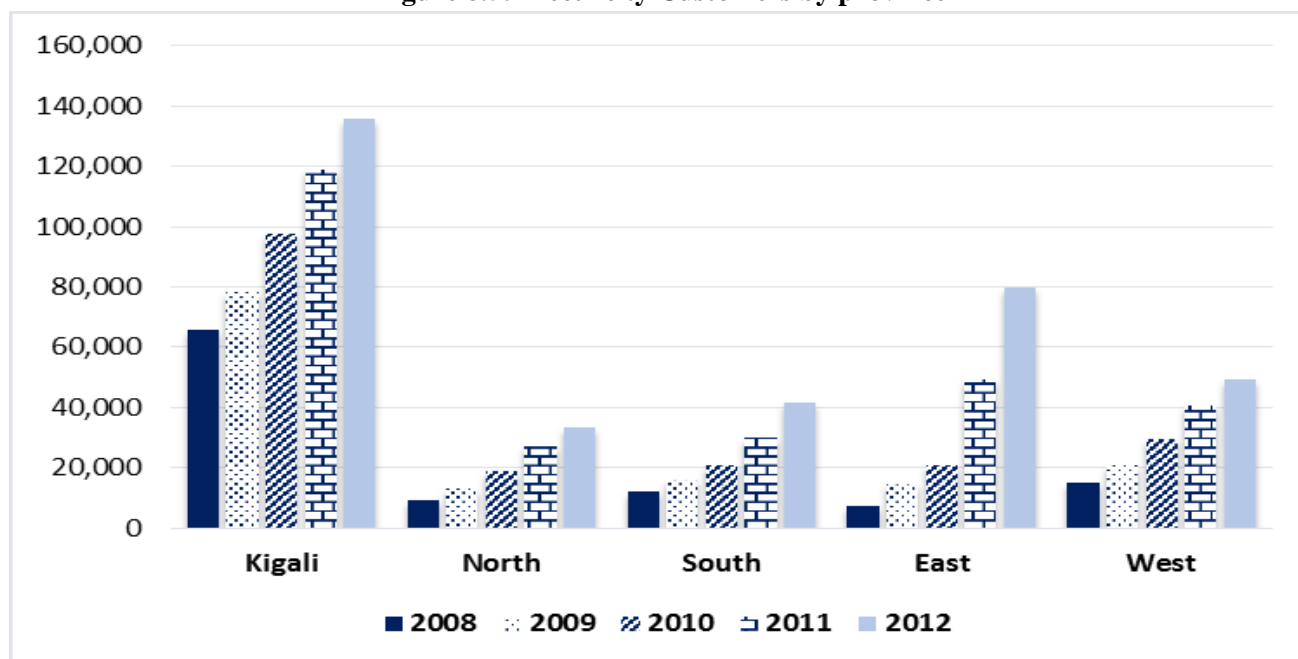

Figure 8.5: Electricity Customers by province



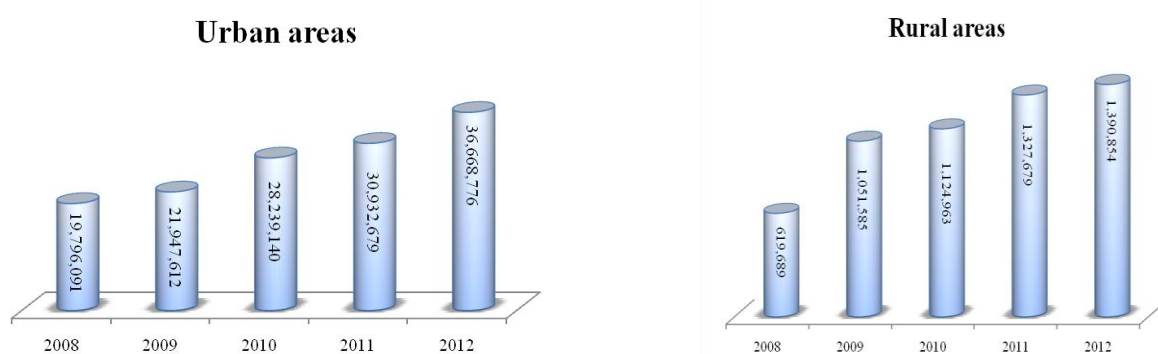

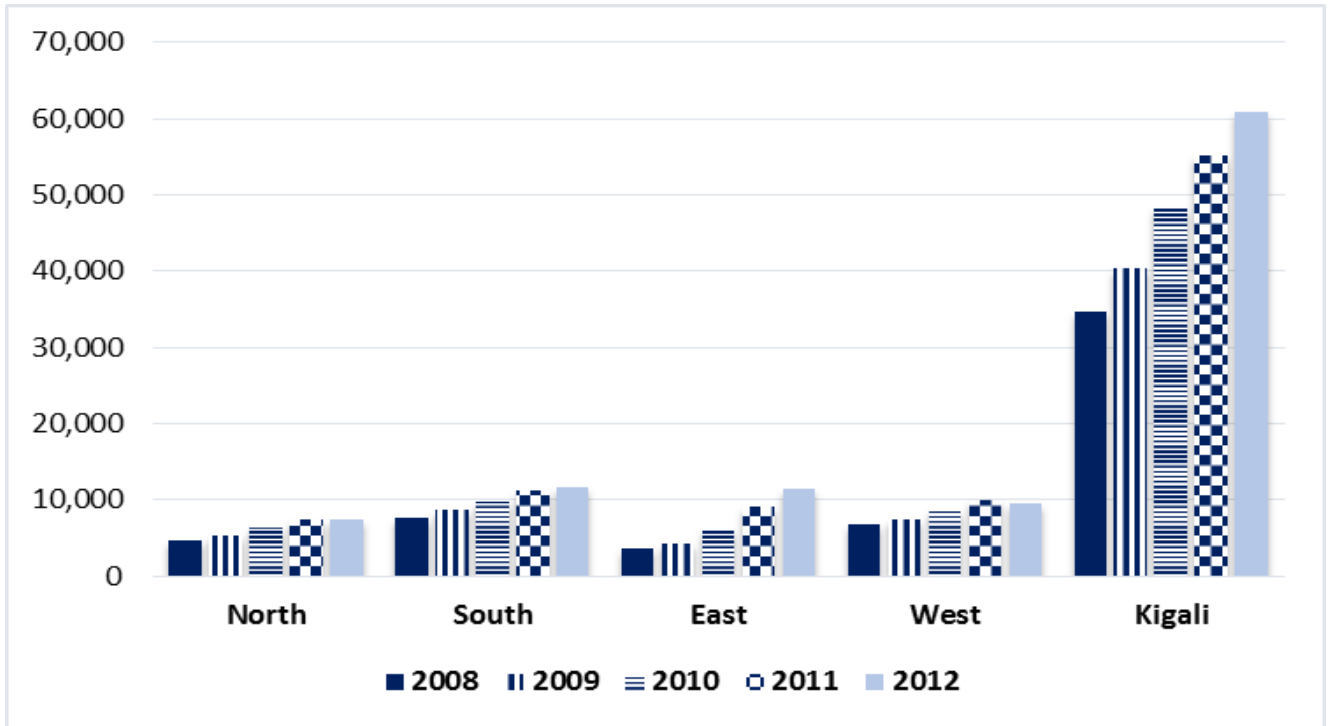

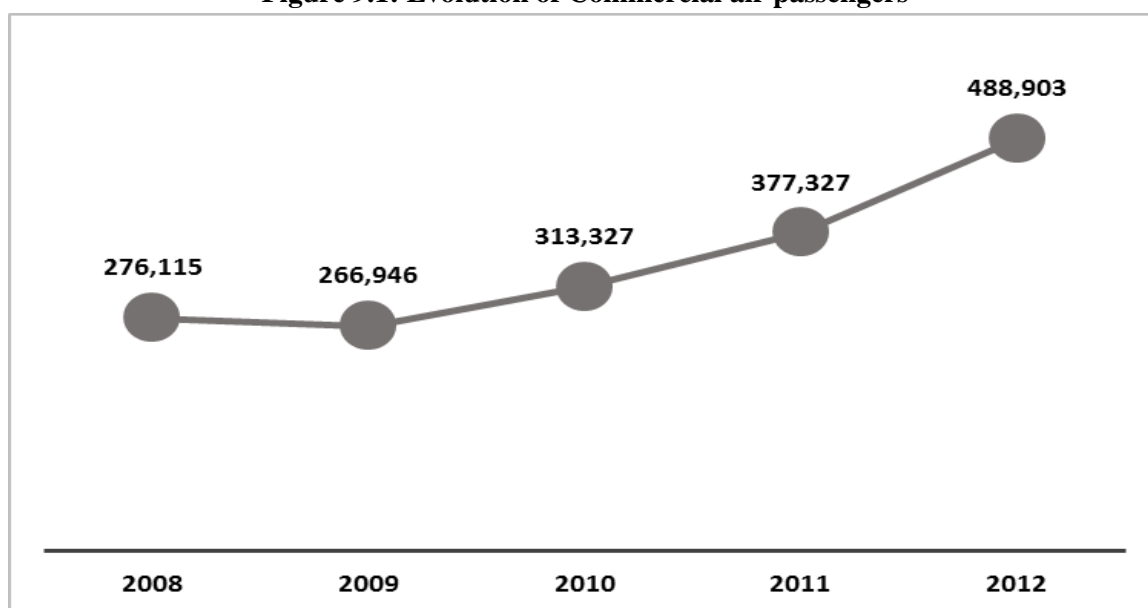

Figure 9.2: Classification of roads in (km)

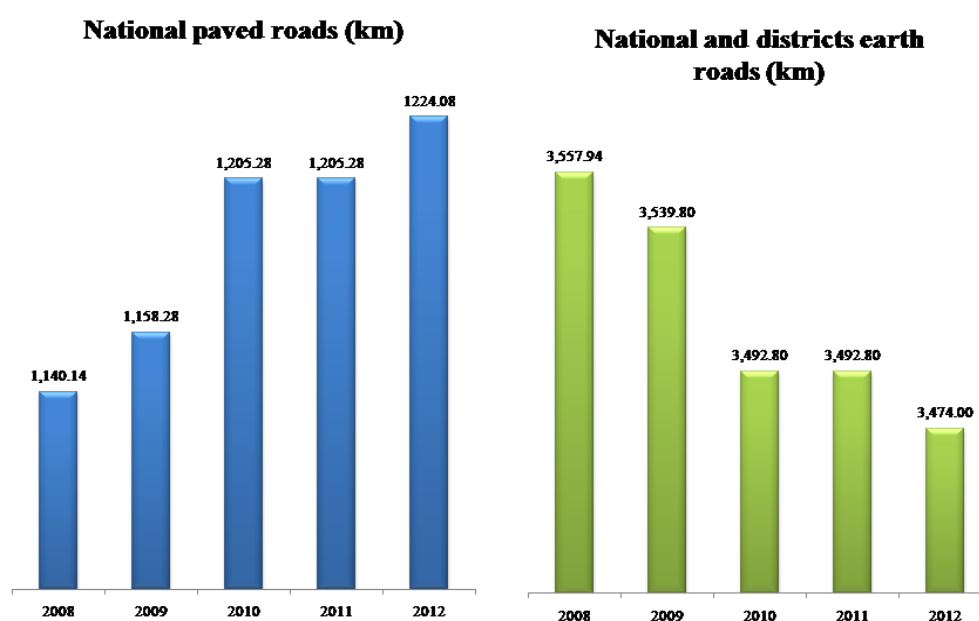


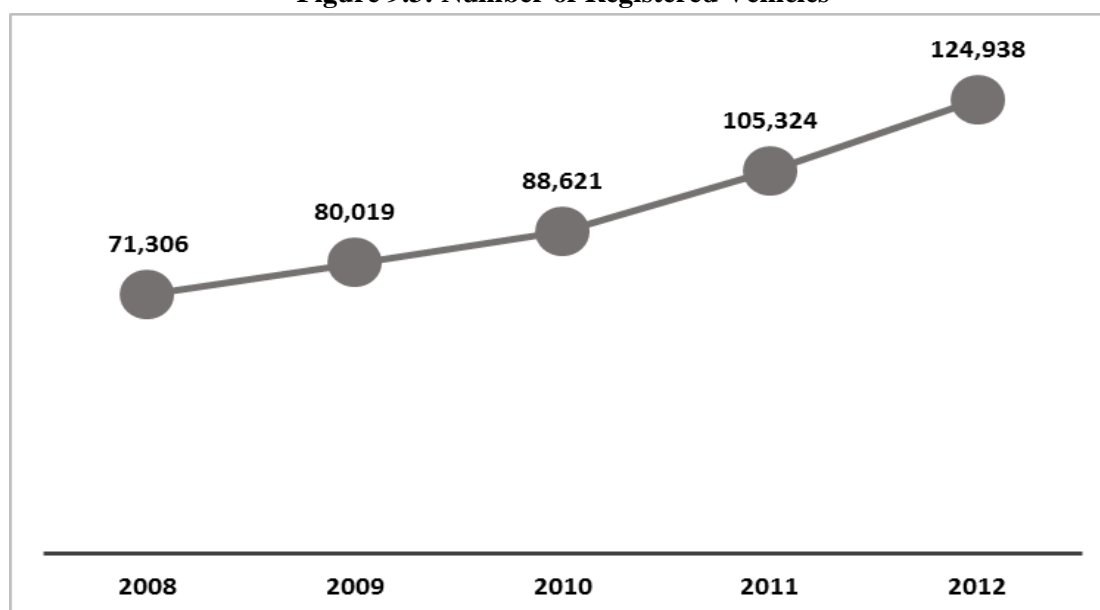

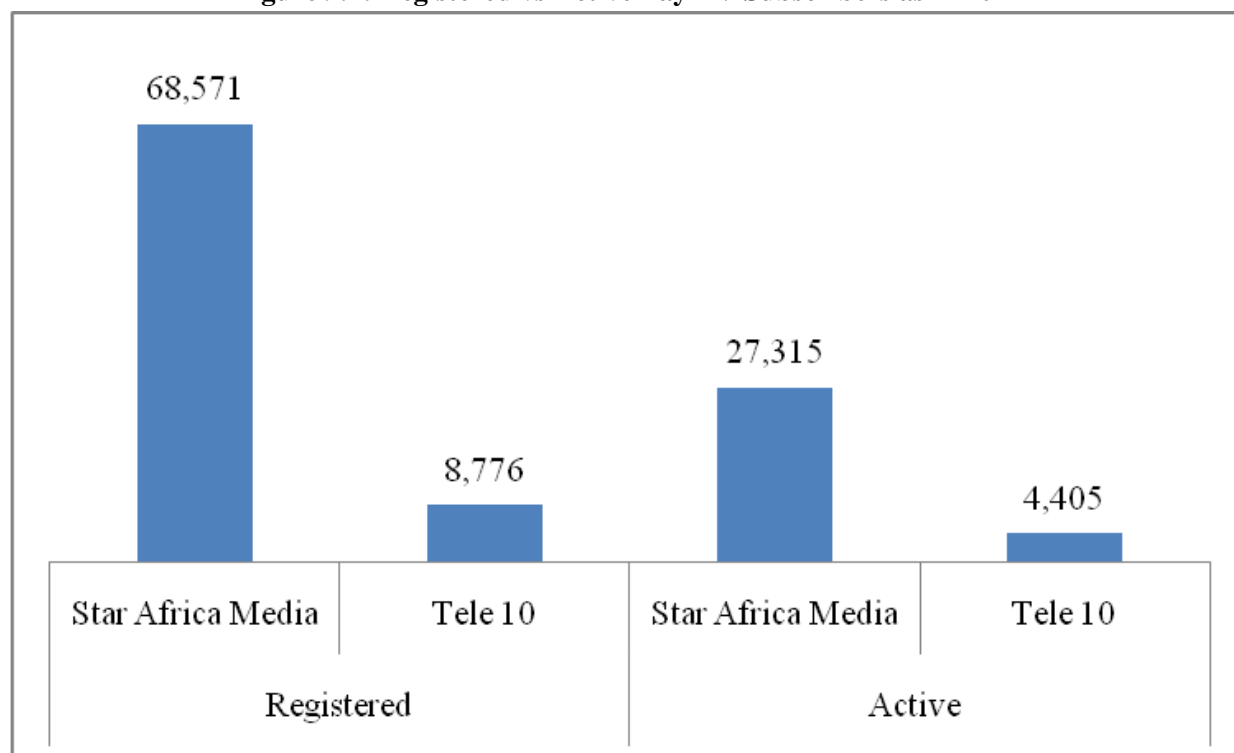

**Figure 9.4: Registered vs Active Pay TV Subscribers as in 2012**

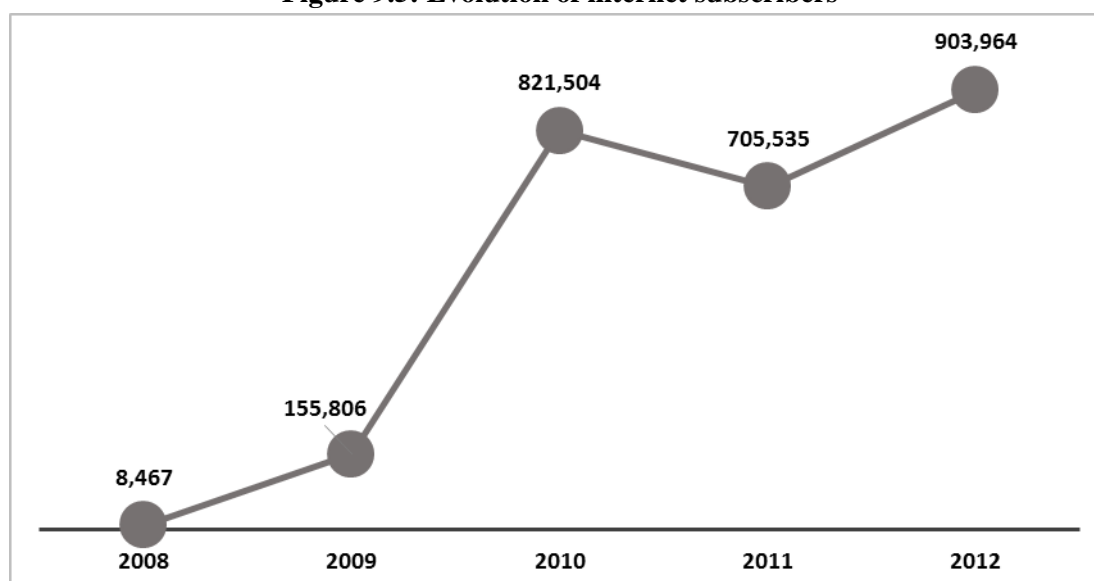

**Figure 9.5: Evolution of internet subscribers**

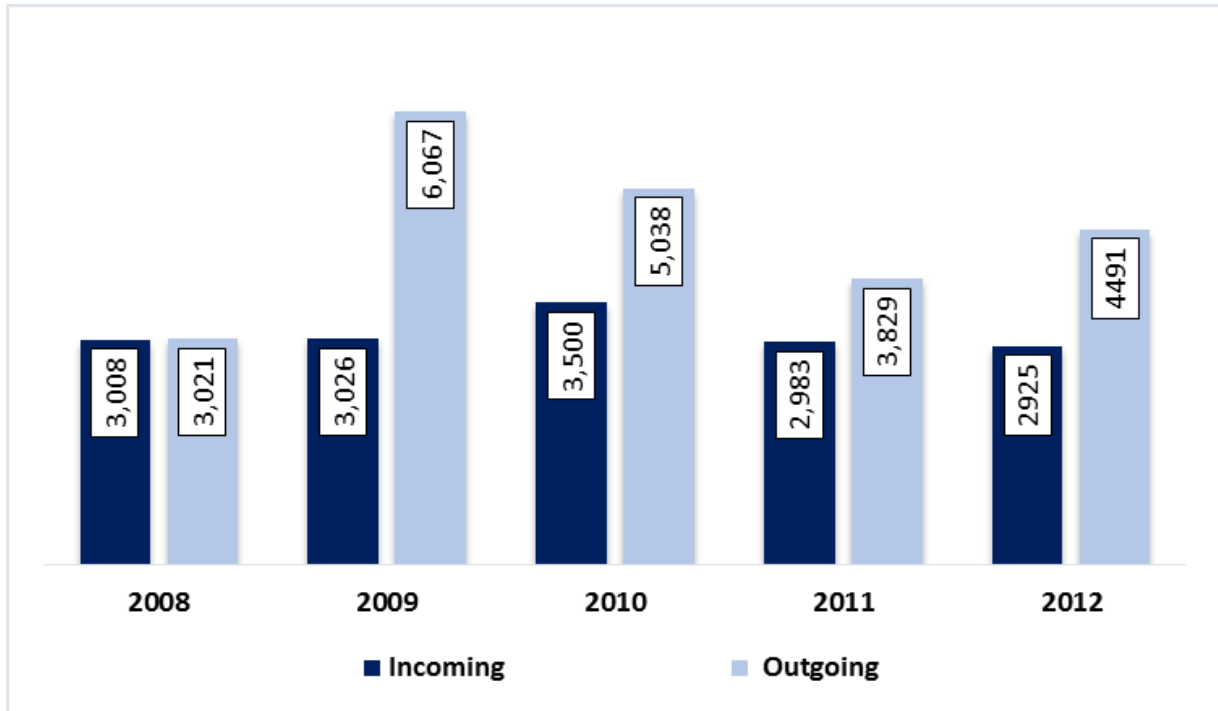

**Figure 10.1: Visitor Arrivals in Rwanda by Region**

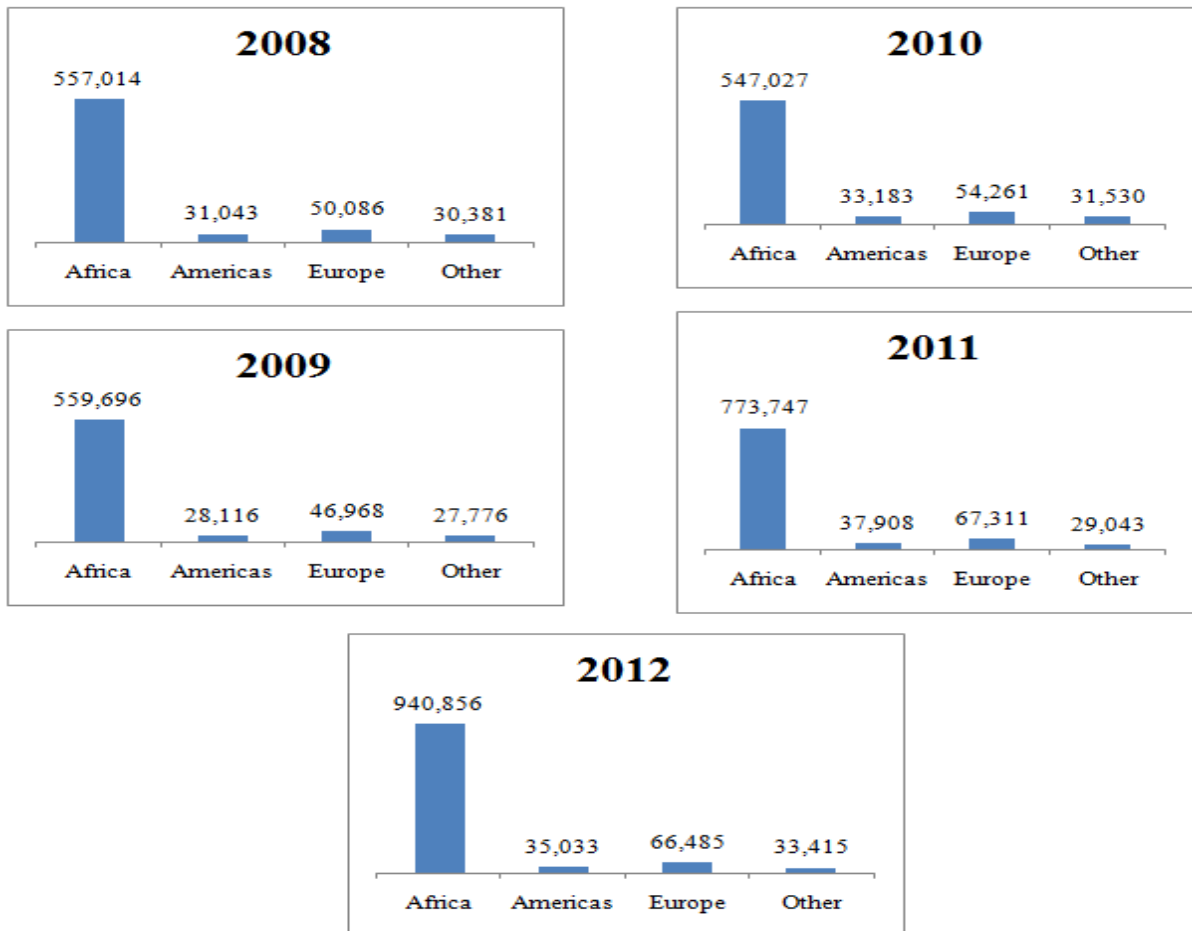


Figure 10.2: Total Tourist Arrivals in Rwanda

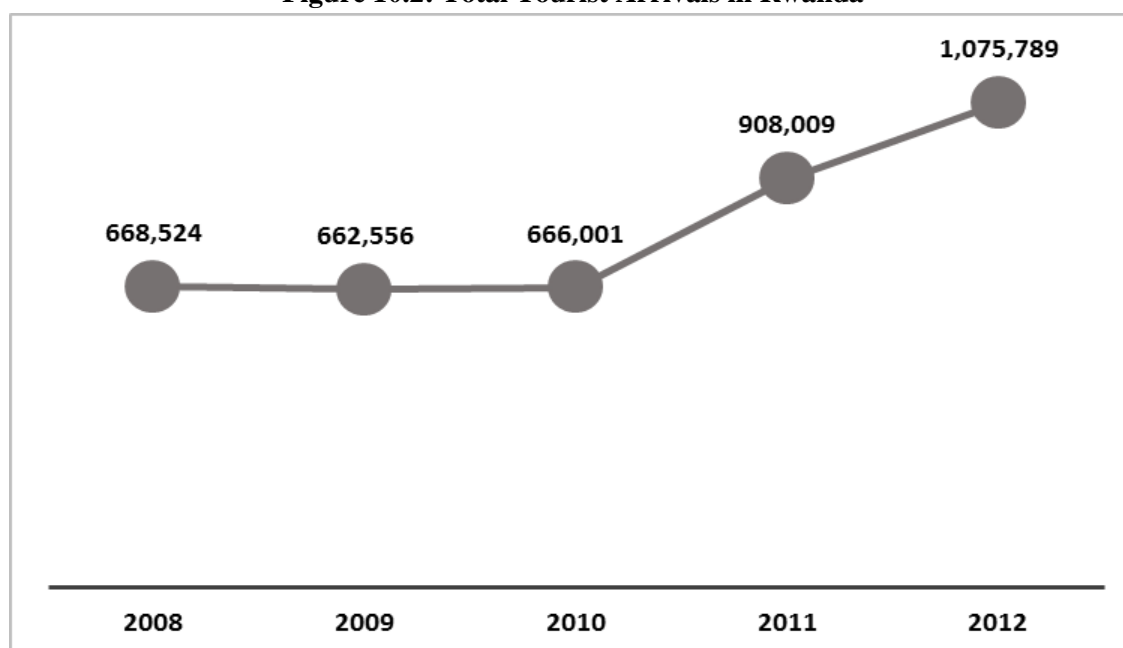

Figure 10.3: Visitor Arrivals in Rwanda by Purpose of Visit

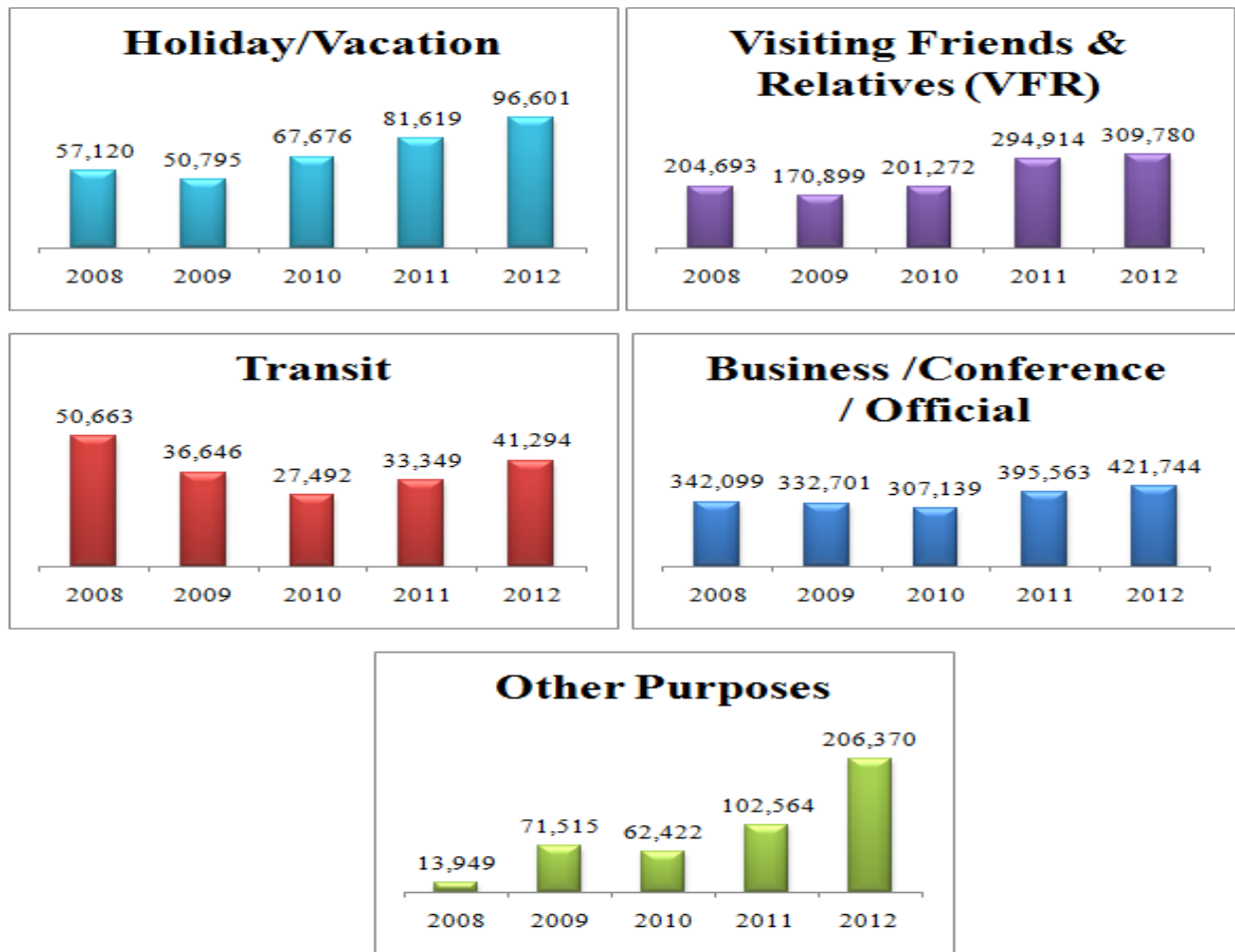

Figure 10.4: Visitor Arrivals in Rwanda by country of origin

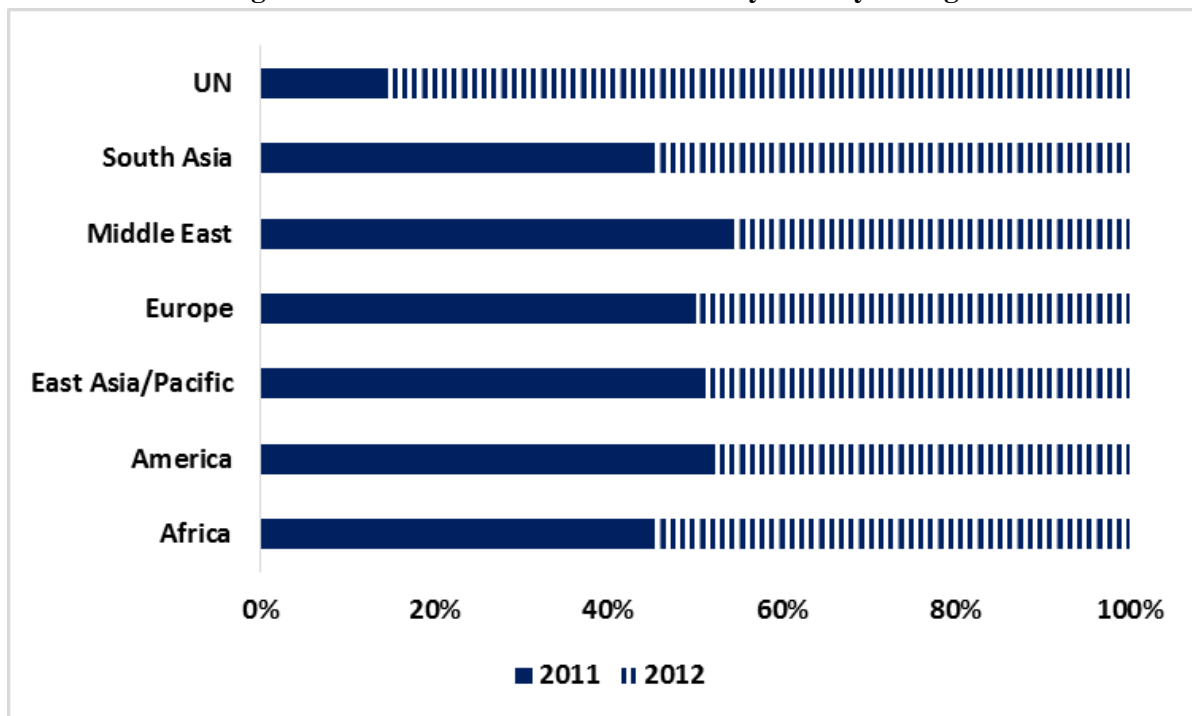
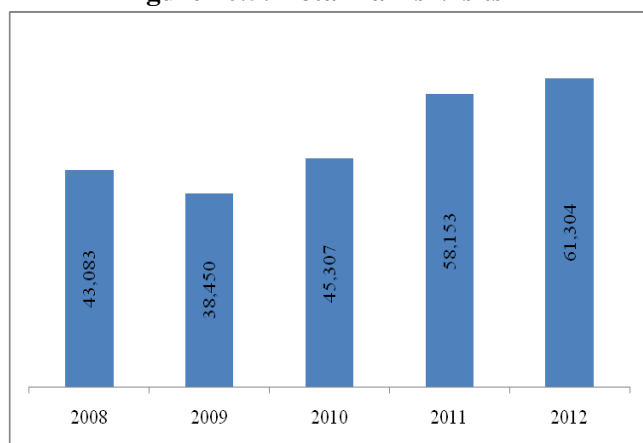

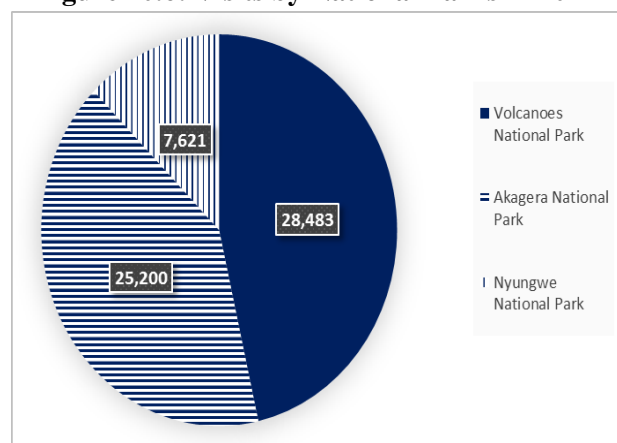

**Figure 10.6: Visits by National Parks in 2012**

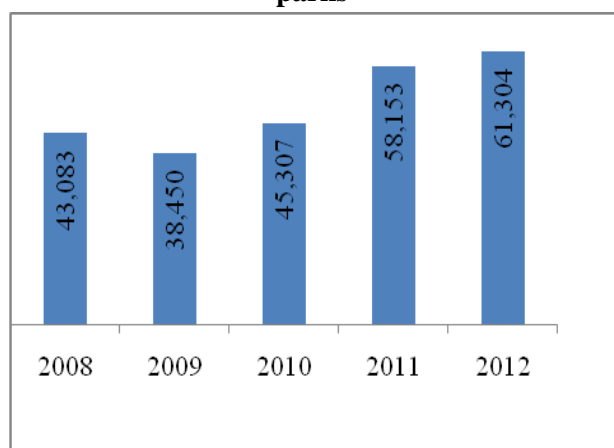

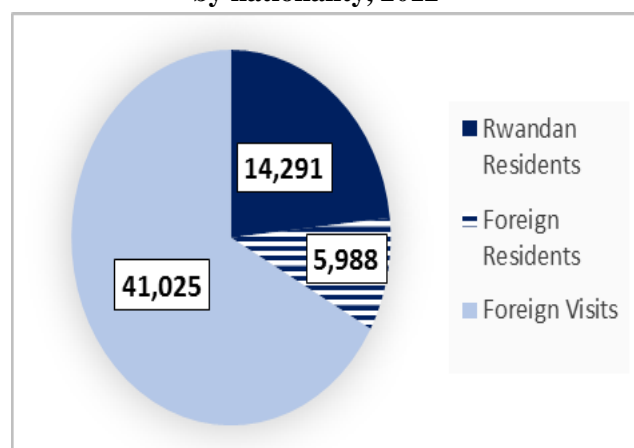

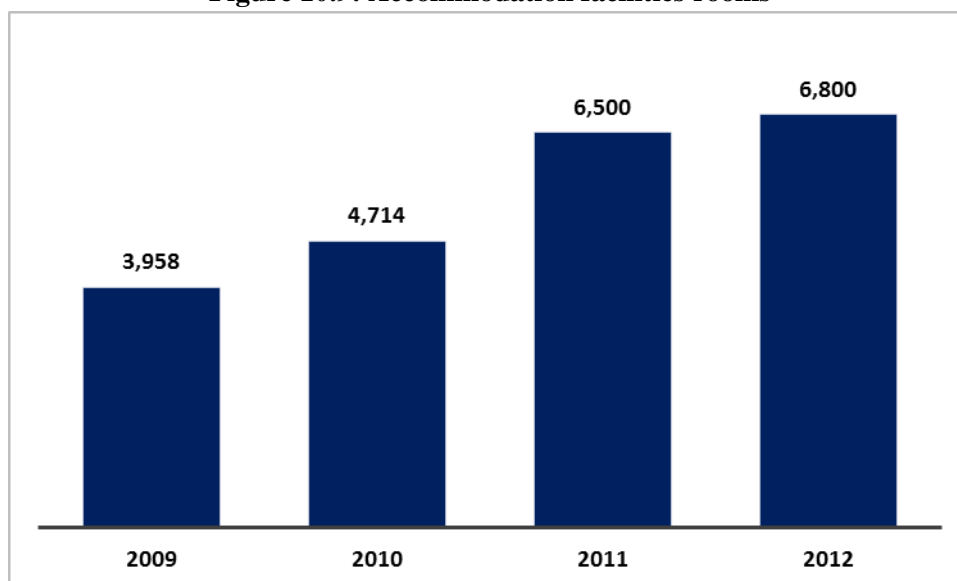

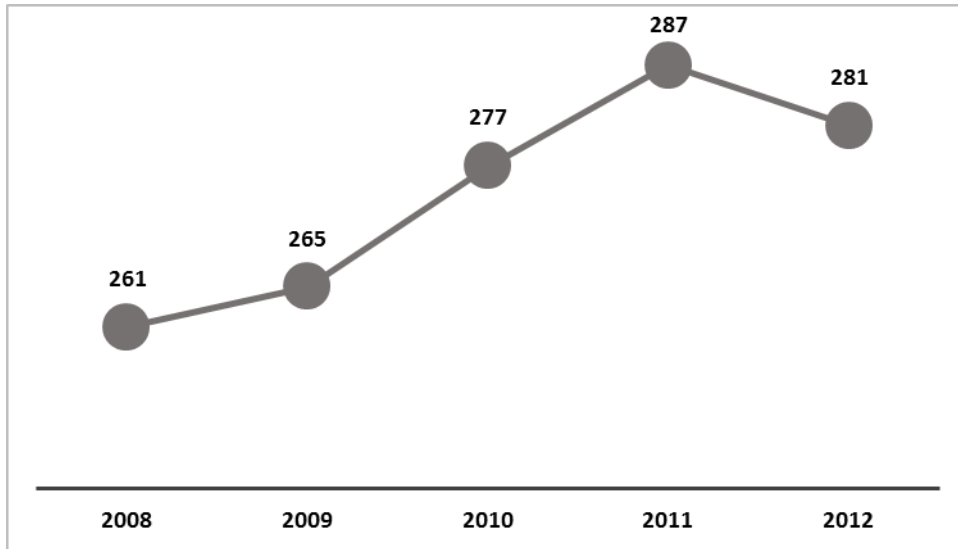

Figure 11.1: Trends in GDP activities

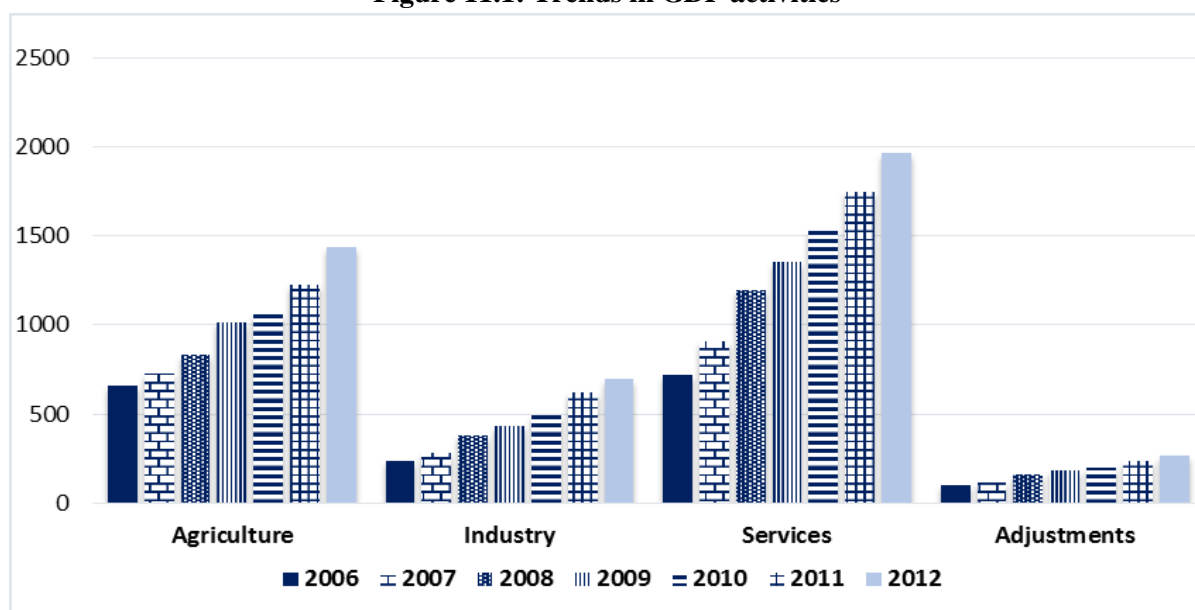

Figure 11.2: GDP by Kind of Activity Shares at current prices (percentages)

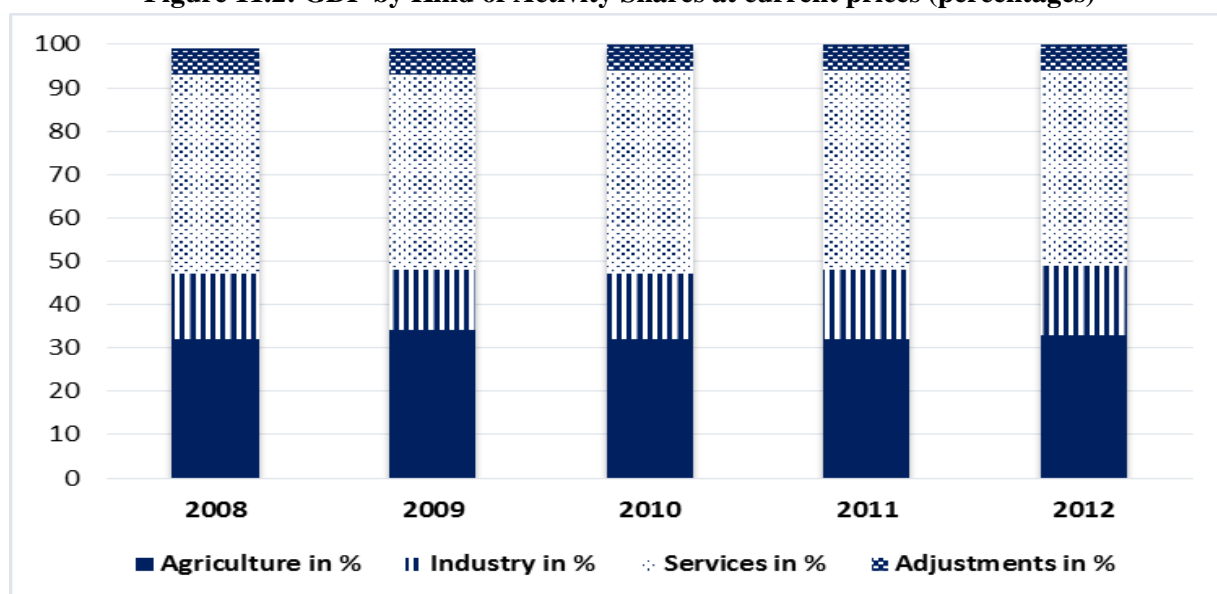

Figure 11.3: GDP by Kind of Activity at constant 2006 prices (in billion 2006 Frw)

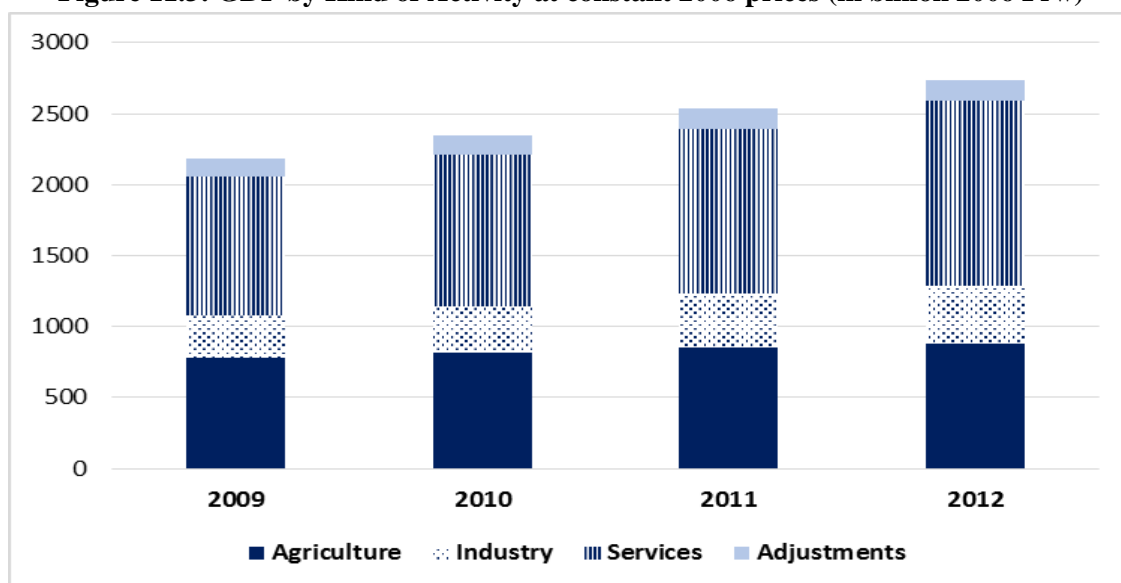

Figure 11.4: Growth rates of GDP by Kind of Activity at constant 2006 prices (percentage change from previous year)

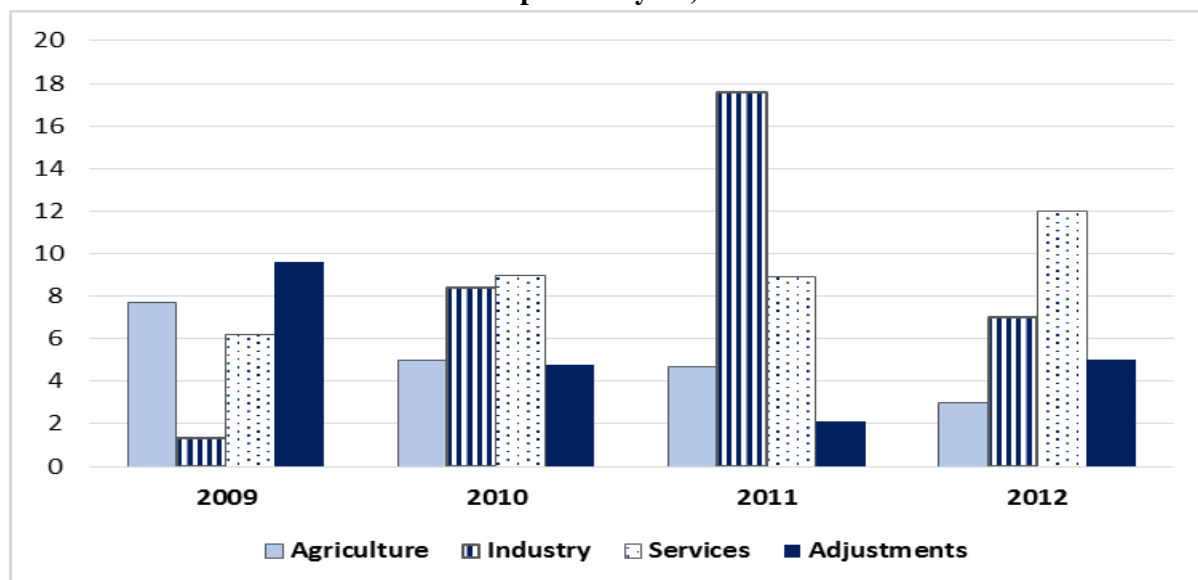

Figure 11.5: GDP by Kind of Activity / Deflators

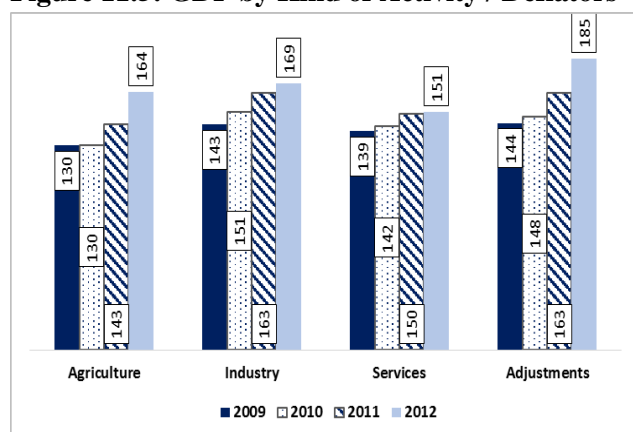


Figure 11.6: GDP Deflators (2006=100)

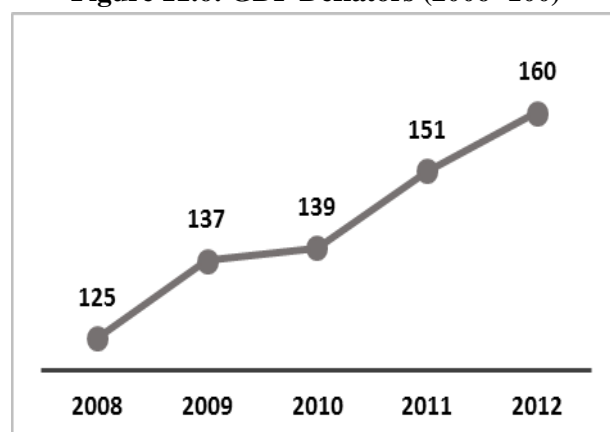

Figure 11.7: Total GDP final consumption expenditure

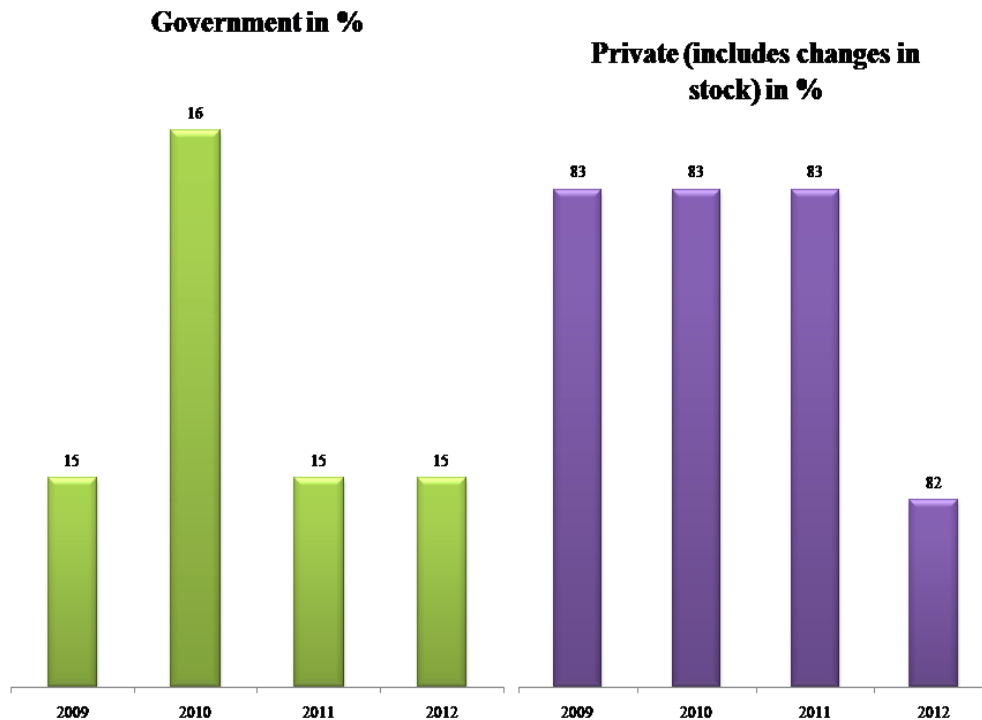

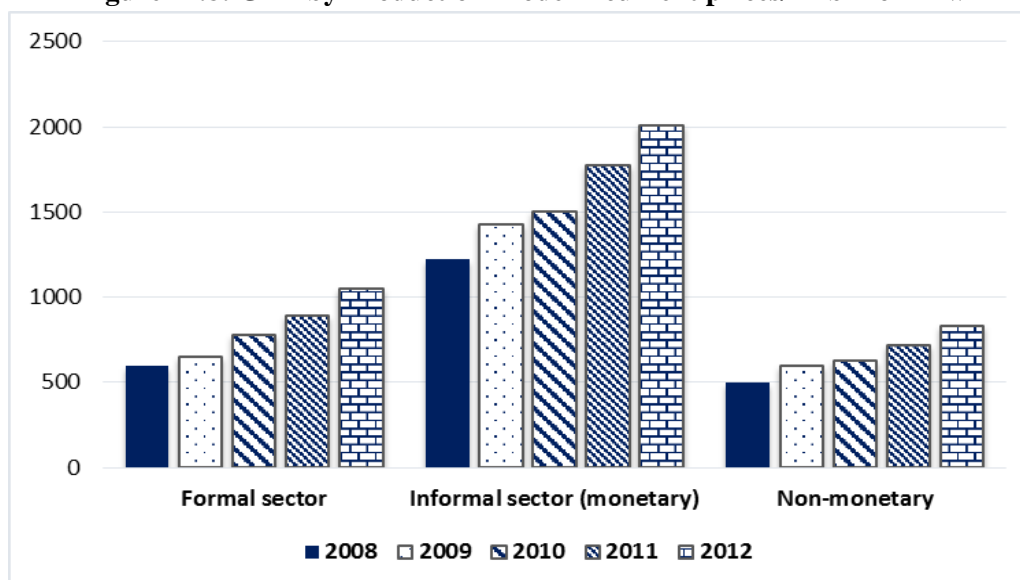

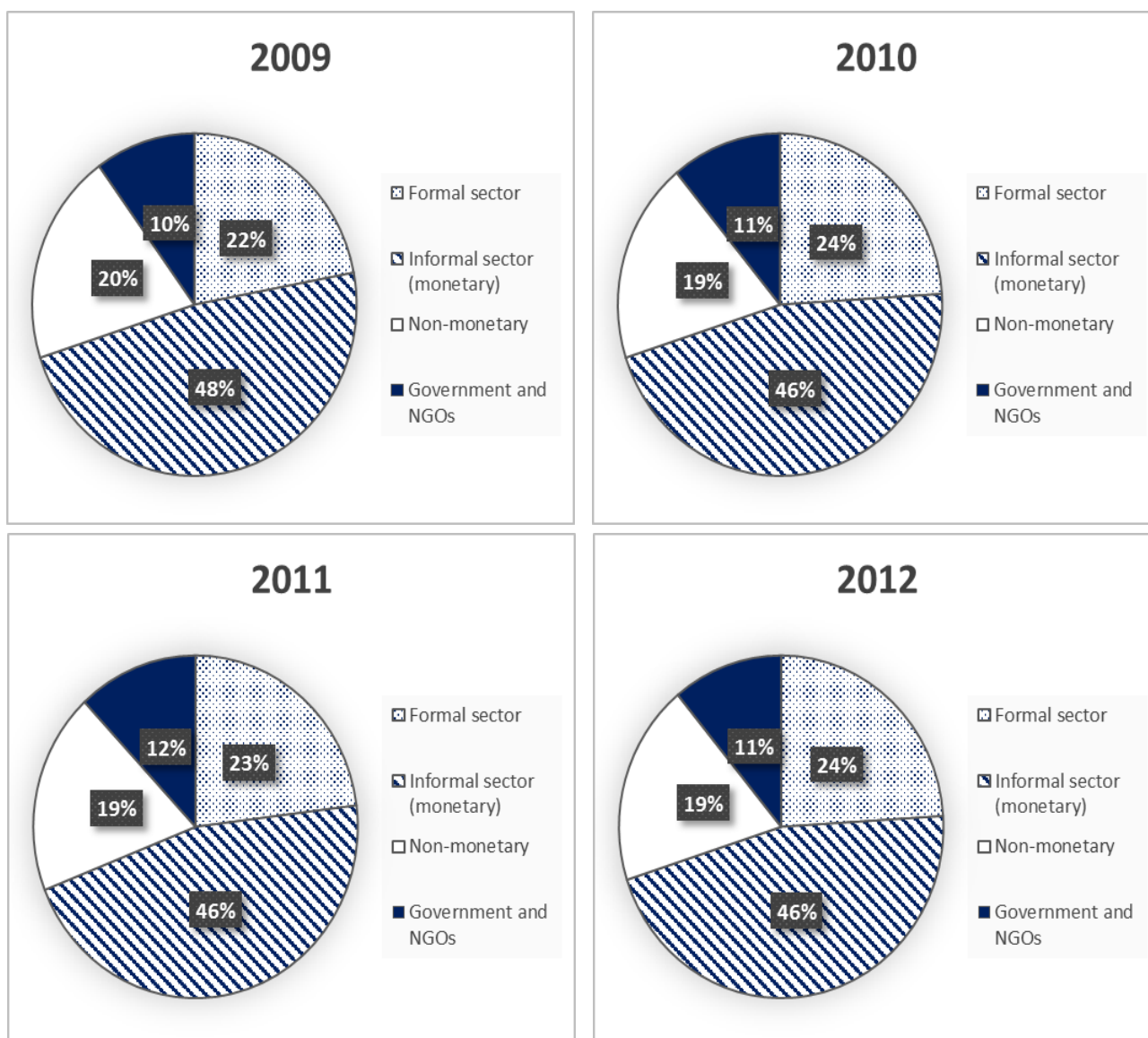

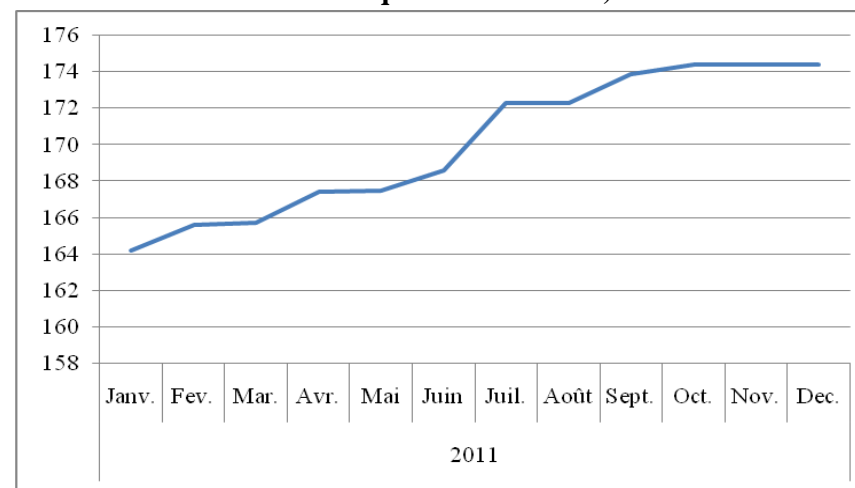

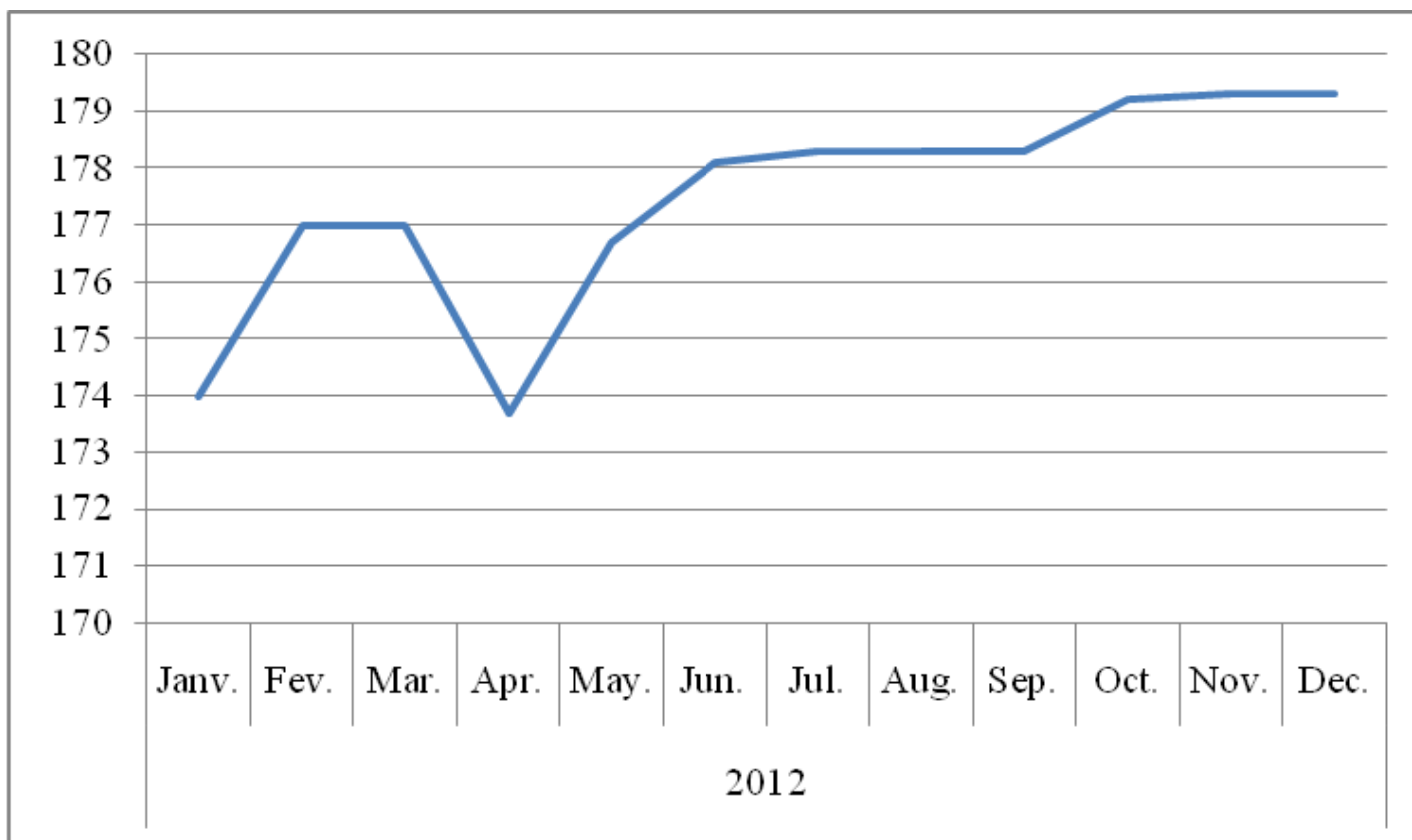
**Figure 12.1: PPI for Mainly Local Sold products, 2010 (Base Period: Fourth quarter 2003 =100)**

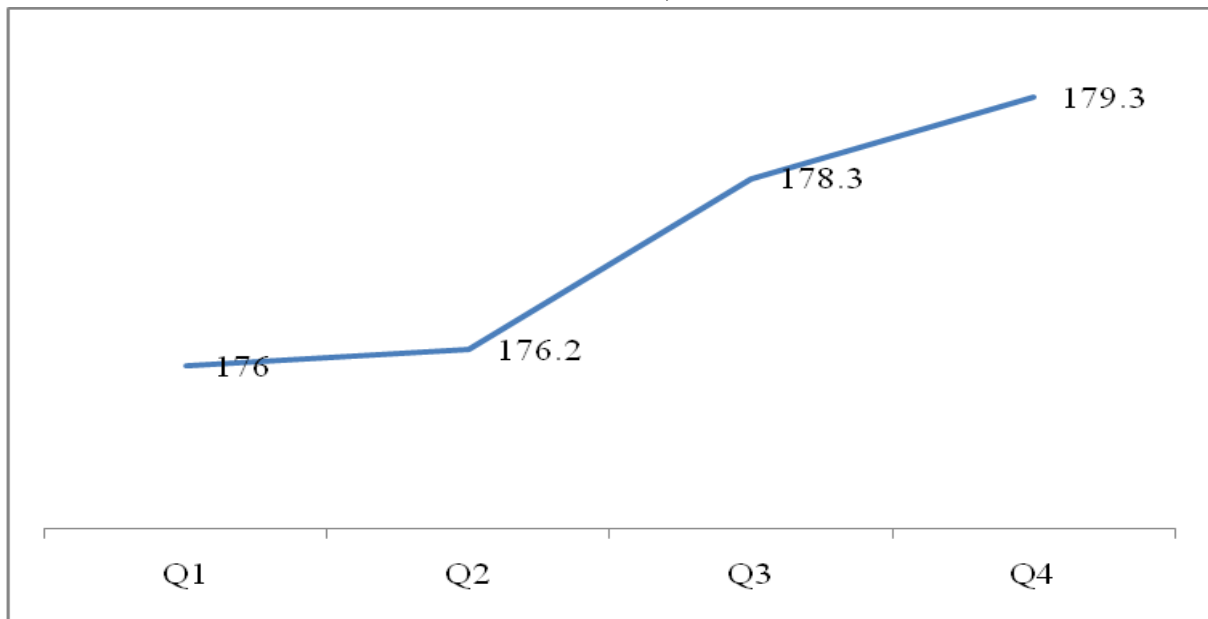

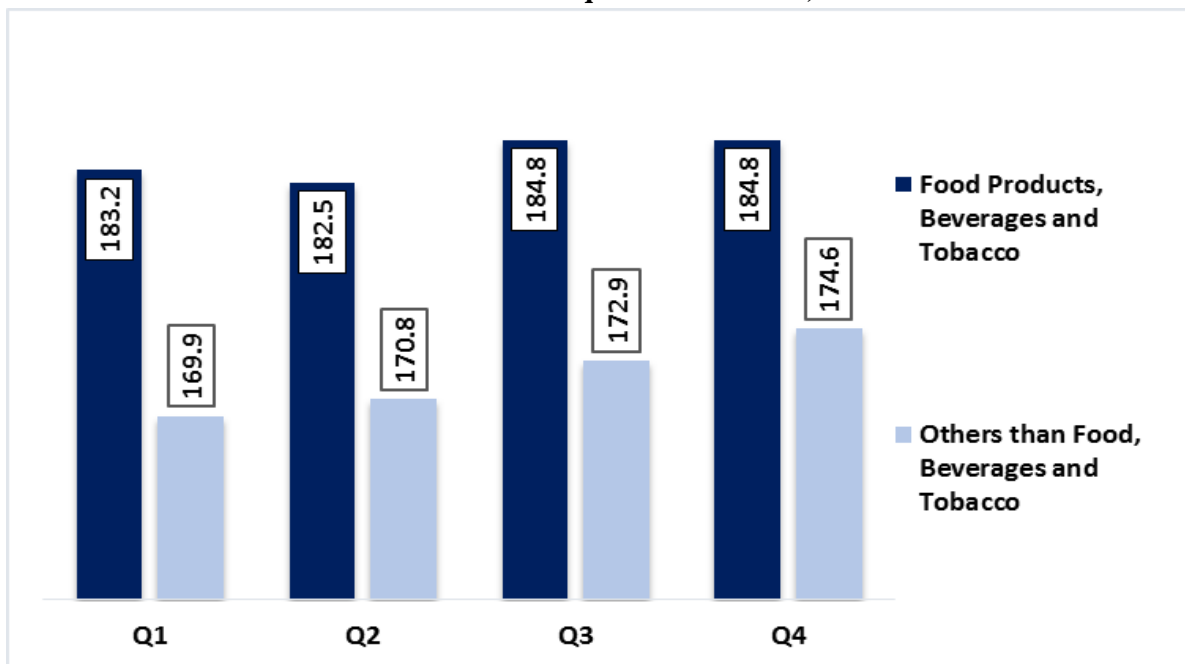

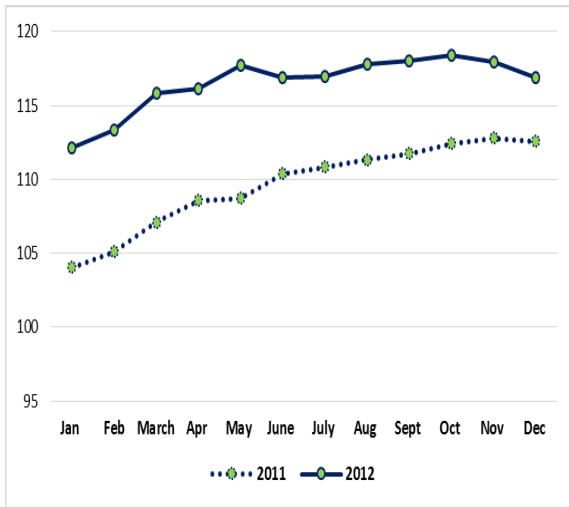

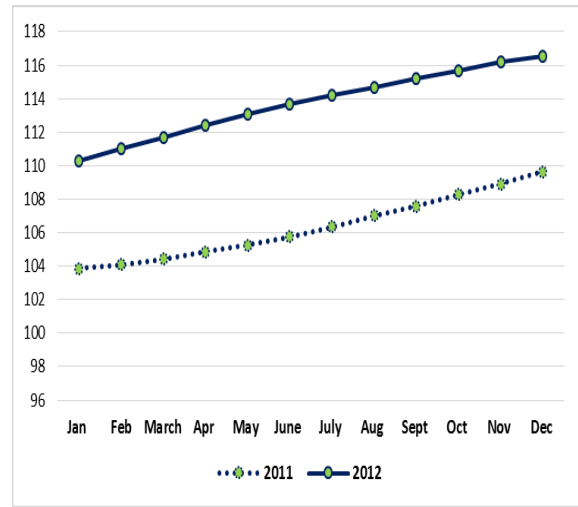

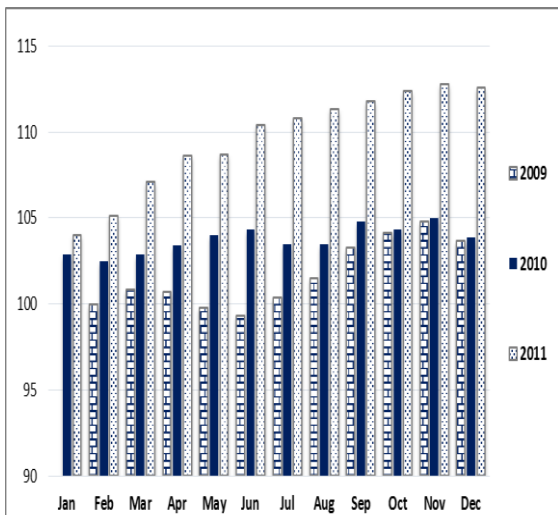
**Figure 12.6: Monthly (M) evolution of CPI, 2011 and 2012**



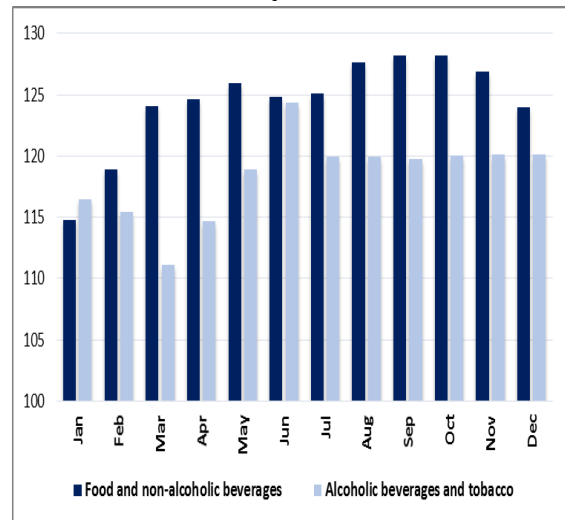
**Figure 12.7: Annual (A) evolution of CPI, 2011 and 2012**

Figure 13.1: Outstanding loans by maturity on 2011 and 2012 (in Rwf thousands)

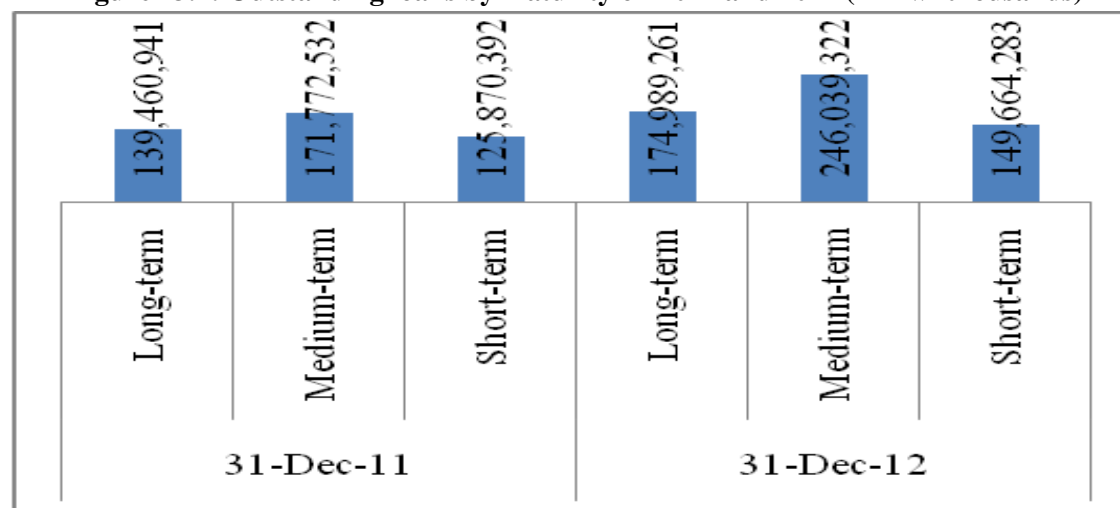

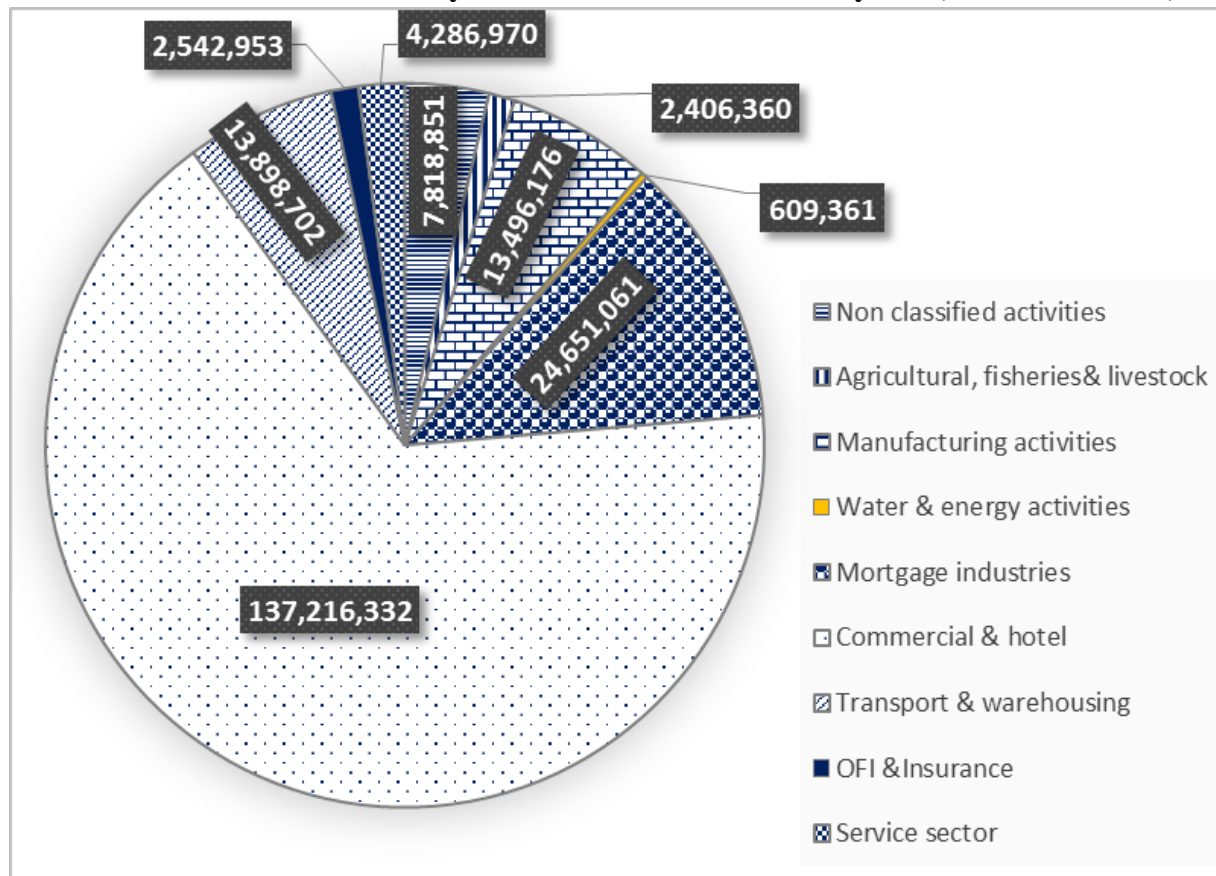

**Figure 13.2: Total new authorized loans by sector of activities and maturity 2012(in RWF thousand) Long term**

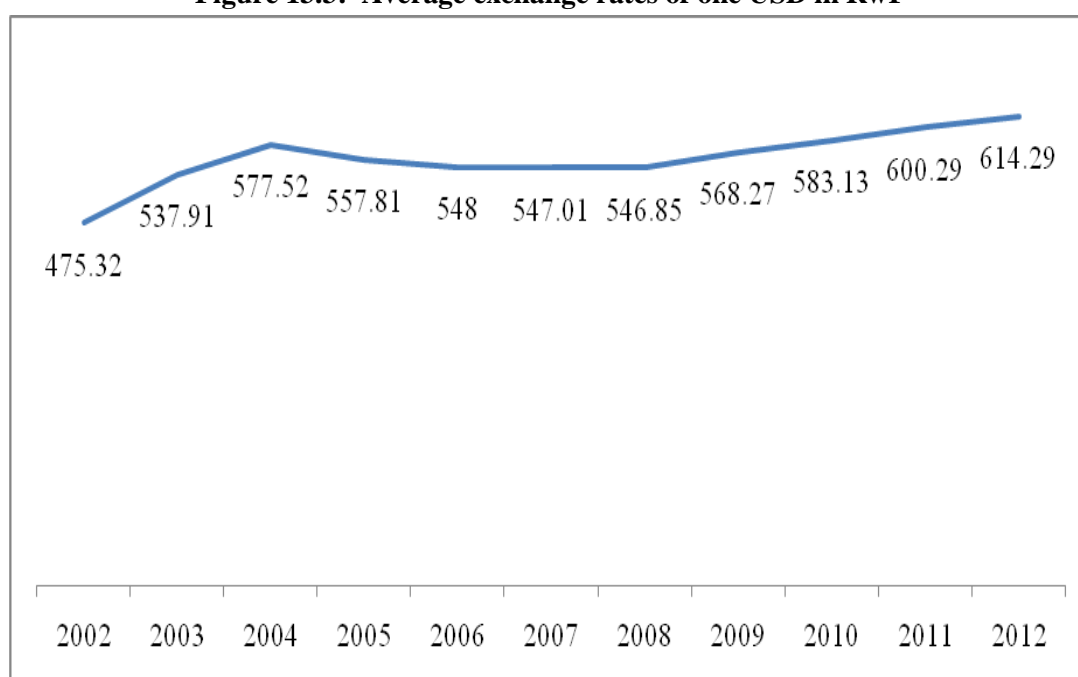

**Figure 13.3: Average exchange rates of one USD in RwF**



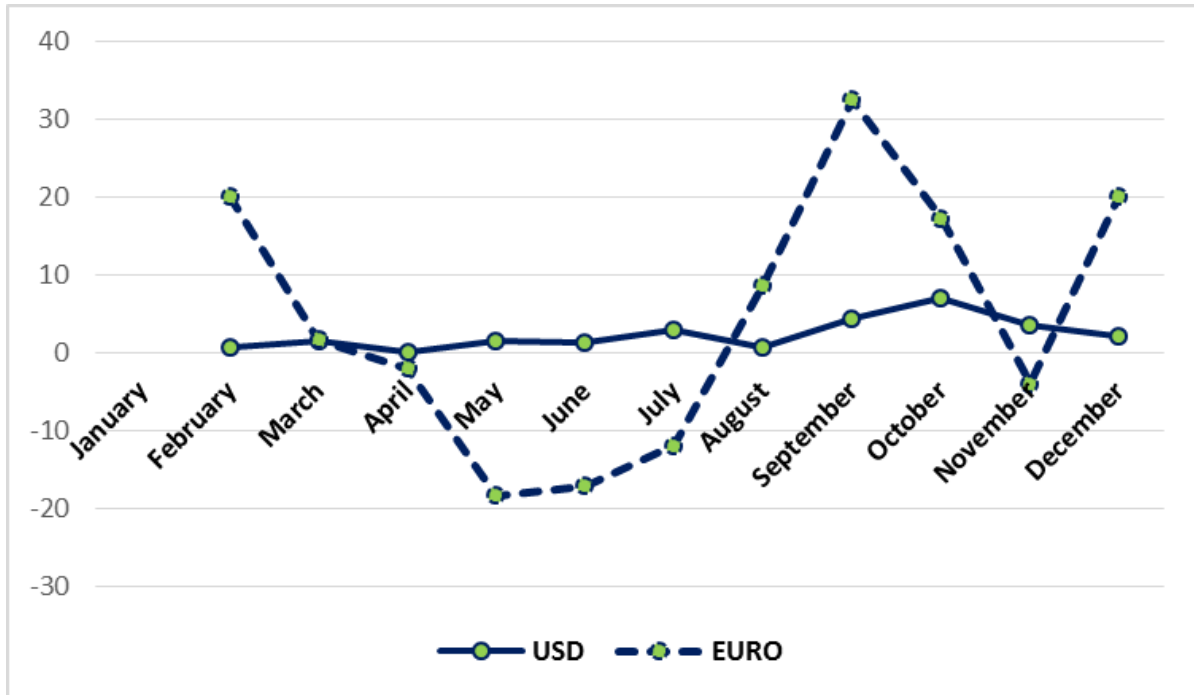

Figure 13.4: Average exchange rates of USD and EURO currencies in 2012

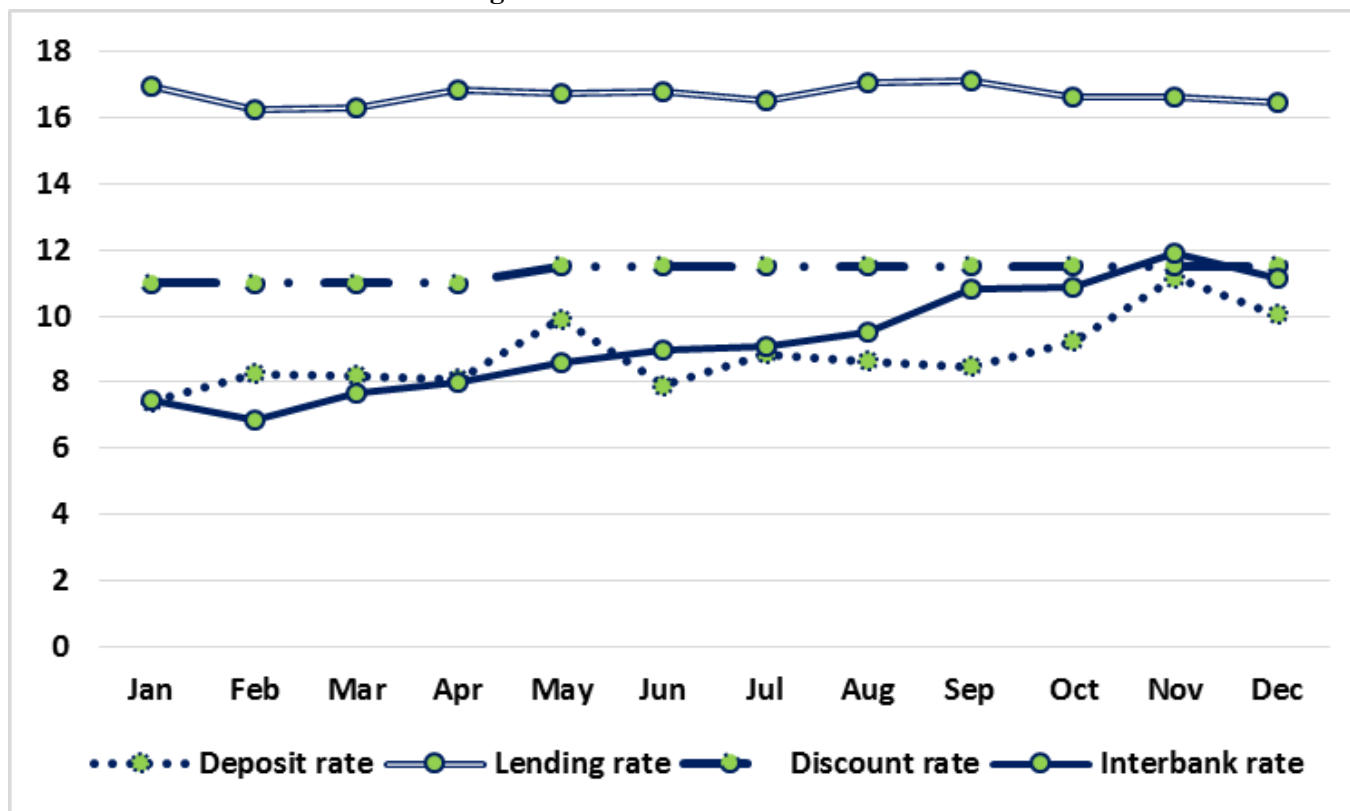

Figure 13.5 Interest Rates Structure



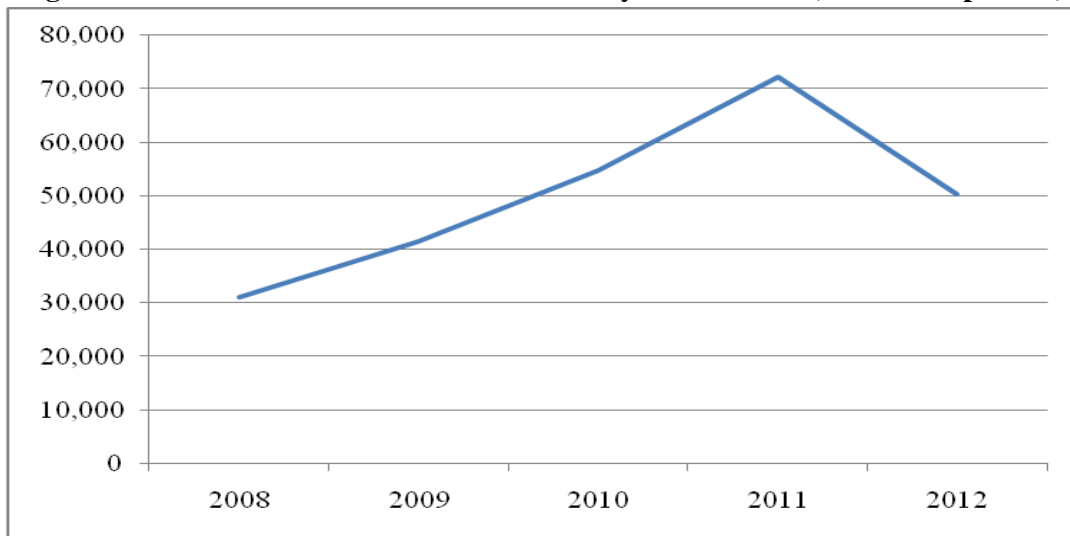

**Figure 13.6: Evolution of Total Life Insurance by CORAR S.A (Number of policies)**

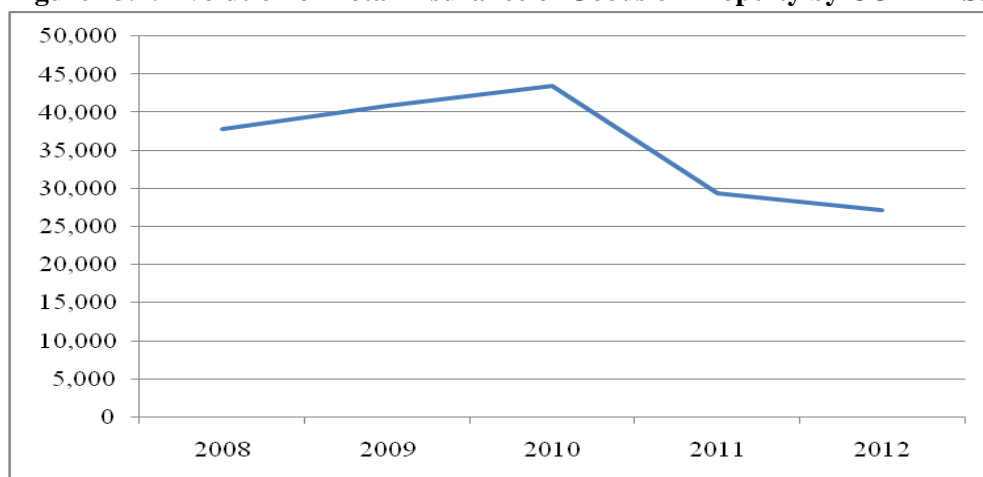

**Figure 13.7: Evolution of Total Insurance of Goods or Property by CORAR S.A**

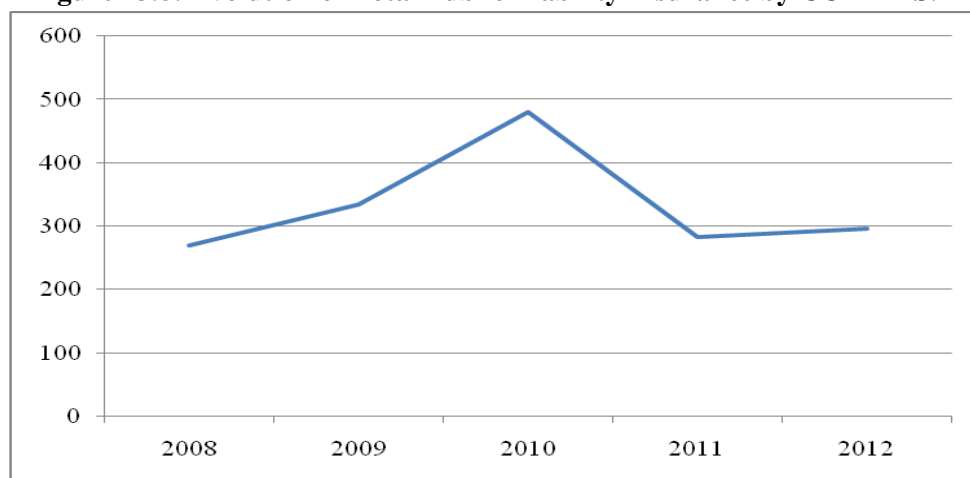

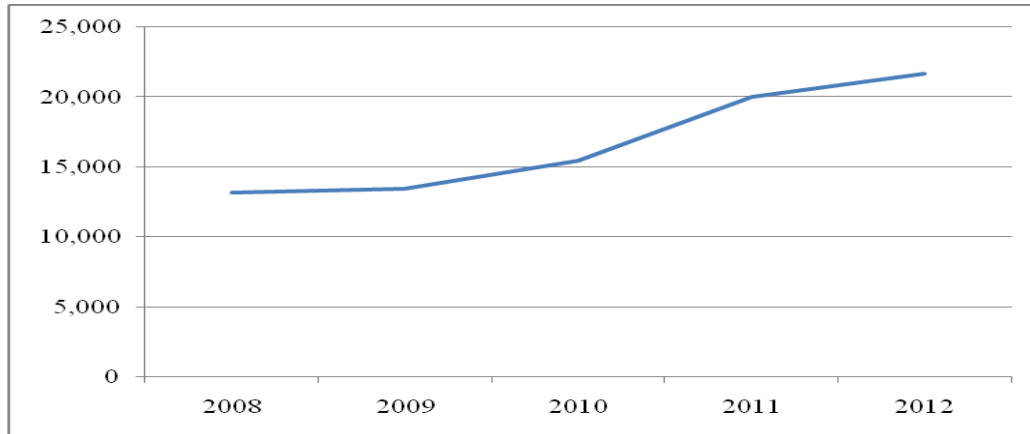

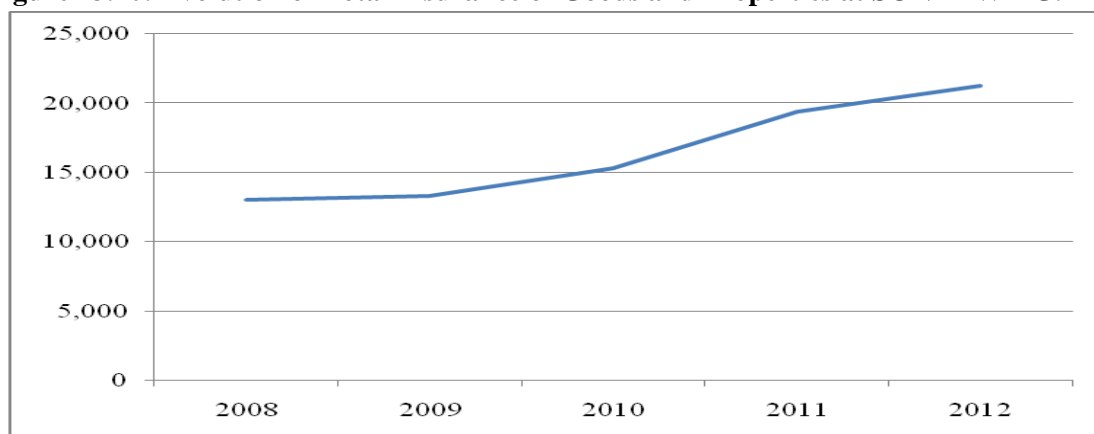

**Figure 13.10: Evolution of Total Insurance of Goods and Properties at SONARWA G.I Ltd**

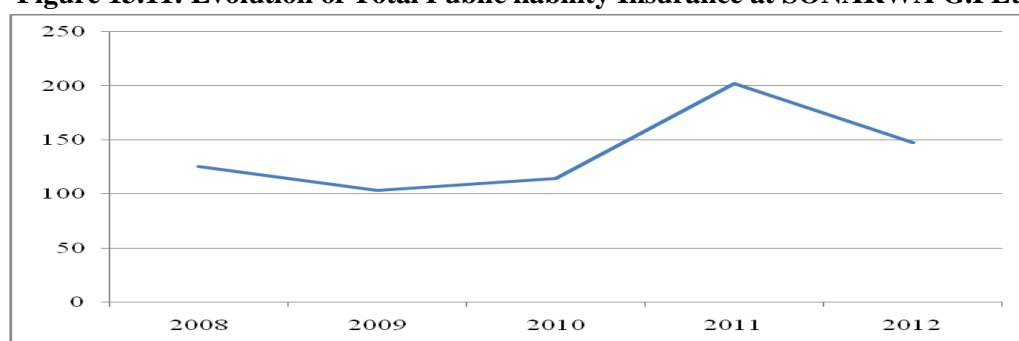

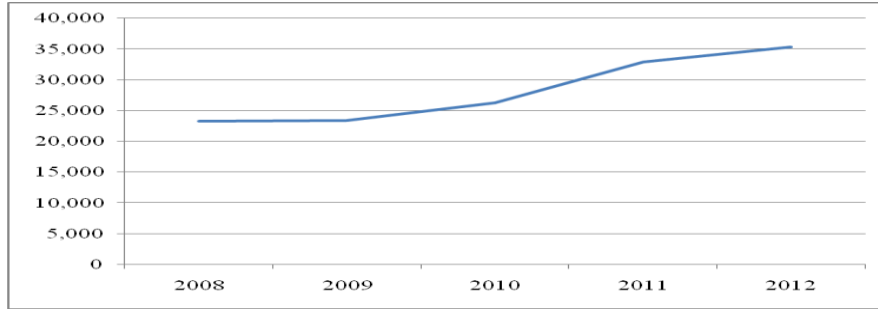

**Figure 13.12: Total Distribution of Policies by Class of business by SONARWA G.I Ltd**

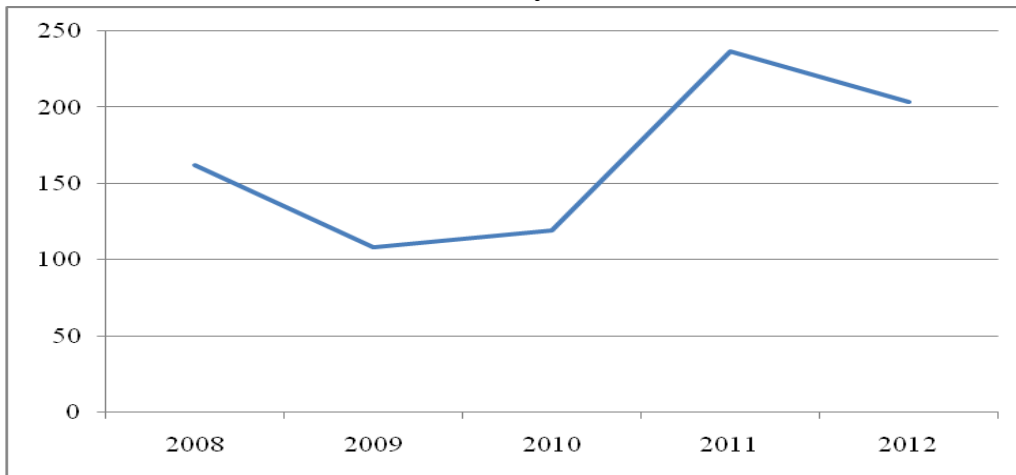

**Figure 13.13: Evolution of Total Public liability Insurance Policies at SONARWA G.I Ltd**



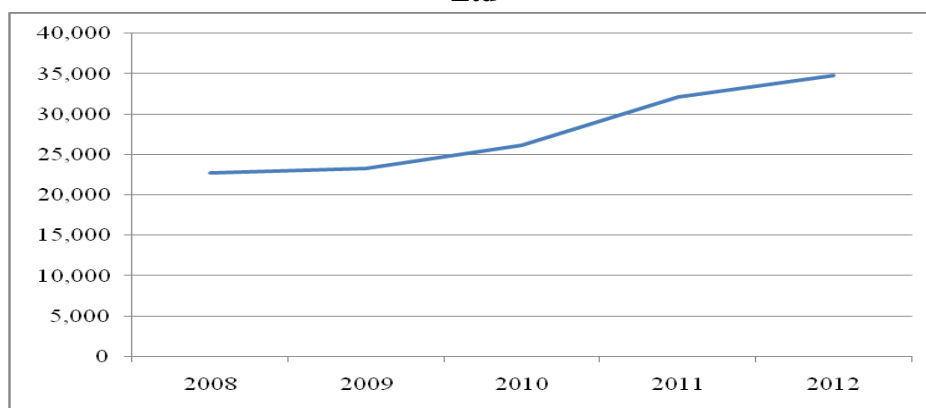

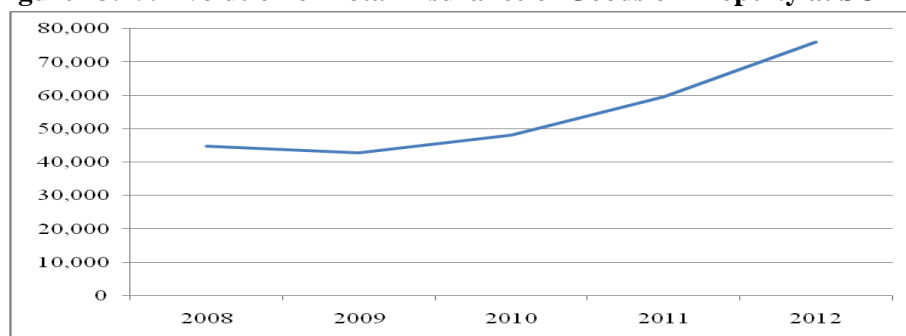

**Figure 13.15: Evolution of Total Insurance of Goods or Property at SORAS**

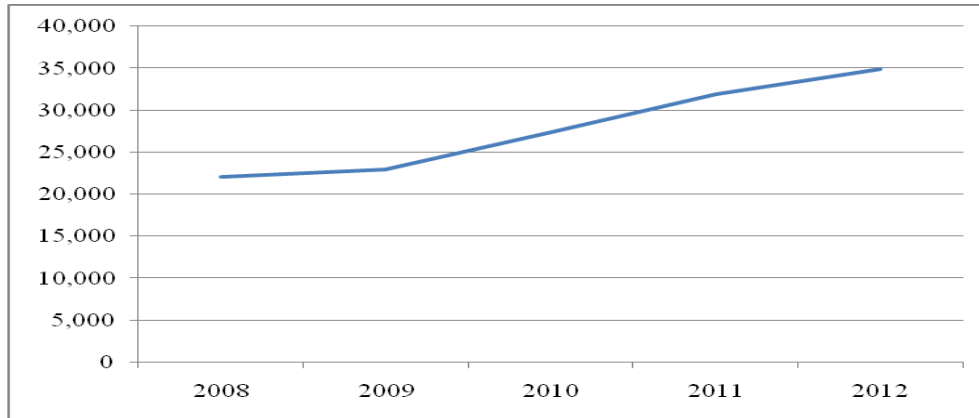

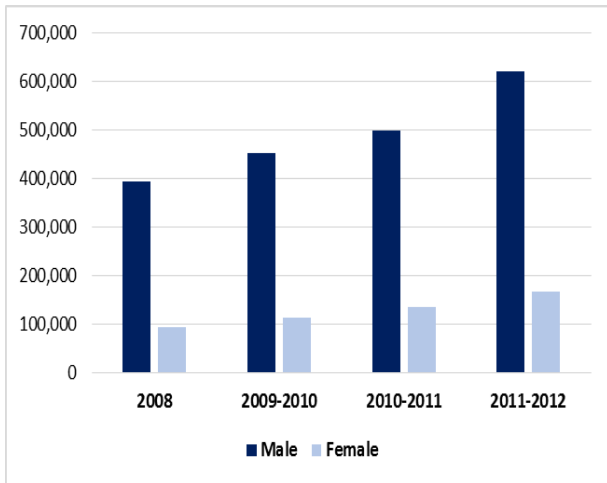

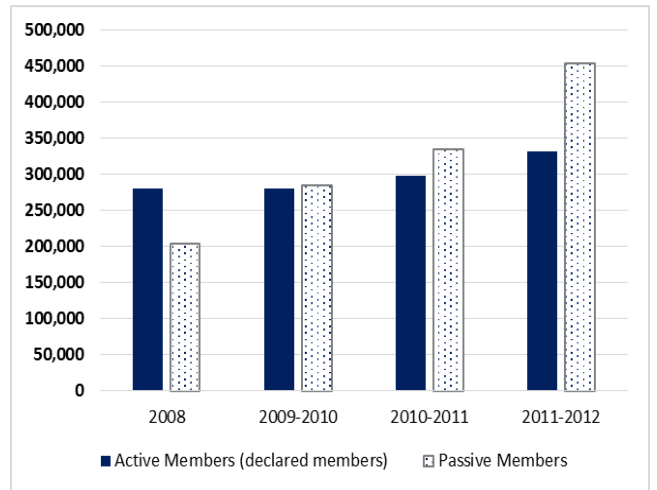

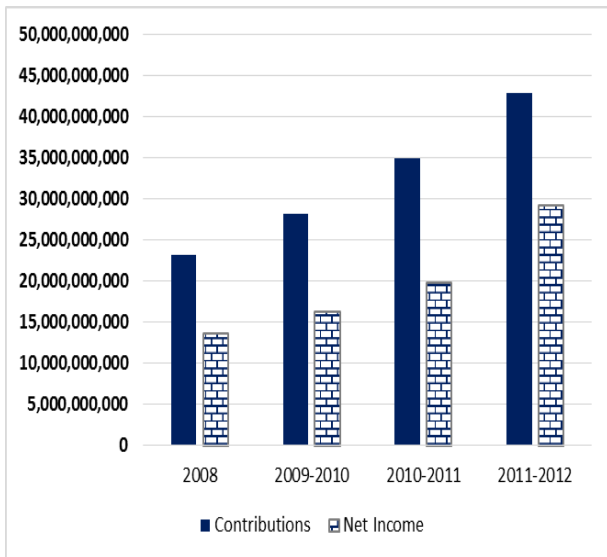
**Figure 13.17: RSSB/Pension Members by sex**



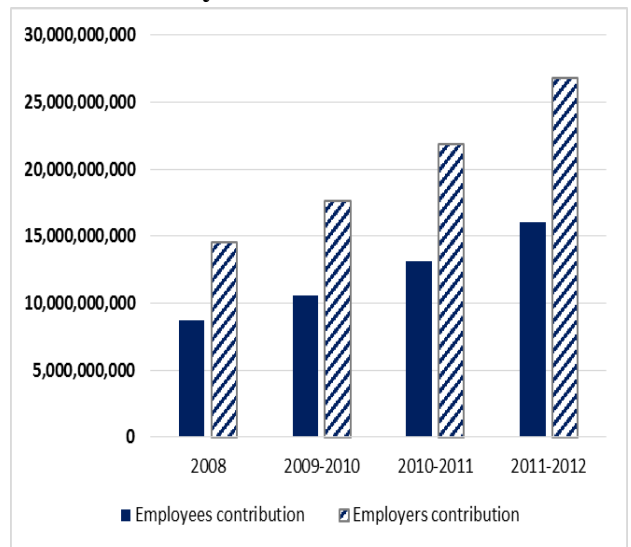
**Figure 13.18: RSSB/Pension Membership**

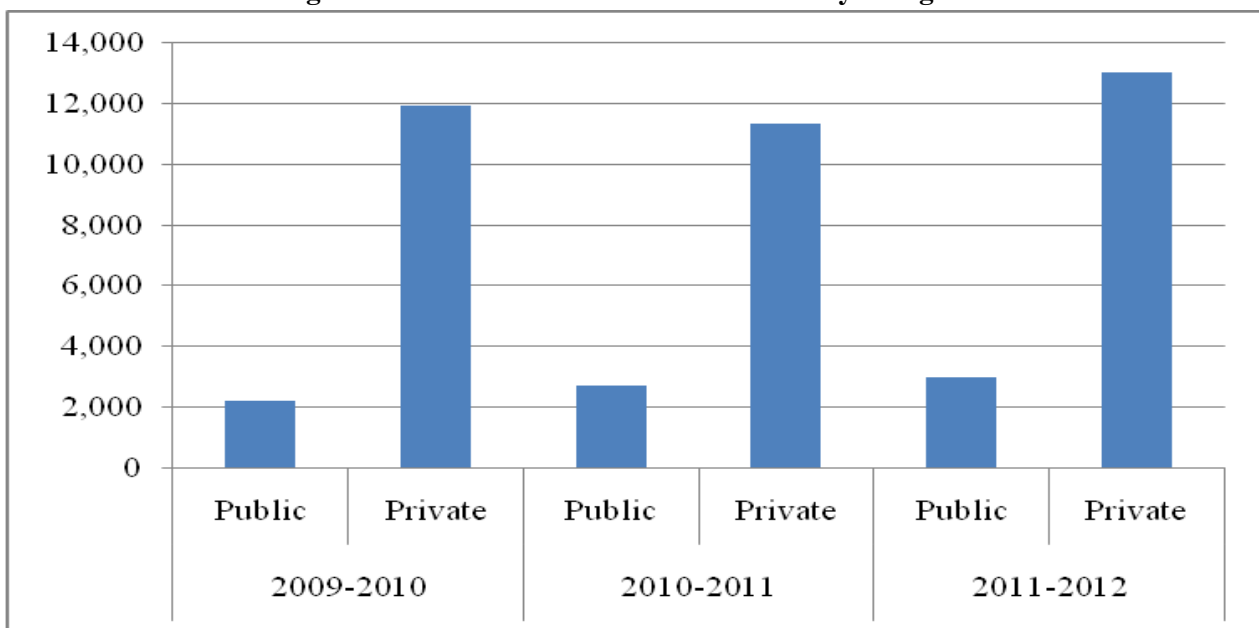

**Figure 13.21: Total Number of Institutions by Categories**





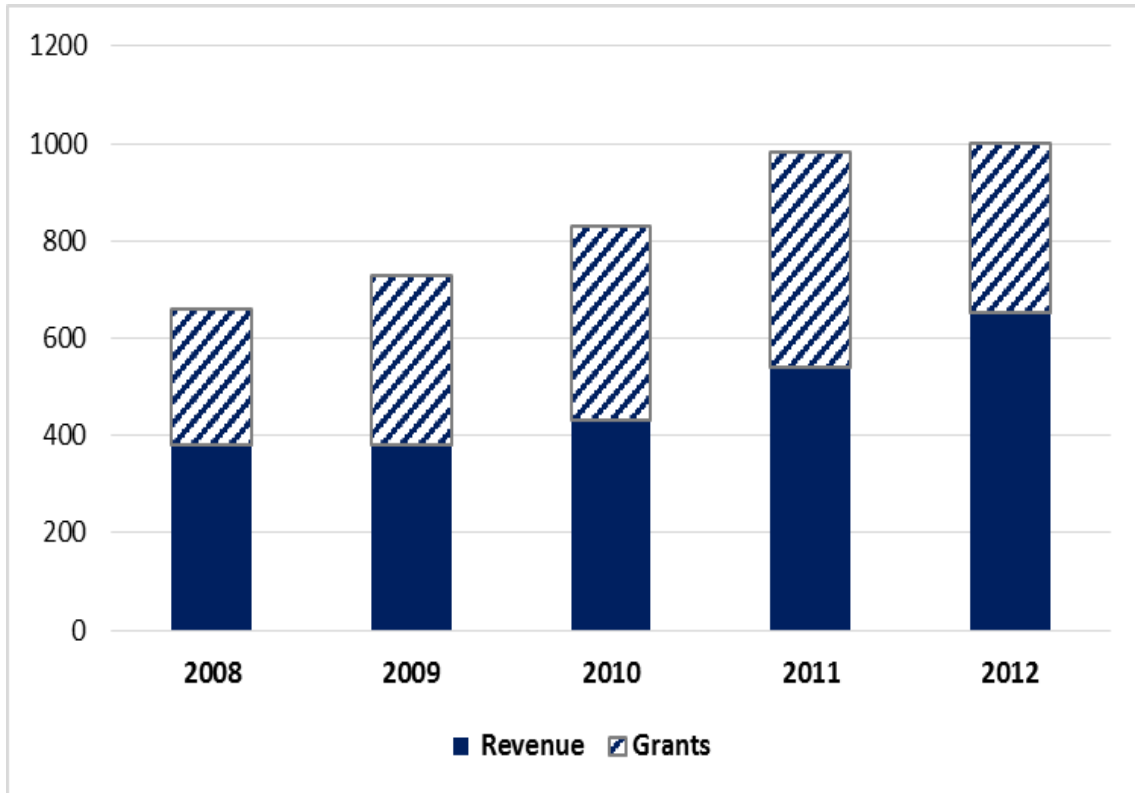

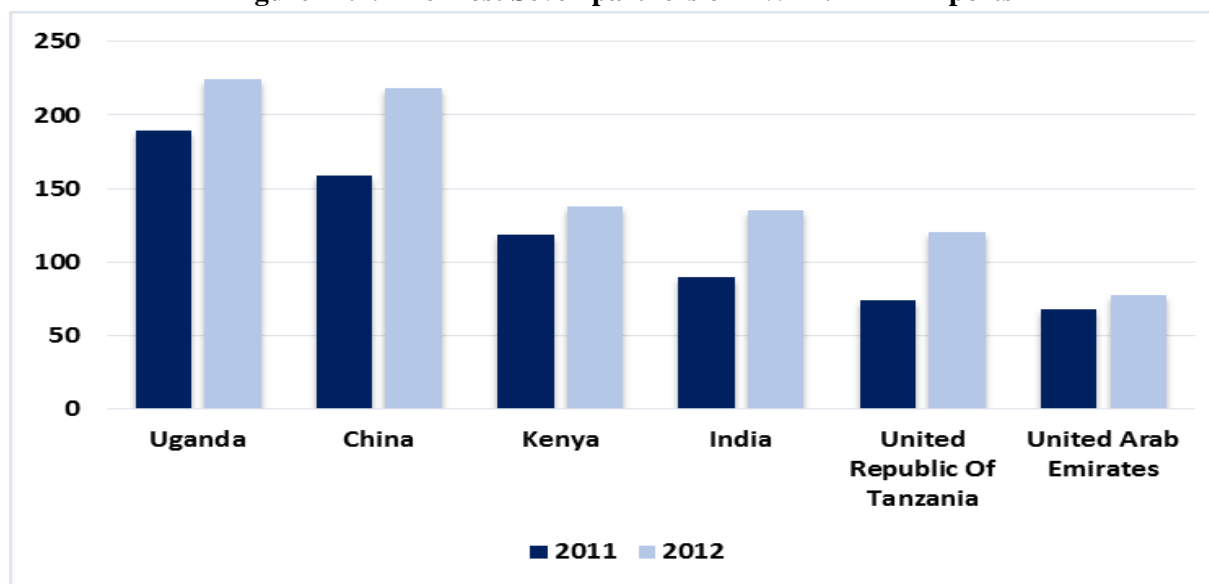

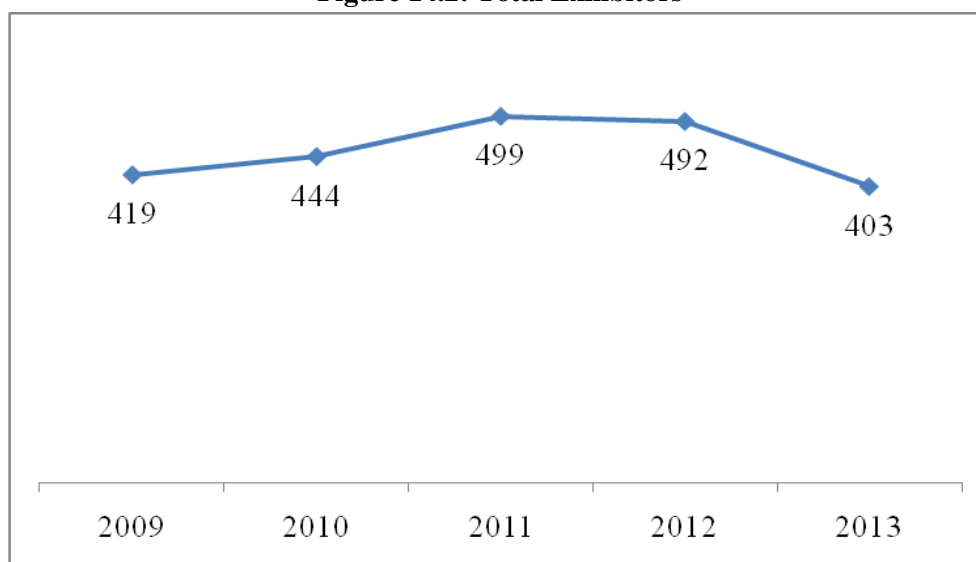

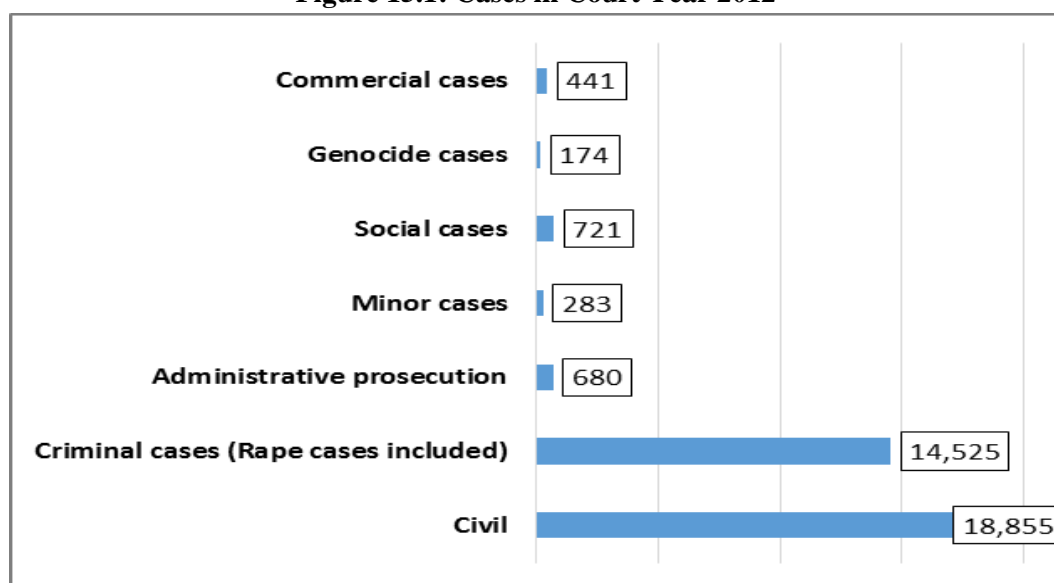

**Figure 15.1: Cases in Court Year 2012**

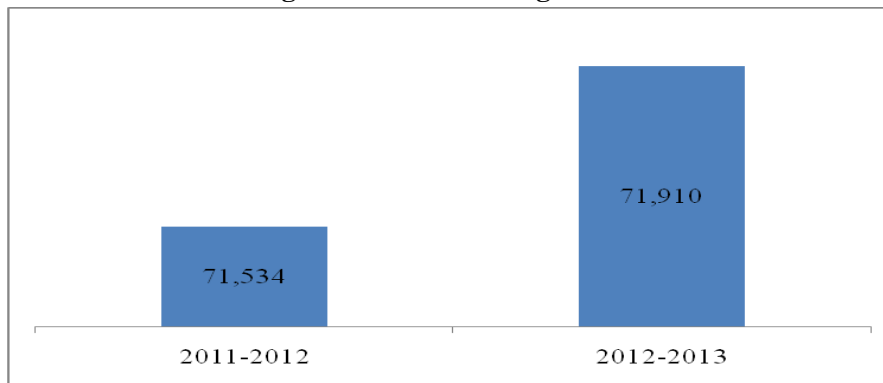

**Figure 15.3: Commercial Courts**

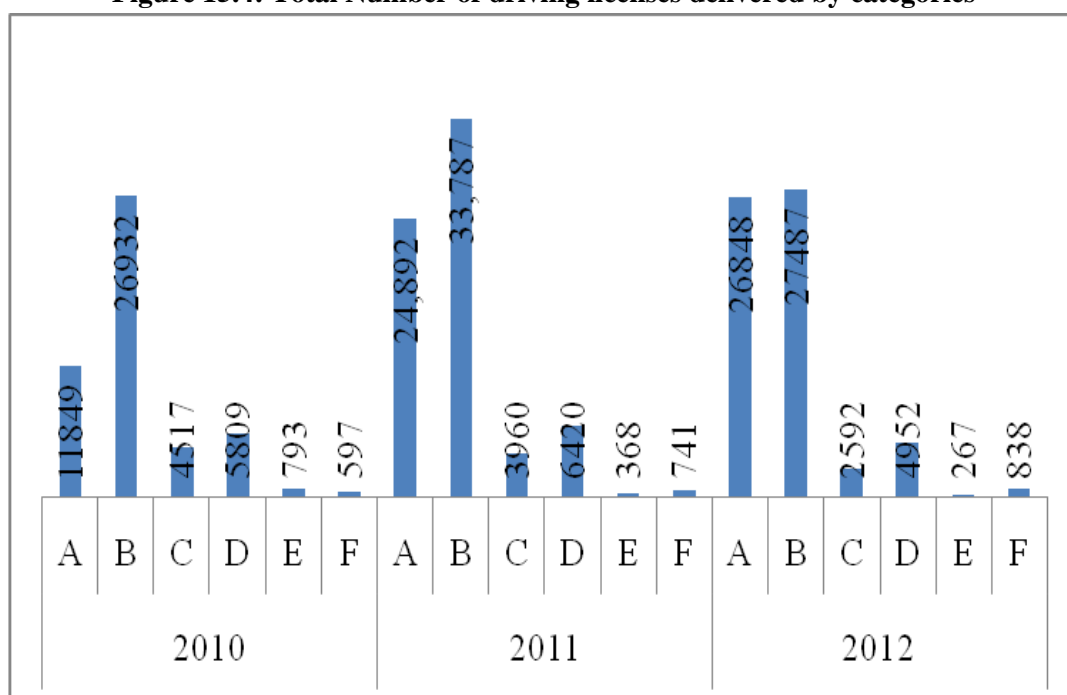

**Figure 15.4: Total Number of driving licenses delivered by categories**



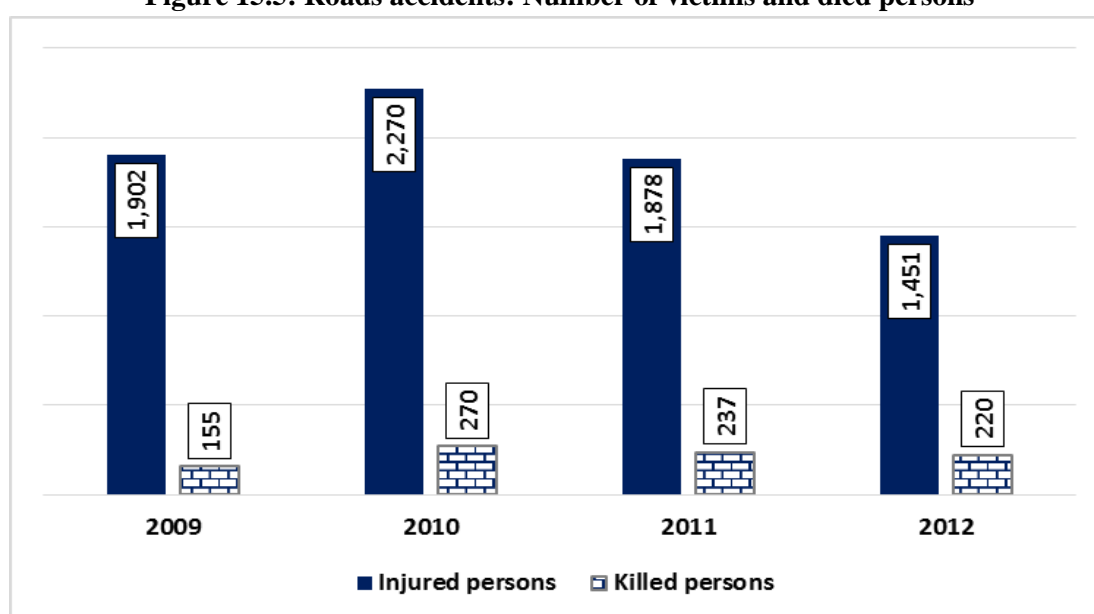
